140 Attend East Prince Annual Teachers Convention Held At S'ide

140 teachers attended the annual convention of East Prince Teachers Federation, held on Thursday and Friday in the Baptist Church hall in Summerside. The president, Mr. Murray Shanks, presided.
The first speaker on the programme was Sgt. Major Irlam, former physical instructor at Prince of Wales College who gave an interesting and helpful talk on teaching physical education in the schools.
He stated that the text book used was not important since the principle involved was the same in all. Mr. Jelly, local supervisor, in his remarks, congratulated the teachers whose pupils had been successful in passing the entrance examinations to Prince of Wales College. He said that there is no substitute for hard work for either teacher or pupils. He stressed the importance of mastering the fundamentals of arithmetic.
Miss Marie Bowness, director of Junior Red Cross for Prince Edward Island, then spoke briefly emphasizing the need of early organization in the schools.
Miss Estelle Bowness, general secretary of the Prince Edward Island Teachers Federation gave a complete report on the work being done by the Federation. She paid tribute to the national organization and said that the success of the Federation depends on the interest of each individual teacher. The life of a successful teacher must be one of sacrifice and service.
Mr. Malcolm McKenzie, assistant director of education, dealt with changes in the text books, notably science, spelling and language.

Divisional Chief at 33

When the Allies landed in Normandy in 1944, Meyer commanded the 26th Panzer Grenadier Regiment which formed part of the 12th SS (Elite Guard) Hitler Youth Division. After the commander of the 12th SS was killed, Meyer at 33 became the youngest divisional commander in the German army.
On June 7, 1944, the day after the Normandy landing, 23 Canadian prisoners were killed at Eburon and Authie near Caen. Later the same day, seven other Canadians were assassinated at Meyer's headquarters at the ancient abbey of Ardennes three miles northwest of Caen.
The 3rd Canadian division was locked in a bloody battle with the 12th SS for Caen and Capriquet airfield. 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Let's Talk It Over

We listened to a very interesting lecture by a retired physical instructor recently and in the course of his remarks, he stated that at one of the institutions for which he worked, a new building was to be erected, and he requested that the floor to be used for physical drill should be a surface with some spring or give to it. A concrete floor was laid instead, with the result that the instructor, and perhaps some of the pupils too, suffered with undue muscle fatigue.
We cite this to illustrate the lamentable fact that authorities sometimes scorn to accept advice from persons in intimate contact with given situations, and well versed in the special problems connected with the particular course of action. For years this was true, as far as Prince Edward Island is concerned, in the selection of text books. Teachers who use these texts every day, and were familiar with the strengths and shortcomings were never consulted when choice of new texts were to be made. This is no longer the case, however. Teachers are now delegated to read carefully books under consideration, and their opinions, based on experience, are taken into consideration. Better texts are generally the result of this enlightened method of selection. This, of course, is just one of the many improvements effected in educational procedure during recent years.
