Annual Meeting At Montague Last Night Of King's County Hospital

Mr. B. N. Hooley presided at the annual meeting of the King's County Hospital held at the Beaver Hall, Montague, last evening. Following the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, Mr. Hooley, as chairman of the board, presented his report of the year's activities. He said that during the past year the nurses' residence had been completed, thus providing quarters not only for the nurses, but releasing quarters for the domestic staff, and also releasing four additional beds in the hospital.

The home, he said, was erected at a cost of \$35,000.00 and a present debt of about \$6,000.00 remains to be paid by November 1955. An additional \$4,000.00 incorporated in a loan to clear past debts was due November, 1954. The value of the hospital, he said, was \$81,000.00, and the present debt was \$23,000.00, which was being reduced annually. He was of the opinion that the appointing of a hospital manager would lead to greater efficiency, as he felt the matron was overloaded with detailed work other than her regular duties. He also thought that a receptionist might help to relieve some of her tasks. He also spoke of a parking space to the rear of the nurses' residence, and also of paving the road in front of the residence.

Mr. Arnold Wightman presented the financial statement showing assets of \$181,869.80 and liabilities of \$42,390.26, leaving a surplus of \$139,479.54. The profit and loss statement showed receipts of \$66,566.20, expenditures of \$54,539.35, leaving a surplus before depreciation of \$12,026.85.

Mrs. Vera MacDonald presented the matron's report showing a total of 8,020 patient days, on which the grant to the hospital is based.

The Ladies' Auxiliary report showed total receipts of \$526.69, expenditures of \$406.40, leaving a balance of \$120.29.

Mrs. A. C. MacKay presented the report from the Beaver Club with receipts of \$4,910.32, expenditures of \$4,592.90, balance of \$317.42.

The appointment to the trustee board followed, and Mr. Hooley and Major John A. MacDonald were re-appointed. Miss Adah MacGregor and Mrs. Winnifred Vickers were re-appointed as visitors.

The meeting concluded with a vote of thanks being extended to the ladies' organizations and the secretary-treasurer, Mr. Wightman, for their work during the past year.

Says 850 Korean Children Unwanted

TORONTO, (CP) - A South Korean clergyman Monday told the seventh International Conference of Social Work that one of the greatest tragedies of the Korean war is that 850 children of mixed blood are unwanted by either parent.

Father Laurent Youm of Seoul, a Roman Catholic priest, said he intends to try to interest citizens of other nations in adopting the children.

"Many Korean parents look down on them and do not want them in their homes for fear they would be a bad influence of their own children."

He said in most cases it is impossible to trace the fathers of the children and those that are found indicate little or no interest.

Chinese, Indian Premiers Urge Five Principles

By Peter Jackson NEW DELHI, (Reuters) - The prime ministers of India and Communist China Monday recommended adoption of five principles in international affairs as "a solid foundation for peace and security."

They said they hope to see these principles used in particular to bring a political settlement in Indo-China creating "free democratic, unified and independent states which should not be used for aggressive purposes or be subjected to foreign intervention."

The five principles are: Mutual respect for territorial integrity and sovereignty, non-aggression, non-interference in each other's internal affairs, equality and mutual benefit, and peaceful co-existence.

These principles originally formed the preamble of the Chinese-Indian treaty on Tibet signed in April this year.

Mutual support for the principles formed the basis of a communique issued here soon after Premier Chou En-lai of Communist China left for Rangoon at the end of three-day talks with Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India.

In Rangoon Chou will talk with Premier U Nu of Burma.

Observers here believe the communique paves the way for a series of non-aggression pacts between Asian countries based on the five principles.

Courts May Use Tape Recorders

New Guatemalan Regime Outlaws Communism; Arbenz Goes Into Exile

By SAM SUMMERLIN TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - The Guatemalan military junta which replaced leftist president Jacobo Arbenz Guzman announced Monday it has outlawed Communism in Guatemala.

This came rapidly on the heels of a threat by the anti-Communist invaders who have been fighting Arbenz' Communist-supported regime for 11 days that they would "raise" their arms against the "unconstitutional" junta.

The government radio also announced formation of a new government with Col. Carlos Diaz, junta head and former army chief of staff, as president and chief of the armed forces.

Meanwhile, Arbenz was reported flying to exile in Argentina.

A rebel statement, which listed Col. Carlos Castillo Armas, the invaders' leader, as "chief of state," called Diaz a "new usurper." It blasted Diaz's succession to the presidency, after Arbenz resigned Sunday night, as unconstitutional because Diaz had not taken an oath of office from the president of Congress. The rebel statement, issued at the headquarters of their provisional government in Chiquimula, Guatemala, declared "we will raise our arms against the regime which violates the constitution."

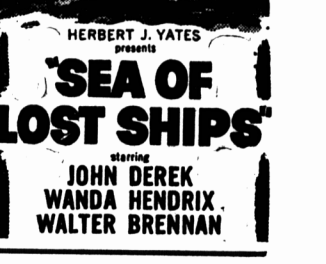
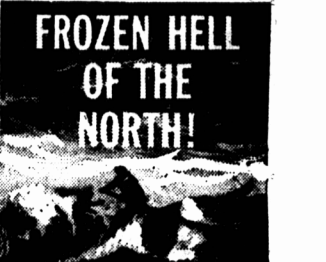
