THE WEATHER.—Moderate easterly gales, rain. Thursday: moderate to fresh south-westerly winds, clearing.

THE HALIFAX.—The Halifax will leave Charlottetown after this week—every Tuesday. For particulars see new advt in this issue.

STEAMERS COMING.—The steamer Polino, of the Dobell Line, is expected this evening. The steamer Tiber, of the same line, will be loading at Montreal on Monday next.

CHARLOTTETOWN ENGINEER CO. meets for drill this evening at 8 o'clock sharp, in uniform. A full attendance is requested. All rifles out must be returned to armory at once.

EGGS IN HALIFAX.—The Herald says: Nova Scotia stock are worth 14c. and 15c. but P. E. Island goods are dull at 14c. Halifax averages about 150 cases a week from P. E. Island, the Nova Scotia hen supplying not half the requirements of this city.

RACES AT SYDNEY.—The races at Sydney on Monday were well attended and proved most interesting. The free-for-all was won in three straight heats by Warren Guy, in 2:19, 2:19 and 2:21. Rock Farm Grace captured the 2:35 class, and Duke the 2:45 class.

THE BONAVISTA.—The Bonavista, sailing from Montreal on Friday morning, 22nd inst., will be due at Charlottetown on Monday morning, the 25th inst., and sails for St. John's, Nfld., via North Sydney. For further particulars see advertisement or apply to Peake Bros & Co.

A BIG PRICE.—The highest price of the season was paid for mackerel at Gloucester the other day. The fare of the schooner Kearsage was bid up to \$39.50 per bbl for large and \$18.25 per bbl for small fish by the Gloucester Mackerel Company. This is said to be the largest price on record for the same grade of small fish.—Fishing Gazette.

THE LAKE HURON.—The cargo space allotted to Charlottetown on the steamer Lake Huron is being rapidly taken up. The spar deck will carry about 1500 sheep, and this space has already been engaged. The main deck will accommodate about 100 cattle, and most of the space has already been engaged. Intending shippers will see the necessity of communicating at once with the agent here.

LADY BANKRUPTS.—London Empire: It is astonishing to see the number of ladies who get whitewashed in the Bankruptcy Court. Last year there were 433 lady bankrupts, and 397 of them were engaged in some trade. The three trades furnishing the largest number of failures among women are: Grocery 70, milliners 46 and drapers 49. Among the other unlucky ones were four lady butchers, two lady coal dealers; six fishmongers, seven jewelers, six lady plumbers, four saddlers and five tobacconists.

BRITISH POST OFFICE.—Postmaster General, the Duke of Norfolk, has shown a profit of nearly \$18,000,000 on the working of the British post office for the year ending last March. The number of packages of every kind delivered during the year was 3,496,000,900. London received 23,000,000 of the total letters posted. The thrift of the working classes is shown in the increase of post office saving bank deposits, which now stand at \$615,000,000. There was an increase of five per cent. in telegrams. The staff of the post office was increased by 10,000 during the year, and now stands at 160,000 of whom 32,000 are women.

LADY TO REST.—The funeral of the late Mrs. John Griffith took place this morning, leaving the house at 8.45 for St. Dunstan's Cathedral. A large number of citizens paid the last earthly tribute of respect to the deceased by following the hearse to the Roman Catholic cemetery, where the burial took place. Among the many tokens of sympathy received by the family was a handsome floral cross from the girls in Sentner, McLeod & Co's store, where a daughter of the deceased is employed. The pall was borne by James Byrne, D. O'M. Reddin, Patrick Clarkin, J. B. McDonald, William Wyatt and T. B. Riley. The funeral mass was celebrated by Father Johnston, who also officiated at the grave.
