The bill was read over by Mr. Ings, representing the company, and some amendments were suggested upon which Mr. Ings is to report at the meeting to be held on Monday evening next. The amendments had a special bearing upon the erection of poles, the mileage of the road, and the gross percentage to be paid to the city. The Council thought that at least five miles of track should be put down, and that the city should have the right to remove the track if the company failed to keep the road in operation at any time for a period of four months.

## LIBERAL CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION.

AT WHICH MR. HACKETT WAS NOMINATED.

Report of a Gentlemen who was Present.

THE EXAMINER'S report of the Liberal Conservative Convention having miscarried, we insert with pleasure the following report of a gentleman who was present:

The President took the chair at 1.30 o'clock in the O'Leary Hall. There were present 73 delegates from the different sections of the riding—26 French delegates and 48 other.

Mr. Hackett was nominated for the west end of the riding by Mr. Patrick McQuinn, Palmer Road, seconded by Mr. Cornelius McLellan, from Lot 14. He was also nominated from the east end of the riding by Mr. John Praught, Lot 14, seconded by Mr. Stephen Arsenault, of Wellington.

Mr. Jerome Blanchard was nominated by Mr. John Peters, Duvor Road and seconded by Mr. Charles Gallant.

The ballots were then taken with the result that Mr. Hackett obtained a good majority.

The President then declared Mr. Hackett the choice of the convention.

Mr. Blanchard then moved that Mr. Hackett's nomination be made unanimous, which was done with an enthusiastic vote every member on his feet.

The enthusiasm was intense. Mr. Blanchard then made a strong and telling speech endorsing Mr. Hackett's nomination and calling upon his friends, in the interval, to work for Mr. Hackett.

Mr. Hackett then took the platform and for about an hour held the delegates spell-bound with an arraignment of the present bunglers at Ottawa, and was cheered to the echo.

Calls from the delegates brought Mr. J. E. Birch, M. L. A., to his feet, and he responded in a way, judging from the applause, which pleased everyone present.

This closed one of the best and most harmonious conventions that it has been my pleasure to attend.

## MALPEQUE NOT ASLEEP—NO SIR.

SIR—I hasten to say in reply to the charge of Rip Van Winkleism, I see that, even according to you, it is only imputable on the score of the Legislature, at Peters' beck, having passed a bill to build a new P. of W. College and issue debentures to cover the cost of such building. You say that prior to the act of the Legislature you occupied my position; but the dashways and their press answered you this, that, and the other thing. Dear friend, why did you not hold fast to the truth, at any cost! Do you now advance the extraordinary doctrine that a thing is right because a government and its servile press declare it so to be. Coming back to the point, what's to become of us if all the Peters' promises and schemes are to mature? We may as well get out of the country at once. No body knows better than I, that such a bill as you speak of was passed before last election and used with many other suspect devices to catch votes. But did it catch any? Not around here at least, I can tell you, for it proved a veritable millstone around little Stephen's neck. And it is absurd to say that the province, again assembled in a new Parliament, which some 50 votes, you Conservatives say, would have given to you, cannot pass upon matters *de novo*, as the lawyers say. I know, too, that tenders were called for and extravagant plans exhibited for this college, but were they not all abandoned and a French firm at Quebec set to work to devise something more economical? Quebec is a good place to go to for modest public expenditure. I think, then, Mr. Editor, that I am all right in asking that this matter be re-considered; for I fail to see why it must go ahead simply because Peters and his servile crew ran it through the house in its dying moments and for an unworthy purpose. I think I can assure you too that something will be heard of it next session,—if we are ever to have one.
