Government Stock Farm. AT A MEETING of the Stock Farm Commissioners, held at the Colonial Building, on Friday, the 16th October, 1868, Present:—

Ordered, That on and after the 1st NOVEMBER next, three imported long wool rams be allowed to serve two hundred Ewes, and that no person be allowed to send more than four Ewes to each Ram. That the price of service for each Ewe be Five Shillings, to be paid to the Secretary. That for this fee each Ewe shall be allowed to remain 14 days; after that period and until taken away, the owner shall pay Six pence per day for each Ewe.
