GENERAL MERCIER TO BE ARRESTED

The Case Against Dreyfus Has Failed.

MAITRE LABORI RECOVERING FROM HIS WOUND.

Will Appear in Court Again to Conduct the Case.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 21.—A Paris correspondent says: The Government it is understood has decided to arrest General Mercier. It is rumored that orders will be given to withdraw the case against Dreyfus, it having been proved that the documents relied upon to establish his guilt are forgeries.

RENNES, Aug. 21.—M. Labori is expected to appear in court tomorrow. He is dissatisfied with Maitre Demange's conduct of the case thus far, and on his return to have General Mercier and other general's back upon the witness stand. After reading their evidence he is confident of his ability to crush Mercier.

PARIS, Aug. 21., 1 a. m.—Up to the present hour 56 persons have been reported injured, including several policemen.

No one, as far as is known, was injured by fire arms. Nearly all were hurt by being crushed or trodden under foot.

A body of rioters who had taken refuge in the court yard of the Gare de Lest was expelled by the police, who made 25 arrests. Quiet has been restored.

GERMANY AND FRANCE

Wilhelm III Preaches the Gospel of Goodwill.

BERLIN, Aug. 19.—Emperor William unveiled on Friday a monument to the dead of the regiment of the first guard on the St. Private battle field in the vicinity of Metz. In the address which his majesty made on the occasion, he said in part:

"The design of this monument differs from that usual on battlefields, a mail clad archangel leans in calm repose on a sword adorned with the regiments proud motto—'Semper talis.' I desire that the meaning of this figure be generally known. It stands on this blood stained field as a guardian of all the brave soldiers of both armies, French and German, who fell here, for the French soldiers who found a glorious grave at St. Private, also the Germans who fought bravely and heroically for their emperor and fatherland. When our flags are lowered in greetings before this statue, and flutter mournfully over the graves of our dead comrades, may they wave over the tombs of our foe and whisper that we think sorrowfully of their brave death. With deep thanks and an upward glance to the Lord of Hosts, for the guidance He so mercifully vouchsafed to our great emperor, we will recall that the countless souls of all those who once stood face to face in hot encounter, will look down upon the day from when they stand around the throne of the supreme judge united in eternal peace."

Emperor William strongly emphasized the words "all" and "both" in his utterances when referring to "all brave soldiers of both armies."

GREAT BRITAIN AND THE STATES

A Flourishing and Increasing Trade.

EDINBURGH, Aug. 19.—The Scotsman says that trade between Great Britain and the United States appears to be very flourishing, and that in consequence of the increase, a regular fortnightly steamship service will soon be established between Great Britain and New York, instead of the present occasional service.

Breeding Stock

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Mr. Victor Cavendish, member of Parliament for West Derbyshire, in a speech before the Bakers' Club last evening, said that an American Government official told him that the next few years would see a large importation of English stock into the United States for breeding purposes.

Kipling Buys Back a Copyright.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Rudyard Kipling has bought back the copyright of "Departmental Duties" from the publisher, George Newnes, Limited, for £12,500. Newnes had issued an enormous cheap edition. Kipling wants to withdraw most of the ditties, including only a few of the best in a future book.

Italy and China.

ROME, Aug. 19.—The Italian Foreign Office denies officially the statements of the Paris Trips regarding an alleged endeavour on the part of this Government to obtain a railway concession west of Peking. Italy has demanded no concession, it is declared, in northern China.

Pattern For Canada.

SYDNEY, New South Wales, Aug. 19.—The Government budget, delivered to Parliament, shows a surplus of estimated receipts over suggested expenditures amounting to £140,000.

FEARFUL DOINGS BY PARIS MOB

Meeting of Anarchists and Socialists.

HORRIBLE SACRILEGES COMMITTED BY THE MOB

Church Broken Into and Desecrated

---Many Arrests Made.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

PARIS, Aug. 21.—Paris was yesterday the scene of the most serious disturbances, which recall in some respects the Commune.

In response to an appeal of the Journal, Peuple and La Petit Republique, groups of anarchists and socialists gathered about 3 o'clock in the afternoon in the Place de La Republique.

The police had taken precautions and there seemed no danger of disorder.

Sebastien Faure and Faberot, revolutionists anarchists were the ringleaders of the riot.

Faure standing on the pedestal of the statue which rises in the centre of the place de La Republique addressed the crowd.

Among other things he said that the Anarchists should be masters of streets.

The police then interfered. The arrests made by the police included Faure. The rioters smashed the windows of the church of St Ambrose, and a concerted rush was made on the church of St Joseph with hatchets, knives, etc.

A wild horde burst into the church which instantly became the scene of pillage and sacrilege.

Altars, fonts and statues were hurled to the floor and smashed. Pictures were rent, candle-sticks and the posts of the high altar were thrown out and trampled under foot.

The crucifix was made the target for missiles and the figure of the Saviour was fractured in several places.

Chairs were carried out, side the church, piled up, and set on fire in the entrance to the church.

When this stage was reached the crucifix was pulled down and thrown into the flames.

Suddenly the cry was raised that the statue of the Virgin had been forgotten, and the crowd returned and tore it down as well.

The sacristan escaped and called for the police.

The Republican guards promptly arrived with the constables.

The mob were compelled to fall back in order to form into line of defence as the police attacked them.

At length the officers began to gain the mastery.

A score of anarchiste took refuge in adjacent houses, others escaped to the belfry and fiercely defended themselves by pouring missiles on the republican guards, but finally these were dislodged.

Twenty anarchists were arrested and found to be carrying revolvers, loaded stic's and knives

When the police entered the church the Anarchists had just set fire to the pulpit. The interior of the edifice is a complete wreck.

Seven valuable old pictures that can never be replaced were ruined.

After the mob had been driven away the Abbe Lacour collected the fragments of the Sacrament and replaced them in the ciborium. As he did so he was heard bitterly commenting.
