KILLED BY LIGHTNING.—A very heavy thunder shower passed over Sussex, N. B. on the 16th, reaching as far as Hammond Vale, a house occupied by Mr. Reuben Brown, of the firm of Brown & Leech, and family was struck, instantly killing Mr. Brown, as well as his dog which was lying at his feet. The inside of the house was wholly torn to pieces and will be quite unfit for occupancy in future, such was the force of the lightning.

A DESPATCH of the 13th from St. John, Newfoundland, says—A quantity of wreckage, several bales of hay put up with flat hoops, such as are used in Upper Canada and Prince Edward Island, and a large ox with a board fastened to its head, were passed at 5.30 p. m., June 12, seven miles South of Cape Ballard, by the steamer "Alahambra," from New York via Halifax, which arrived here at midnight 12th.

A HORRIBLE murder was committed on the Howard and Oxford town line, about five miles from Ridgeway, Ont., on the 14th. The victim is a Mrs. Rowland, and her murderer is her own husband, a well-to-do farmer, and has been very generally respected by his neighbours. No particulars can be learned, except that he shot her dead with a shot gun about 4 p. m. He made no effort to get away, acknowledged his guilt freely, and acted generally like a man completely case-hardened.

ENGLISH statesmen, even if born in the purple, very rarely now gain high office or commanding position in early life. This is in striking contrast to a century ago. Not only was Pitt Premier at twenty-four, but Fox, who was smuggled into Parliament while an infant in law, was a conspicuous debater before he was of age. The late Lord Lansdowne was Chancellor of the Exchequer at twenty-three, and Lord Palmerston refused office about the same age, while Canning came to the fore when not much older.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Des Moines, Iowa, June 18. A tornado swept through central Iowa late last night, from the northwest to the southeast, from twenty miles north of Des Moines. The town of Grinnell was struck, and half the town is in ruins. About forty people were killed and over 100 wounded.

Chicago, June 18. The latest reports from the Iowa cyclone indicate forty persons killed, a great many wounded, and much property destroyed.

New York, June 18. The ship Freeman Clark, which has just arrived, reports that during the passage Capt. James Dwight, of Springfield, Mass., was attacked in his berth while asleep, by the Chinese steward, and hacked to pieces with a hatchet. The Chinese cook also attacked the chief officer, but the latter raised an alarm, and the crew, who came to his assistance, killed both Chinamen and threw their bodies overboard. No cause is assigned for their murderous attack.

Michael Davitt and his private secretary, Wm. Redmond, arrived at quarantine by the steamer Germanic at 12 30 last night, and reached the city at 7.30 to day. In an interview to-day he totally denied the story of his rupture with Parnell.

Davitt has telegraphed that he will be in Boston on Tuesday night.

Leavenworth, Kansas, June 18. A terrible wind storm prevailed in the city yesterday morning. Much property was destroyed, and three young girls were killed. Several other children were injured.

Boston, June 18. The anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill was observed in this city yesterday, with appropriate exercises.

The celebration in aid of the agitation now going on in Ireland, and in commemoration of the year 1782, under the auspices of the combined Irish-American Societies, occurred in this city, on Friday night, and throughout the whole of yesterday. The exercises opened in Friday evening with a grand ball and military display. Saturday morning was devoted to children's entertainment and Saturday afternoon to grand mass meeting, at which some 6,000 were present. Speeches were made by a number of prominent Irish speakers and resolutions adopted approving of Parnell's policy. The celebration was brought to a close last night by a concert by combined Irish choirs of the city.
