

Miss Supertest Grabs Harmsworth Trophy

DETROIT (AP)—With a record-shattering race, Canada's Miss Supertest III took the Harmsworth Trophy away from the United States Thursday.

That symbol of world speed-boat supremacy had been held by the U.S. since Gar Wood captured it from England in 1920.

Miss Supertest finished the third and deciding race all alone, defending champion Maverick having broken down on the 13th of the 15 three-mile laps.

RECORD SPEED

But Canadian driver Bob Hayward, who started with a record first lap and better it on the second, pushed his craft to a Harmsworth record of 104.098 m.p.h. anyway.

The 45-mile race is "a test of handling skill and stamina of men and machines as well as speed."

Supertest won the first of the three races Tuesday, when Maverick also broke down. The U.S. boat had led through 12 laps that day.

Driver Bill Stead came tearing back in Maverick Wednesday with a record-smashing 102.988 m.p.h. average to even the competition.

Miss Supertest, with Hayward "gambling all the way," never dropped below 105 m.p.h. until Maverick fell out Thursday.

The Canadian never was behind and was out front by a quarter of a mile when Maverick conked out. Stead said he had no idea what caused his 2,500-horsepower hydroplane to quit.

"It will likely have to be torn down to determine the cause," Stead said.

Gar Wood, now a jaunty 78, saw the shattering U.S. defeat, and told newsmen: "It is a good thing because it will revitalize speedboat competition. We had held it (the trophy) too long. Competition had become more or less dormant."

FULL THROTTLE

Hayward, taking his Miss Supertest far up the Detroit River, gunned her full throttle as he headed for the starting line and shot past Stead at the very outset.

Miss Supertest whizzed around the first lap at 107.495 m.p.h. to break the newly-established mark of 105.675 that Maverick set in the opening lap Tuesday.

Hayward kept the throttle wide open and came right back with still another new record of 109.334 in the second lap. From there, through the 11th he ran laps in the 106-108 m.p.h. range.

With Maverick out of it, Hayward, an Ontario chicken farmer who drives speedboats for the sport of it, eased his craft back

and did only 89.419 m.p.h. in the 15th and final lap.

Miss Supertest III is owned by J. Gordon Thompson, a London, Ont. petroleum executive and his son James. The Thompsons unsuccessfully sought to wrest the Harmsworth away from Miss Supertest I in 1955. That craft lost the first, won the second and lost the third of the required three races.

Shanty, owned by oilman-sportsman William T. Waggoner of Phoenix, Ariz., repelled Supertest

's challenge. Waggoner also owns Maverick, which captured the 1959 gold cup and diamond cup races.

This was Canada's fourth post-war challenge for the trophy which Alfred Harmsworth, Lord Northcliffe of England, donated to international speedboating in 1903.

England which tried eight times to recapture the trophy from Wood and his Miss Americans gave up after Kay Don's defeat in 1933.

Phillies Top Giants Twice; White Sox Down Boston

The lowly Philadelphia Phillies fended league leading Giants a double jolt Thursday sweeping both ends of a doubleheader 7-2 and 2-1.

The twin loss sliced the Giants' lead over idle Los Angeles Dodgers to two games. Milwaukee's third place Braves, despite a 5-4 defeat by St. Louis, reduced its deficit to 3½ games.

In the only game played in the American League, Chicago's White Sox defeated Boston 5-1 to boost their first place margin over Cleveland to a game and a half.

RASH OF HITS

The usually punchless Phillies broke out in a rash of extra base hits pounding Giant starters Mike McCormick and Allan Worthington off the mound to snap a six-game losing streak.

Thursday originally was an off day for both the Giants and Phils but National League president Warren Giles ordered the doubleheader played following last Sunday's washout between the two clubs.

The Giants, who had dropped a 10-inning game in Pittsburgh Wednesday night, looked bedraggled and weary and manager Bill Riggs lashed out at Giles for ordering the games to be played following a night contest.

The Phils snapped a 1-1 tie in the sixth inning of the opener when Joe Koppe smashed a home run. Before the inning was over the Phils had four more runs, including a four-bagger by Gene Freese. Jim Owens went the distance, giving up seven hits for his 10th victory.

Don Cardwell outpitched Worthington in the second game for his eighth triumph. All the scoring was done in the first inning. Willie Mays put the Giants ahead with a home run, his 22nd of the season but the Phils came back with two on a walk to Solly Drake, a single by Koppe, a sacrifice fly and Wally Post's scoring single.

Ken Boyer drove in four runs and Joe Cunningham cracked four hits to spark the Cards to their

second straight triumph over the Braves. Lindy McDaniel, in relief, gained his 14th victory. He took over in the sixth and blanked the Braves the rest of the way. Don McMahon, third Milwaukee hurler, was the loser. The Cards broke a 4-4 tie in the eighth on Cunningham's triple and Boyer's sacrifice fly. Boyer also hit a three-run homer.

Reserve catcher John Ramano drove in three runs and right-hander Barry Latman doled out only six hits in the White Sox victory over the Red Sox. Ted Williams ruined Latman's shut-out bid by hitting a home run in the ninth. It was the tenth homer of the season for Williams and the 402nd of his career. He needs only one more to tie Lou Gehrig for fourth place among the all-time leaders.

In the only night game Chicago's Cubs were guests of Cincinnati Reds.

Sox Sideline Tigers; Giants Knot Series

Yesterday morning in Little League competition the Red Sox eliminated the Tigers from the playoffs with a 9-6 victory. Versatile Robert MacNutt took the slab for the Sox, being nicked for five hits, walking five and fanning seven.

Ernie Hartinger started for the Tigers but was replaced by Johnny Borge in the fifth. These youngsters were tagged for a combined total of twelve hits. John Rogers, Bill Weatherbie, Robert MacNutt and Lloyd Arsenault each had two hits for the winners.

"Ginger" Breedan led all batters with a triple and a pair of doubles. Peter Pineau smashed a home run for the losers as well.

Wayne Ross and Bill Weatherbie made fine catches for their respective teams.

Jamie Kennedy switched from the backstop to the mound to hurl the Browns into a tie with the Giants in their best of three series. Young Kennedy allowed but two hits and issued two free passes.

Walter MacLennan started for the losers but gave way to Brooks Claybourne in the fourth.

Fred MacDonald and Alan Flood led the Browns' assault

with two hits each. One of the Giants' hits was a four-bagger by Ronnie Harding.

MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes have placed Mill Crain on waivers with a verbal swipe at Toronto Argonauts for ignoring an offer to make a deal for the 22-year-old centre from the University of Mississippi.

The Alouettes, overloaded with centres but looking for grounding strength, wanted to trade Crain outright for halfback Wray Carleton. But Argos turned down the deal and Tuesday night sold import Carleton to the west's British Columbia Lions.

"It's their business, of course," Montreal managing director Gordon Kennedy said Thursday. "But I thought the sale of Carleton was anything but a bright move. We offered them a chance

for a deal that would benefit both clubs. I can't see why they passed it up."

"We weren't looking for charity. Crain is a ballplayer that can make any club in the league apart from ours — only because we have Tom Hugo and Bob MacLellan at centre. But I suppose they didn't want to do anything that would strengthen us in any way—even if they benefited."

The Alouettes went through 45-degree temperatures Wednesday night in a heavy practice to work out the kinks in their deep pass defence.

With strong-armed Ronnie Knox in Toronto's quarterback slot the Als anticipate a busy night on defence 20 yards or more back of the line of scrimmage.

Big Game Is Friday Says Dodger Coach

LOS ANGELES (AP)—"The big game is coming up Friday night," said Charlie Dressen, battle-scarred veteran of many a fierce pennant race. "If we can take that one we may have 'EM ON THE RUN."

The Dodger coach was speaking of San Francisco Giants, who put their National League lead on the block today in the first of three-game series.

At stake is the pennant.

"We can't depend on anybody else to beat 'em," Dressen said. "We gotta beat 'em ourselves."

The Giants and Dodgers meet six more times this season. After the three game series here they angle in San Francisco Sept. 18-

19-20 for the other three.

"We gotta take four or five of those games to stay in the race," said Dressen. "We still gotta chance for the pennant, but we gotta lick the Giants to do it."

The Dodgers have a slight edge in today's skirmish. They have two days rest under their belts while the Giants arrive from the eastern wars after a doubleheader with Philadelphia.

The Dodgers shoot their ace righthander Don Drysdale against San Francisco today.

The Giants are expected to counter with Sad Sam Jones, a curve-balling righthander who gives righthanded batters nightmares.

Jack Dempsey Isn't Seeking Role Of Czar

NEW YORK (AP)—Jack Dempsey isn't seeking the role of national boxing czar but he indicates he wouldn't turn down such a job if it were offered.

"I am not looking for it," the former heavyweight champion said Thursday in an interview over radio station WOR. "I would like to see such a position created but there are many people more qualified than I am to do the job."

"My whole aim is to see that the fighters and public are protected," the Manassa Mauler said. "If it's found that any person has done something detrimental to boxing he should be barred for life."

"I am in favor of strict laws to clean up the game and I am in favor of a powerful national commissioner."

SUMMERSIDE — Fisheries protection officer Norman MacLeod seized a lobster fishing boat Wednesday night about four miles off Sea Cow Head. The boat was operated by Theodore "Leo D" Arsenault of Wellington. A charge of using the 36-foot boat to fish two consecutive lobster seasons will be laid against the accused.

The seizure was made from a motor launch of the fisheries patrol boat C.G.S. Lamna in which officer MacLeod was accompanied by Donald C. Iverson, first mate of the Lamna, skipper of the motor launch, and seaman, John J. Robichaud and John C. MacLeod.

The boat has been towed to an undisclosed port.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Robin Roberts is going to undergo an immediate physical checkup and will not accompany Philadelphia Phillies on a western trip starting in Pittsburgh tonight.

John Quinn, Phillies general manager, announced Thursday that the 32-year-old pitcher probably would go through a series of tests as an outpatient at Temple University hospital.

Quinn said the examination was decided upon when a routine check of the squad disclosed that Roberts had an excess of sugar in his system. A Phillies spokesman said the club had no idea what the pitcher's trouble might

The Pennsylvania State Athletic Commission said Moore could have his licence as soon as he filed an application.

Scott and Hart, No. 1 and 2 welterweight contenders respectively, hope the winner will get a crack at champion Don Jordan.

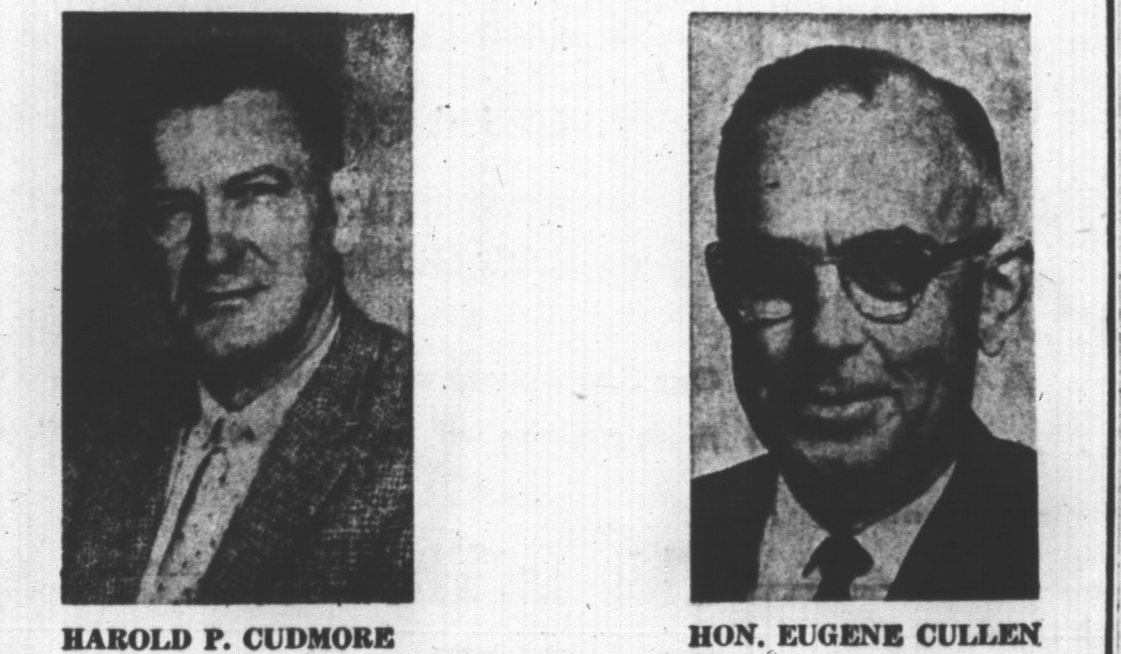
