

This week, the Militia of the City and Royalty, having completed their eighth days' training, were relieved from further attendance for the present. On Monday afternoon, His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief inspected the companies commanded by Captains Hales, J. Peake and G. Peake; on Tuesday afternoon, those commanded by Captains Cooper, McDonald, and Beer; and on Wednesday afternoon, those under the command of Captains Brecken and Dougherty. They were first exercised in company drill by their instructors, and then by Lieut. Col. McGill put through the elementary movements of battalion drill. Consider the short time the Militia have been under training, the degree of proficiency already attained is certainly very creditable as well as encouraging. Conspicuous among them, for steadiness, correctness, and rapidity of movement, were the men of Captain Brecken and Captain Hales' companies. The column having been formed at quarter distance on No. 1, His Excellency, at the close of the inspection each day, addressed them, and expressed the pride and gratification with which he viewed the progress they had made, and the readiness and alacrity with which they responded to the muster call. It was not only necessary to organize the Militia, but to keep up its efficiency. In discharging the duty which devolved on him, his desire was to entrench as little as possible on their time. This year he called them out for training in the leisure winter season. Next year he hoped he would be able to make an arrangement that would be still more convenient for them. In this Island we enjoyed many privileges, and we ought to be prepared, to the extent of our ability, to defend these privileges. Here every man has a voice in the government of the country, a small colony like Prince Edward Island could, of itself, do little or nothing against a powerful adversary, but if we did what we could, the help of England might always be relied upon. We had as good material for a militia force as Nova Scotia, New Brunswick or Canada, and there was no reason why we should, in matters affecting defence, lag behind these Colonies. In the course of his remarks, the Commander-in-Chief pointed out the necessity of obedience as an essential part of a soldier's discipline, and said he was glad to find that the men before him had, in this respect, set so good an example to the rest of their fellow-citizens. His Excellency also referred to Col. Smith, Inspecting Field Officer of Militia, and to Lieut. Col. McGill, and the officers of the 2d Queen's County Regiment, in very flattering terms—a compliment in which we may, we think, safely include Color Sergeants Wilnot and Irwin, of the 4th Regiment, and the other drill instructors.—Com. to Pat.

St. JOHN, April 6th, 1867.—London, 5th.—The estimated current income is sixty-nine millions: expenses, sixty-eight. New York, 5th.—The revolution in Hayti was of the most bloody kind. The loss on part of revolutionists is very heavy. The streets in Port au Prince were literally covered with the dead. An explosion on Clover Hill coal pit, Virginia, occurred on Wednesday. There were killed and buried 24 white and 50 coloured miners. The shafts were closed to extinguish the fire.—Gold 133 1/4. No despatches received for two days past. No boats crossing to-day.

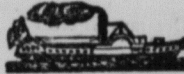

It is with the sincere desire of exciting pious sentiments in the hearts of the faithful, that the whole liturgy of the Church for the Holy Week has been collected in this volume; and is presented to the public, both in the Latin and English languages. Thus, while the pious Christian unites his voice with that of the Priest and of the choir, he may also penetrate the sense of the divine office, and sanction by the fervor of his heart what he pronounces with his tongue.
