SOUTH AFRICA CONTRASTED WITH CANADA.—A LETTER FROM FRED MACRAE.—THE ISLANDERS' WISH.

Mr Seymour Young, of Pownal, has received a letter from Fred MacRae, dated Naumport, April 27th. He gives a splendid description of the pursuit of Cronje and the battle of Paardeberg. The latter part of the letter is as follows:

"We are greatly surprised to hear of Boer sympathizers in Prince Edward Island. Sometimes we wish they were in the Boer trenches that we could dispose of them.

I am sure that the tour in the political tide at home must have created great excitement. Though you wish me home I prefer being here, fascinating as politics is.

Canadians have always been reading about the great resources of South Africa. They are vast, no doubt, but nothing to Canada's. Gold and diamonds are the backbone of South Africa's wealth. Last year the two totalled about £18,000,000, or less than £1,000,000 more than Canada's cheese or fish for 1895. The Transvaal, Orange Free State, Natal and Cape Colony produce coal, but our Cape Breton company mines more than all of South Africa. The production of wool, sheepskins, goatskins, tea, sugar, fish, etc., is enormous, but it does not approach Canada's lumber, grain and live stock. The fruit of South Africa is out of the race with the fruit of Canada. This country has few manufacturing industries; Canada has many. South Africa has not the advantage of inland shipping. But though this country suffers much in comparison with our country it will yet become great under the British.

There is a great number of Canadians ill and a large percentage of Islanders. But they will all get well.

FIGHTING THE BOERS

Interesting Letter From One of the Boys of Company 'G.'

Mr. Arthur Dillon writes from Waterworks Drift, April 24:

Some time has elapsed since I last wrote you, but everything is so slack out here there is absolutely nothing to write about except long marches. We started from Bloemfontein three days ago and have been chasing the Boers all the time, from early in the morning until late at night, but we cannot get them to stand. It seems to me that nothing can stand in front of the 19th Brigade. Today about two hundred of the Boers tried to make a stand at the water works, a position they had held for three weeks, but on our arrival, as soon as our artillery fired three shells, they started to run. When the Gordon Highlanders fired on them, as they were the advance guard, the Boers soon mounted their horses, and by the time we arrived on the scene they had fled and left us the water works, which we intend to hold. Tomorrow I suppose we will be on the chase again.

It is reported in camp tonight that there are about 3000 Boers in the immediate vicinity of here, but we have lots of troops all around them, and one of those days you will hear of another big battle and another victory for the British, for they do not intend to let them slip through their fingers this time; and more than likely when we get this lot it will be about the scrapping in the O. F. S., if not the whole affair, and the sooner the better as all hands are getting pretty sick of it.

The strength of our regiment at present is about five hundred, and only the very toughest ones are left of our Island boys. Only eleven of our Islanders started on this last march, the rest being left behind sick, or feeling not like a march.

Some of them have a touch of enteric fever, but all will pull through. Lieut. McDonald arrived all O. K. and has become a general favorite here. Of course that was only what I expected as I knew him before.

Major Weeks, I am afraid, has got the fever. We hear very little war news here. The draft has not found us yet. I hear some of them are sick already. The weather out here is now much colder than when last I wrote you and we have been served now with the second wool blanket and another sheet. At night the dew wets everything as wet as rain; and sleeping on theveldt is not very pleasant. But we hope it is not for long. Our six months has come, and you and I guess we will have to put in the year or nearly the year. I fancy there is no news out here that I can tell that you have not heard, so I will close for now.
