week said the government will grant the PNE \$2,000,000 toward the \$6,000,000 cost of a trade centre.

They said that when Mr. Pearson opened the PNE Saturday all the talk was of an arena to house a National Hockey League team.

One reporter suggested the government is simply providing an arena for a privately-owned hockey team.

PLANS EXPANSION The NHL has said it will expand to Vancouver if there are suitable facilities for large crowds.

Mr. Pearson, interviewed on board HMCS Saskatchewan be-

between Vancouver and Victoria, emphasized the federal contribution because the building will be used as a trade centre.

The federal government is interested in Pacific trade development, he said. A Pacific trade fair has been held three times at the PNE.

He conceded that "certain people" in Vancouver are more concerned with expanding the NHL than with trade with Japan.

But he saw no difference between this federal grant and one toward the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto or perhaps a convention hall in Ottawa.

## Soviet Construction Bosses See Canada's Rich Gold Mine

are eyeing a rich gold mine Tuesday on the Canadian day of their tour of the country's newest developments.

The tour of the giant Yellowknife gold mine provided a slight change of pace for the Soviet delegation that came to Canada Aug. 16.

For more than a week the six-man party, headed by Andrei I. Silivinsky, a member of the Council of Ministers of the U.S.S.R., has been criss-crossing Canada looking at everything from one of the world's greatest hydro development projects in Quebec to a hospital in Hay River, N.W.T.

The Russians Monday air-hopped from Fort Smith near the Alberta border to Yellowknife with stops at Pine Point and Hay River on the south shore of Great Slave Lake. As

they moved north and west across the Territories the Russians looked into the economics of Canadian development.

Everywhere they went they asked questions about cost, budgeting and job-tendering.

A source close to the delegation put it this way: Russia has been building a great country for almost 50 years without concern for expense. Now, with great expenditures earmarked each year for space research and military preparedness, Russia must take a second look at what it must do.

On Monday, the Russians showed interest in the construction methods at the Pine Point Mining and Smelting Company where a heavy industrial corrugated steel siding was used on all project buildings. They paced off the size of the great steel sheets and measured their thickness. They asked about the cost and where it could be purchased.

Konstantin Kroupitsa, director of a construction research institute, summed up their feelings: "This is an excellent piece of construction, but in Russia we would not waste valuable steel on walls. How do you do it?"

Leaders of the Russian delegation met with officials of the mining company for more than an hour as they asked questions.

Tuesday they went down into the giant Yellowknife mine, before heading for Inuvik, 100 miles north of the Arctic Circle.

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## Guilty Pleas By Captain Entered On Bad Seamanship

ST. IGNACE, Mich. (AP)—A plea of guilty to all charges of faulty seamanship was entered here for Capt. Martin Joppich, master of the sunken freighter Cedarville.

The plea was entered at a 15-minute U.S. Coast Guard hearing into the May 7 collision of the Cedarville and the Norwegian ship Topdalsfjord in the fog-bound straits of Mackinac. Ten Cedarville crew members were killed.

Joppich's lawyer Roman Keenan, told the hearing board: "The captain is now confined to a hospital. At this time we wish to change our plea to guilty to each and every specification of the charges."

Hearing examiner Charles Carroll said he would reserve a decision in the case and would issue findings on sanctions against Joppich's masters' licence within the next few weeks. Joppich's licence could be revoked permanently.

FAIL TO SLOW DOWN Joppich was charged with failure to reduce his vessel's speed in the dense fog and failure to sound danger signals or stop at the approach of the Topdalsfjord.

Tuesday's hearing came on the heels of a \$4,100,000 suit filed against the ship's owners, the U.S. Steel Corp., by 13 Cedarville survivors and widows of lost crew members. The suit is not expected to be heard until next spring.

Speaking in mitigation, Keenan told the hearing: "The captain wishes to continue his career when he is released from medical treatment. He does not ask for mercy but only for justice."
