

Group of Easter Islanders To Have First Look Outside

HALIFAX (CP)—An example of how modern civilization will affect remote Easter Island may be evident long before the influence of today's world imposes itself on this unique speck in the South Pacific.

Several island natives are en route to Valparaiso, Chile, and their first look at how the rest of the world lives.

Their reaction may add to the information being compiled by 33 scientists conducting a medical study and other research among the island's 1,200 inhabitants before an airport is established there as a transpacific stopping point.

The natives are among more than 60 passengers, including Chilean military personnel and their families, bound for Chile aboard the Canadian Navy supply ship Cape Scott, which landed the scientific group on Easter Island Dec. 12. The ship was reported about 200 miles east of the island Tuesday.

Don Bruce, radio operator aboard the Cape Scott, said in a radio conversation with Halifax Tuesday, that he found the Easter Island people friendly, modest and honest.

Their only recent association

with civilization until arrival of the Canadian expedition has been with missionary nuns, a priest called Father Sebastian and a Portuguese veterinarian, Dr. Rodrigues.

Religious ceremonies, at least, will be familiar to islanders. Bruce told of attending mass last Sunday in a small Easter Island church he described as much like Portuguese country church "very barren, very empty and with rough wooden benches."

More than 700 of the 1,300 population attended the mass, which was sung in Polynesian. The music of their voices was "out of this world," Bruce said. The entire congregation joined in.

"It was as if they had not heard it. But this was not so; they sing this way the year through, as they were taught by Father Sebastian, a German priest who has been on the island for more than 30 years."

Bruce said Father Sebastian was to have made the trip to Chile aboard the Cape Scott but decided against it because he felt he would be able to assist the scientific team in his work among island people.

seap and delegates to the port had eventually been rejected.

It will be Christmas at sea for the crew and passengers of the Cape Scott as she makes the 2,500-mile crossing to Valparaiso, first of several South American ports the ship will visit before picking up the scientific team in March for the return trip to Halifax.

CLOTHING IS SCARCE

A major concern among Easter Island people, Bruce said, is clothing. They do have enough Nuns had told him children often refuse to go without essential clothing.

He said an appeal is being made to the Red Cross and to children's aid societies for clothing — "used clothing, anything they can wear."

Hunger has been a problem, too. Bruce said a ship scheduled to carry food supplies to the island from Chile was delayed for some reason and the Cape Scott was authorized to give the islanders certain foodstuffs.

"The natives thought the food came from heaven and that their prayers had been answered," Bruce said.

He told of a party held for island children before the Cape Scott sailed.

"We had taken ashore cartons of candy, soap and detergents. The natives thought the food was like on the island, the children, given a choice, preferred the

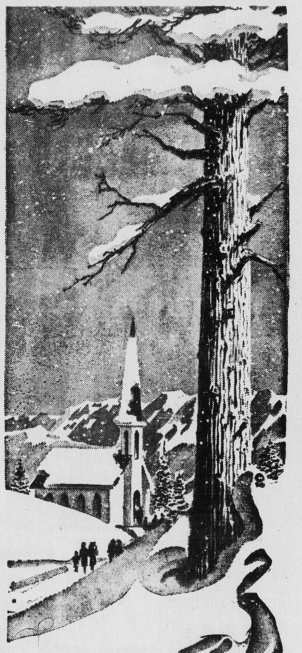
