

There was a serious night on Peake's Wharf on Friday. James Page, John McLean and Charles Mulligan, belonging to the schooner *Frank*, made a violent assault on John McGee, P. Toole, and William Harris. They threw lime stones, and kicked and jumped on them. Were it not that Messrs. W. R. Watson, W. Weeks, W. Welsh, and other respectable citizens interfered, there is every probability that the outrageous affair would have ended in loss of life. Page, McLean and Mulligan, were arrested before brought before the Police Court on Saturday and were fined as follows:

James Page, for assault on P. Toole, fined £10, or 2 months imprisonment. Also, personal damage £1.
James Page, for assault on Malcolm McLeod, fined £10, or 2 months imprisonment. Personal damage £5.
John McLean, for assault on P. Toole, fined £10 or two months imprisonment. Personal damage £1.
John McLean, for assault on Wm. Rain, £10. Personal damage £2.
John McLean, for assault on John McGee, £5, or 6 weeks.
Chas. Mulligan, for assault on John McGee, £5, or 6 weeks.

We have a letter from our special correspondent in Halifax, which we will publish next week. From it we also learn from conversation with several of the officers at the Regatta, we learn that the St. John Boatmen were assaulted on their arrival, with the most outrageous insults such as cries of, "Have you come here to poison our crew, as you poisoned Renforth?" There was no place provided for their Boat. They were also treated by the Regatta managers. Under these circumstances, they did perfectly right to withdraw. That they showed prudence in so doing has subsequently been proved, and the Coultter crew commended them for it, and expressed the wish that they had done the same.

On Sunday night, some scamps broke the shutters of the store of W. A. Weeks & Co. It was supposed at first that it was an attempt at burglary but as other mischief was done to the pump opposite, the City Marshal thinks there was no felonious intent. The guilty parties have been taken by the police authorities on their track and if found they will be punished in a manner that will be a lesson to them and a warning to others.

Rev. Dr. McDonald, of Bedouque, returned last week from the Baptist conference at Yarmouth.
R. Connell, Esq. of the *Eastern Chronicle* is on a visit to the Island. D. O'Brien, Esq., arrived on Wednesday. He is still in town, arranging about the securities for the Railway Contract.

The *Islander* says a Telegraphic office was opened last week at Bedford, Lot 12, on the premises of the Hon. W. Richards. Several complaints have reached us in regard to the Ch'town Telegraph office. It is said that the office is not kept open to suit business, and that messages are taken by a boy, who has never taken the oath that is expected of operators in other places.

There is to be a public meeting held in St. James's Church on Wednesday next, for the purpose of taking into consideration the best means to erect a Presbyterian Female Seminary in the City. The project, we hope will be a great success. It will do much to tip to settle satisfactorily the vexed School Question.

A subscription paper is in circulation in the City to raise an amount to be forwarded to the widow of Renforth, who died while contesting the Boat race in New Brunswick. The admirers of the great oarsman, we have no doubt, will testify their respect to his memory in a handsome manner.

In the Champion Sloop Race, Sadler of the Taylor-Winslip Crew, took the first prize of \$500. Brown of Halifax, came in second. K. Ily, of the Renforth Crew, came in third. Coultter, of the American Crew, did not compete.

The Annual Tea Party of the Wesleyan Sunday Schools came off on Wednesday last at Kensington. There was a large attendance and it proved of credit.

Late Telegraphic News.
Boston, Saturday Evng, Aug 26th.
An express train on the Eastern railroad ran in to the accommodation train at Beverly. Five miles from Boston, killing 27 and wounding about 50 persons. Among the killed are Rev. Dr. Ganuett, Boston, and Rev. Dr. Mason, of Cambridge.
The mail and freight trains on the Philadelphia and Erie railroad collided on Saturday morning, killing 6 and wounding 11.

New York, August 28.
Gold and Exchange quiet and steady.
The Steamer "De An Ware," having two hundred excursionists on board, exploded her boiler near Mobile yesterday. Between fifty and sixty persons were killed and wounded.
Thirty deaths have resulted by the Railroad collision near Boston on Saturday night.
To-day's cable reports Consoles 93 1/2. No quotable change in Liverpool markets.
The Paris Society has an editorial in favor of the proposed London Workmen's Society, and that the Communist prisoners be allowed to emigrate to Lower Canada.
Continental journals comment on the rumored alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy, on one side, and Russia and France on the other, as indicating a great war in Europe.

London, August 28.
A second meeting of the Empress of Germany and Austria takes place at Salzburg next month. It is proposed that those two nations assume a joint attitude.
Italy has agreed to same policy.
Kings of Denmark and Greece, father and brother to Prince Alex, are visiting the Princess of Wales at Langen, Schwabach.
The committee of the French Assembly have reported in the following terms: "There take the title of President and to continue to exercise executive powers under authority of the Assembly. Second, that the President nominate and issue execution of laws passed by the Assembly, participate in its deliberations, and on giving notice of intention to do so, appoint or dismiss ministers who shall be responsible to the Assembly for his acts after."
Scene of great debate fixed for Wednesday Situation critical.

New York, August 29.
Public meetings are being held in East River. Massachusetts demanding more care of life by railroad managers.
The Coroner's inquest on the recent slaughter on the Eastern road will be most thorough.
Exchange in Liverpool is at 2 1/2 Gold steady. The cable 30 day reports consoles and markets steady.
The rebels in Algeria are destroying the villages and attacking all the tribes which remain faithful to the French.
The President will evacuate the forts near Paris possibly the 5th Sept.
The British Consul at Zanzibar writes that Dr. Livingstone, the African explorer, is safe, and slowly making his way homeward.

Paris, August 29.
Larcy, French Minister of Public Works, has resigned.
Since the annexation of Strasbourg to Germany 23,000 inhabitants have emigrated to France and America.
Count de Chambord has disappeared of the seeking by the Legationists of a successor to the throne.
Several Paris papers have been prohibited for publishing false news.
National Goliath says Count Waldemar has been recalled and Baron von Arnim replaces him as Charge d'Affaires of Germany at Versailles.
This indicates secure relations with France and will dispense with a military watch in that country.
There were 329 deaths from cholera in Kolozburg in the week ending 26th inst., including 127 children.
No deaths from cholera at Danzig during the last two days.
London, August 30.
A destructive fire occurred in Duncannon, Lancashire. Several persons perished in the flames.
Several cases of cholera are reported at Hamburg and at 16 de la Haye. The latter is now a new case of cholera. The epidemic is now at 29th, and 8 new cases and 50 deaths on 28th.
The first disturbances which occurred between the people and the German troops at Strasbourg. Several persons were severely wounded.
The payment of the installment of indemnity amounted to half a million of francs, was completed to day.
In the French Assembly Gambetta opposed the assumption of constitutional powers and declared himself not accept even a responsible position.

Assembly. The affair in the Chamber was deafening and several personal altercations occurred. The preamble affirming constitutional powers of Assembly was adopted by 323 yeas; 327 nays. Debate will be continued to-morrow.

New York, August 31.
Steamship *Jawa*, which arrived yesterday from Liverpool, run down and sank on the passage by the Norwegian bark *Annette*, from Portsmouth, for Quebec, cutting her in two and drowning eleven out of her crew of two hundred and twenty men.
Serious freshets have occurred in the western portion of New York.
Gold exchange steady.
To-day's cable reports Consoles 93 1/2; Wheat 10s. 9d.
The former plated steamer *Repulse* ashore at Sheerness, has been got off; damage unknown.
The journals to-day contain sharp criticism on the navy and its administration.
