### P. E. I. Guernsey Is Highest Living Maritime Producer

The Registered Guernsey cow, Patosie Dorraine's Lassic, owned by J. Eric Hurry, Winsloe, P.E.I., has just completed an official Record of Performance that makes her the highest living record holder in the Maritime Provinces. "Lassic" has just completed a record of 18,322 lbs. of milk containing 801 lbs. of butterfat made in 365 days on three times daily milking, as an eight year old, the second highest possible rating for Type and at the 1956 Charlottetown Old Home Grand Champion Senior and Grand Champion Female. Her son, Patosie Plus, was second to another Hurry cow, Patosie Patricia, that has a record of 19,924M - 904F made in 1949 and which is 7th among all record producing cows in Canada. "Lassic" also a strong supporter of the P.E.I. Guernsey Breeders' Club of which he has been Secretary for a number of years.

### British Gov't Watching New Revival of Tunnel Project

By GILBERT SEDDON LONDON (Reuters)—The British government is watching current moves aimed at restarting a century-old project to dig a tunnel under the English channel linking Britain and France. The government is considering whether recent developments call for any change in policy toward the project. Transportation Minister Harold Watkinson told the House of Commons Wednesday. The "recent developments" he referred to mainly concern the activities of some American interests here to investigate the possibility of putting up the money for a new survey of the long-planned project. Watkinson's remarks in the House of Commons were in response to a labor member's question. Laborite John Cronin noted that in this age of H-bombs one early objection to the tunnel no longer applies. One general, Sir Garnet Wolsley, dashed the tunnelers' plans in 1880 with a warning that Britons might awake one morning to find themselves and their invading army from the Continent. Watkinson noted that so far no plans have been found feasible for a road tunnel. "A rail tunnel alone will probably cost something like £100,000,000 (\$280,000,000)." He said that in Britain and France acclaimed the idea for a tunnel when it was first proposed 100 years ago by Frenchman Thome de Gamond. The tunnel would run through chalk under about 23 miles of Dover to Calais. Because it would have to be deep in the center, the tunnel would probably be about 40 miles in length, including approaches at each end. Some diggings were begun years ago and still exist.

### Murder Charge In Sydney Death

SYDNEY (CP)—Kenneth Wallace Wilson, 36, of nearby Grand Lake Road, was charged with the murder Tuesday of Neil MacLean, 55, of Sydney, an unemployed laborer. MacLean's body was found by two boys Monday near the edge of the city dump. Wilson, arrested Tuesday morning, was remanded until today. An autopsy was performed Tuesday but results were not disclosed. An inquest is scheduled for April 15.

### Honey Production Down 3 Per Cent

OTTAWA (CP)—Production of honey in Canada during 1956 dropped three per cent to 24,272,000 pounds from 1955's output of 25,031,000. However, value of the honey crop in 1956 was \$4,419,000 compared to \$4,399,000, the bureau of statistics reported Wednesday.

### Excellent Red Cross Returns From C. Royalty

In commenting on the progress of the 1957 Red Cross campaign yesterday, Mr. Walter R. Shaw, provincial president and campaign chairman, said that \$14,375, or 46 per cent of the \$31,000 objective had been reached to date.

He mentioned particularly the splendid results obtained in Central Royalty District where \$256,800 was collected. This was about three times as much as had been subscribed in this district in previous years. Mr. Shaw said he felt that the successful outcome of the campaign in Central Royalty was due to the fact that an energetic group of canvassers headed by Mr. Fred G. Osborne had made most of their 230 calls on residents of the district before they were approached at their places of business; and in this way had made a very good showing for their own community-minded district. He remarked that the men canvassers in Charlottetown were rather slow in getting their calls completed, but that nearly 70 per cent of the lady canvassers who conducted the house-to-house canvass in the city over the last week-end in March had made their returns which to date show an increase over what came from the same number last year.

### 2 Ships Are Freed From Ice But 8 Others Still Trapped

HALIFAX (CP)—Government icebreakers freed two ships from heavy ice off the Cape Breton coast during the weekend but eight others still were trapped off Nova Scotia and Newfoundland Sunday night.

The transport department said Sunday the D'Herberville released the sealer Theron from a menacing ice trap off the west coast of Cape Breton and now is working toward the Tem, Theta, Orel, Polar Star and Curling. The sealing vessels were snared within a two-mile radius about 20 miles off Cheticamp. Karl Karlsson of Karl Karlson and Company Ltd., shipping agents here, said earlier the Tem lost her rudder and will have to be towed out but that the others are "all right." The icebreaker Saurel rescued the rudderless 800-ton freighter Ahern Trader, from ice off Cape Breton's eastern coast Saturday night.
