PERSONAL.—His Worship the Mayor and Mrs. Carvell returned home yesterday morning.

REV. CHRISTOPHER MILLER, of Sackville, N. B., died on Saturday morning last. Mr. Miller was formerly Rector of Sackville, and for fifty-eight years in the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

PRODUCE.—In the Halifax Herald article on Finance and Commerce, we find the following paragraph:—

"Butter is slightly easier, with a good demand. Eggs are considerably higher and are eagerly enquired for. P. E. Island produce is low, and the large number of vessels now in port are doing quite a lively trade."

FIRE IN LIVERPOOL, N. S.—A fire broke out in Liverpool on Friday morning last. Ritchie's iron foundry, carpenter shop, blacksmith shop and their contents were entirely consumed. They were owned by C. H. M. Black, of Halifax. The loss is estimated at about \$20,000. There are 75 men thrown out of employment. The fire is supposed to have been caused by an incendiary.

PRESENTATION.—Mr. John U. Ross, Surveyor of the port of Halifax for some thirty years, having been superannuated, retires from the position which he has filled so long and so well. On Thursday evening the city lockers waited on Mr. Ross and presented him with an address and a handsome silver-headed cane, appropriately engraved. He was not expecting these testimonials, but spoke very feelingly in reply.—Hx. Chronicle.

THERE is now on exhibition at Medical Hall, the Gold Medal awarded to the Champion trotting stallion of the Island, by the managers of Upton Driving Park. The medal is of solid gold and is held by a hand some executed bridle-shaped pin. It bears the inscription "Champion Stallion Race, won by F. Hardy's Jeff" on one side, and on the other is inscribed: "Upton Park Races, Sept., 1877."

LOST OVERBOARD.—The schr. "Arctic" which arrived from Magdalen Islands on Thursday evening reports that when the vessel was between the Island and the East Point of P. E. Island, David Chaisson, while out on the jibboom, lost his balance, fell into the sea, and was drowned. Every effort was made to save him. The deceased was 20 years of age, and unmarried.—Hx. Herald.

LARCENY.—A man named Alex. McDonald was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate yesterday morning on a double charge of larceny. The first was for stealing a coat from the door of Chas. Full, and the second for stealing a coat from the door of S. W. McMurray. For the first, on acknowledging the charge, he got two months. This was on account of the coat lying at Mr. Full's door. For the second he got four months, the coat being hung on a rack.

FATHER GLACKMYER is a man of work, and must have an iron constitution to endure the physical and mental exertion he undergoes—no respite for him but work, work, work. He finished at St. Joseph's on Sunday morning, and opens another mission the same evening at seven o'clock in Dartmouth. The Dartmouth mission will close on Friday, 9th prox. Next day, he hurries by train to Charlottetown. P. E. L. were the mission opens on Sunday 11th, and will close on the 18th. Next day he returns to Halifax and resumes his work in this diocese.—Aedrian Recorder.

Local and Other Items.

MORE MEETINGS.—A meeting is to be held at Lot 14 on Saturday next, and another in Malpeque in a short time, to protest against the unjust taxes now being levied upon the country.

St. Mary's Episcopal Church will be reopened on Sunday next, the 11th inst. Several of our leading clergymen are expected to be in attendance. Collections taken morning and evening for the purpose of defraying some of the large expenses incurred by the building committee.—Progress.

In his sermon at the blessing of the Bell for the new Church of Saints Peter and Paul, at Summerside, his Lordship Bishop McIntyre paid a high compliment to Francis Malone, Esq., of DeSable, the generous donor of the Bell. His Lordship spoke of Mr. Malone as one of those warm-hearted sons of the Emerald Isle, who loved to do noble and generous deeds because of the Faith that is in them. The value of Mr. Malone's generous present to the Summerside Church is, we understand, in the neighborhood of \$300.—Summerside Progress.

MR. DEAN, a St. John butcher, who takes a great many sheep annually from the Island, came over this week. He says that our sheep this year are small and not prime, owing probably to insufficient care in breeding and scant pasturage; and reports a poor market for them this fall in St. John. Last year he took 1500 sheep from Prince County alone, they, with as many more from here, being consumed in St. John.—Pat.

A Toronto despatch of the 2nd says:— "A gale last night and to-day did damage to the shipping in the lakes. At Port Hope the schooner Alma, with coal, was driven ashore and is likely a total loss. Schooner Aloneda, of Buffalo, ran ashore at Port Glasgow and had her deck broken; she will probably break up. A three-masted schooner, supposed to be the J. C. Woodruff, went ashore outside of Port Colborne Piers to-night. The steam barge Swallow, of Detroit, missed Port Stanley Pier and went ashore at noon to-day. She lies easa in five feet of water.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, yesterday morning, John McLeod, for obstructing the police in the performance of their duties, was fined \$2 and costs or 14 days. Thomas Campbell, for accepting a watch for retailed liquor, case postponed. In this case it appears that the plaintiff, named Coyle, entered the saloon of the defendant on Monday morning and called for a drink. He did not pay for it but produced his watch and asked the defendant to take care of it, which he did. Afterwards, the plaintiff got another drink and on asking for the third, was refused. He therefore, left information that the defendant held his watch in pawn for drink, which charge the defendant has to answer. Patrick Connolly, or his bar-tender, for selling liquor out the Lord's Day—judgment reserved. Richard Thorn, appearing for the same offence, was fined \$1.60 for breaking the Sabbath by selling (Ginger Ale. R. Mitchell, for the same offence, was fined \$3.44. James McDonald, for allowing pigs to run at large in the street, was dismissed. Alex. McEachern, on complaint of S. W. McMurray for stealing a coat, was sentenced to four months' imprisonment with hard labor. James Fennessy, for assault on Neil McLeod, was postponed until to-day. Alexander McEachern on complaint of Charles Full, for stealing a coat, was sentenced to two months imprisonment with hard labor.

A Bye-Law Relating to Commercial Travellers.

Be it Enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown, as follows:—

AFTER the passing of this Bye-Law, no Commercial Traveller or Agent, who is not a rate-payer to the said City, shall offer for sale or sell, within the said City, any kind or description of goods, wares or merchandize, either by samples or otherwise, without first obtaining a License from the City of Charlottetown for the purpose, such License to be under the Seal of the said City, and signed by the Mayor and City Clerk; and for the granting of such License the applicant shall pay to the City of Charlottetown the sum of Fifty Dollars, to be paid to the City Treasurer, to become part of the revenues of the City.

This Bye-Law shall not apply to any person resident in this Province, bringing produce, provisions, fuel or supplies, nor to any person who may be bringing fuel or agricultural produce to the City.

Any person violating this Bye-Law shall be subject to, and liable to pay a fine of, not less than Twenty-five Dollars nor more than Fifty Dollars, in addition to the License fee, for each offence,—to be prosecuted by any party who may inform, in the name of the City of Charlottetown; and, on conviction and non-payment of the fine imposed, imprisonment for not more than thirty days in the Charlottetown prison; and the trial of any such offender shall take place before the Stipendiary Magistrate of the City of Charlottetown, in the City Court, and the fine shall be paid to the City Treasurer. Passed 22nd October, 1877.
