Rankin Firm Has Low Tender For S'ide Regional School

SUMMERSIDE — The construction firm of Robert Rankin, Summerside, with a bid of \$17,250 had the lowest of three tenders submitted for the construction of a new Miscouche-Kinkora Rural Regional High School, when tenders were opened last night in Summerside.

The other two tenders for the construction of this school, which will have seven academic classrooms and an auditorium inside the school building itself, were M.P. Schurman Co. Ltd. with a tender of \$19,367, and County Tilt with a bid of \$21,904.60.

Low bids for separate contracts on electrical installations and for plumbing, heating, and ventilation were both submitted by Inman Plumbing, Heating and Electric, with \$18,744 for the former and \$27,525.00 for the latter. Other bidders on the electrical work were Burke Electric with \$20,965 and MacLean and Sons with \$21,495.

At a recent meeting of the Prince Edward Island Junior Red Cross advisory council, it was announced that Dr. K. A. Parker will be the director for the Canadian Junior Red Cross Training Centre for high school students from Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces. This training centre will be held at Mount St. Charles Hall, Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, from July 3-13.

Dr. Parker, superintendent of the Charlottetown schools, is chairman of the P.E.I. Junior Red Cross advisory council and under his enthusiastic guidance, this work has greatly expanded during recent years, particularly in the increasing interest among students in high schools.

This is the first opportunity that P.E.I. has had to be host to this group. Every summer outstanding students from the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec and the United States meet together to stimulate and inspire one another, through working, playing and thinking cooperatively of the underlying principles of service of the Junior Red Cross. This understanding of its philosophy and activities will enable them to lead active branches in their respective schools next year.

This program helps to develop community-minded citizens and promotes fellowship and understanding among various ethnic groups of different backgrounds, all united in their efforts to serve their country better, it was stated.

An interesting and challenging program is being planned and further details will be announced later.

City Council Meets Group

MacLean Lashes Out At Opposition Gains

In a hard-hitting speech delivered to a packed hall in North Eastport last night, Hon. J. Angus MacLean emphasized that in the months of February and March of this year 1700 carloads of Maritime potatoes were shipped to European countries, carrying a freight subsidy paid by the Diefenbaker government.

"Nevertheless," the minister stated, "our opponents would have you believe we did nothing about the potato situation. I would suggest," he added, "when the Liberals' sold potatoes in England in 1947 as being disease-free when they actually are not, is a valid reason why England will not again buy Island potatoes.

The minister also pointed out that "we are moving into the era of processed food," and that this type of product is healthy and to be preferred because of its easy storability and complete absence of any type of disease.

Strong exception was taken by Mr. MacLean to the "political expediency" of the opposition when they say the Diefenbaker government lost the trade markets for the world's "Cap't" they read statistics?" Mr. MacLean demanded, "This country has an attractive trade mission, and they also left a whopping trade deficit."

The federal fisheries minister also pointed with pride to some of the Diefenbaker government's program for national development, such as the South Saskatchewan dam, the Pulp Point railway, and the Gaspe railway "and best of all our P.E.I. sewerage," adding that the Liberal's Walter Gordon "came down here and looked around and then came up with the bright idea of moving out all surplus Maritimers."

"Nevertheless," Mr. MacLean said, "this is the same old party that calls itself new. To go back to 1910," the minister stated, would be the greatest retrogression in Canada's history, and since which has retrogression ever been improvement?"
