Pick Site For Trophy Race

TORONTO (CP) — The Canadian Yachting Association Saturday voted to hold the 1958 Duke of Edinburgh trophy race on Lake St. Louis, west of Montreal. The decision was made at its annual meeting after an invitation from the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club of Montreal. Date of the meet, which is for dragon-class craft, will be fixed later.

A special committee — formed at an earlier meeting and called the Canadian International Dragon Council — was asked by the CYA to draw up regulations covering future Edinburgh Trophy races. At present the race can only be held in Canadian waters.

The meeting also agreed to set up a trust fund, probably in Toronto, to help send crews and craft to Naples for the 1960 Olympic Games.

The Canadian Olympic Association is to be asked to allow yachts of the 5.5-metre class to race at the Olympics. These would be the largest vessels entered by Canada. Other Canadian classes to attend the games are the Dragon, the Finns, the star and the flying Dutchman.

Delegates, representing seven of the CYA's 38 member clubs, also passed a resolution asking the COA to investigate the possibility of including yachting at the 1959 Pan-American Games at Chicago.

Canadian Pro Football Took Two Major Steps On Friday

WINNIPEG (CP) — Canadian professional football took two major steps Friday—appointing a national commissioner and taking over complete control of the Grey Cup final.

Appointment of G. Sydney Halter, 52-year-old Winnipeg lawyer, as national commissioner was approved late Friday by the eastern Big Four. The Western Interprovincial Football Union will follow suit today and his appointment remains only a formality when the two leagues sit together Sunday in the windup of their three-day closed sessions.

The two professional unions earlier agreed to set up immediately a two-division Canadian Football League. The Big Four will be known as the Eastern Division and the WIFU the Western Division. The pros will maintain membership in the Canadian Rugby Union this year at least and they do not expect trouble from the CRU in taking over ticket distribution and all other arrangements of the East-West cup classic scheduled for Vancouver on Saturday, Nov. 29.

One Eastern delegate said the CRU, which possess the Grey Cup and has had control of the sudden-death playoff since the trophy was donated to amateur football in 1909, will allow the pros to continue playing for the historic cup.

"There may be opposition from some quarters within the CRU, but we feel confident that we will continue to play for the Grey Cup," he said.

Halter, whose salary as commissioner has been fixed but not disclosed, told the professionals that he would take the position on condition that he be given the same wide powers he possesses in his present position as commissioner of the WIFU and that he be allowed two assistants—one in the East and one in the West. These conditions were accepted. This means he has complete control over teams as a whole, club executives, managers, coaches, players and field officials. He also is sole arbitrator of all disputes.

(Judge Allan Fraser of Ottawa, who resigned earlier this year as commissioner of the Big Four, had authority over only paid personnel. He did not have the power

to fine or discipline unpaid team executives.)

WILL TAKE OVER FINAL

Halter also will take over operation of the Grey Cup final with power to name additional personnel to aid him in handling the annual spectacle. One person suggested as a paid assistant is Harry McBrien of Toronto, CRU secretary, who has handled distribution of tickets and organization of the game the last few years.

Ticket allotment has been a touchy question with both East and West since the final became big business in 1948. They have maintained the setup which calls for 30 per cent of the tickets going to each of the CRU, Big Four and WIFU and 10 per cent to the Ontario Rugby Football Union has been out of line. They believe the participating leagues should receive a much larger share to help satisfy the demands of season subscribers.
