

School Board Prepared To Accept Grades 11-12

Should Prince of Wales College become a degree granting university, the Charlottetown School Board will provide the required final two years of high school, board chairman Dr. R. Gordon Lea said yesterday.

Said Dr. Lea, "The school board is in the business of education, and if city students can't get grades 11 and 12 in PWC then the board has no choice but to supply them."

Dr. Lea said that given notice, the city would have 11 1/2 trouble in making necessary changes. At present, the act states that the city is only able to teach up to grade 10, and the board chairman said that nothing could be done until the present act is changed.

Since the city began its present building campaign in 1954, with the construction of Queen Charlotte high school until it finished with the building of West Kent elementary, its capital expenditures were in the vicinity of \$2,500,000. It will take the next 27 years to be able to finish paying for all projects, that figure will become between \$4,500,000 and \$5,000,000.

City schools built since 1954 have used the "soft end" construction technique which means that any new additions can be made with relative ease.

The announcement was made by president Mrs. William MacLean, who said that the meeting will get underway at 8 o'clock with the business and committee reports preceding the panel discussion.

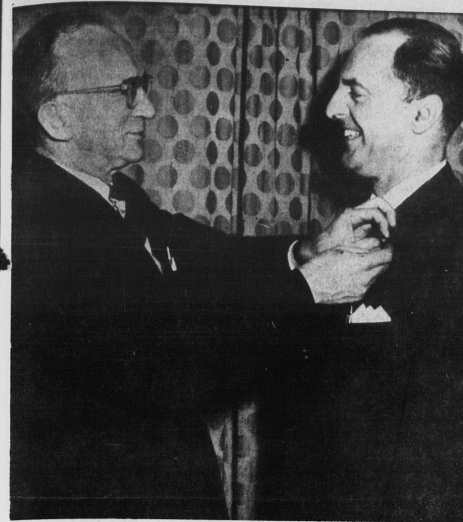

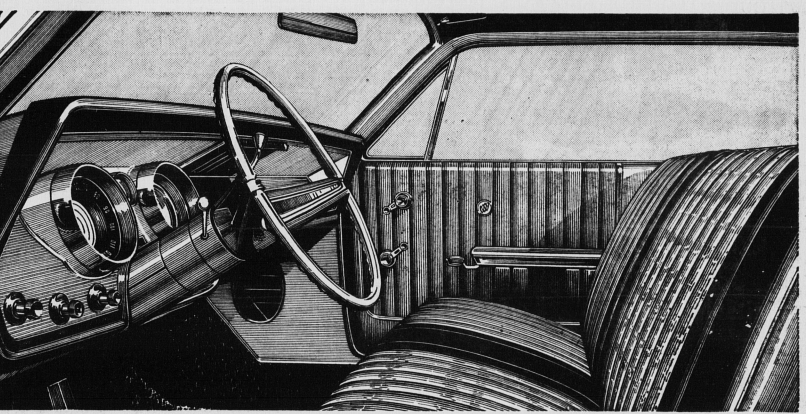
