RITA SCORES AGAIN IN "MY GAL SAL"

Rita Hayworth, whose recent marriage to Aly Khan has been headlines in every corner of the world, will be seen again by movie audiences at the Capitol Theatre when Twentieth Century-Fox releases "My Gal Sal."

The famed beauty gets a full opportunity to display her top singing and dancing talent in the musical set around the life of American composer Paul Dresser. Playing a combination of all the Broadway belles who admired the song scribbler who was a brother of noted author Theodore Dreiser, Rita Hayworth is featured in lavish production numbers built around such Dresser hits as "On The Banks Of The Wabash" and "My Gal Sal," the title song of the picture.

Her performance in "My Gal Sal" wrote one critic, is describable "only by a large drawn out whistle," when the musical was first seen in 1942.
