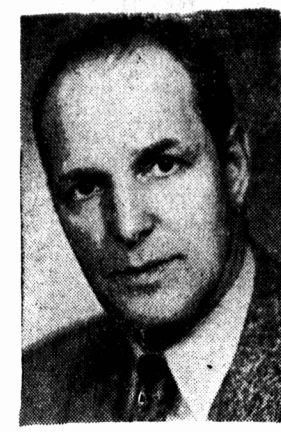


Speaks Tonight Over C J R W
