The rapid development of a multiplicity of voluntary agencies in the welfare and health field in both Canada and the United States since the end of World War II points up a growing need for some system of priorities, the Montreal expert contended.

"Growing like Topsy" was still too true, in spite of the serious efforts that have gone into community planning during the past three or four decades.

Prince M. P. To Open S'side Lobster Carnival

SUMMERSIDE — Dr. Orville Phillips, M.P., for Prince County will officially open the 4th annual Summerside Lobster Carnival at 8 p.m. Wednesday, July 15th in the Civic Stadium, it was announced at a meeting of the central committee held last evening. Chairman Roy Johnston presided.

Amos Hubley made the announcement as chairman of the Board of Trade committee who contracted Mr. Phillips.

Carnival director Charles Hogan reported that it's expected the carnival will receive good television coverage and as well the National Film Board is sending photographers to make films for stations across Canada and in the United States.

Mr. Hogan said he had personally received over 200 requests for the carnival story booklet written by George Wotton and published free of charge by the P.E.I. Travel Bureau. He said these requests resulted from an ad placed in the Boston Herald.

Dave Carnegie, parade commander, reported 49 floats are expected to be in the mammoth parade on Thursday afternoon, along with six bands and six marching units. The parade, he said, will be divided into three sections with two bands and two marching units in each.

Mr. Carnegie stated he sincerely hoped the citizens of the town would decorate their homes in places of business with flags and bunting to help create a carnival atmosphere. He felt that word of mouth advertising in this respect will help to interest the citizen in creating their own individual decorating scheme to add to the gala atmosphere.

Ross MacKenzie told the committee that many Legion branches are taking a very active interest in the tug-of-war and several branches are holding their own elimination events to decide their representative team.

Ship Canal Delays Speeds Steel Deal

MONTREAL (CP)—Delays at the Welland Canal affecting ocean ships passing through the St. Lawrence Seaway have had the effect of speeding plans for basic steel production in the Contrecoeur - Vaernes - Vercheres area, informed sources said Thursday.

The area extends about 30 miles down the St. Lawrence River on the south shore and has been the scene of blossoming industry—light and heavy—during recent months.

At present vessels carrying iron ore are upstream stop at the transshipment dock at Contrecoeur of the Iron Ore Company of Canada. Cargoes are transferred to the big lake vessels heaving through the seaway, bound for steel-producing areas of the U.S. Midwest.

CUTS SHIPPING COSTS

Sources close to the situation said establishment of a basic steel industry in the Contrecoeur area would eliminate necessity of sending all iron ore through the seaway and the Welland Canal for processing into steel; would reduce over-all costs of steel production by eliminating ship passage to the Midwest.

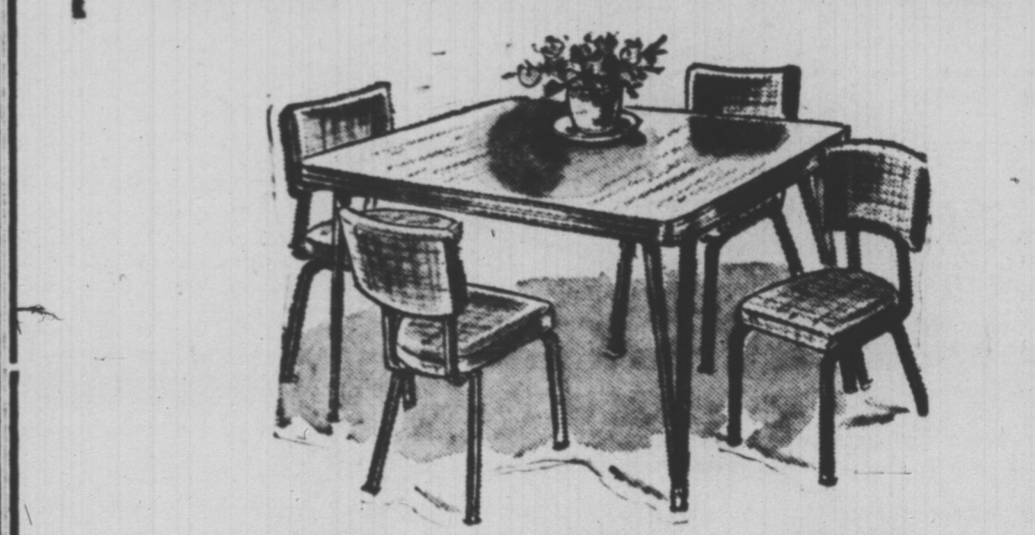
