The Water Question.

We greatly regret that, after all that is past and in full view of a still further increase of the rates of insurance, the citizens of Charlottetown are not yet ready to begin taking steps to secure a supply of water.

But, let us view the situation in the light of their illiberal offer. We now pay, in insurance premiums, \$38,344.14 a year; and in a few days the rates will be raised to such an extent that we shall next year be compelled to pay—supposing that our policies are as at present—\$46,012.96.

Now, the expense of a supply of water for fire purposes will be \$2,500, and if tenders were called for the service even better terms than these may be obtained; a fire alarm telegraph may be put up so the committee say, for \$1,200, equal to about \$75 a year; and suppose we increase the expenditure on account of our Fire Department by \$1,000 a year, a sum which ought to raise the Department to a fair state of efficiency, especially if the water supply is obtained and the work of the Department thereby reduced—the additional expenditure required annually in order to meet the views of the Underwriters will be:—

In return for which we shall be relieved of insurance to the value of 14,059.51

On the basis of the figures submitted by Buchanan & Co., by the Waterworks Committee, and by the Board of Underwriters, this is how the matter will affect the Corporation. The ratepayers will have to pay \$3,575 more in the shape of taxes, and they will pay \$14,059.51 less in the shape of fire premiums!

Nuisances.

If the editor of the Patriot will but put on his best spectacles and refer to the Nuisance Act, passed last Session, as published in the last number of the Royal Gazette, he will, no doubt, be able to see and read for himself the following section:—

3. After such date (June 1st, 1884), no cess pool, ash-pit, manure-pit or other place for the reception of slops, washings or drainings, shall be used in the said City of a greater depth than two feet below the surface of the ground, and all such cess-pools, ash-pits, manure-pits, or other receptacles as aforesaid, as are of a greater depth, shall before that date, be thoroughly cleaned and filled up with ashes or clean clay.

The italics are ours. He will also be able to read, immediately after the section quoted by him last night,—

2. After such date (1st June) there shall only be used for such purpose (i. e. the purpose of a privy) properly constructed drawers or boxes, over or let into the soil to the depth aforesaid, which said drawers or boxes shall, at such intervals of time as they shall severally require it, or as ordered by the Board of Health of the said City, be emptied and thoroughly cleaned, and the contents thereof, with all convenient despatch, deposited outside the City limits.

And again,— "6. Any person or persons guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this Law shall, upon conviction in the City Court of the Stipendiary Magistrate, on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the said Magistrate, a penalty not exceeding thirty dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof, it shall and may be lawful for the said Magistrate to commit the offender or offenders to the common jail of the said City, for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid."

After reading these sections he must be convinced (i. e. if he is open to conviction) that it is the Patriot which is wrong about this matter, and that THE EXAMINER is right, as usual.

While delivering the prizes His Honor paid special compliments to Gordon Laird, a lad of sixteen, and the winner of the Governor General's medal; to George Sutherland, the best pupil teacher and the best essayist; to Miss Hunter, whose manner of reading and pronunciation he declared excellent, anything "Steeple Cleydon" might say to the contrary, notwithstanding; to William Townsend for the high position he had gained by his diligence, in the esteem of his teachers, and to Mary McLeod for the marked ability she had displayed in the examination of a class. In the course of a short address His Honor said the examination had afforded him a great deal of satisfaction. He reviewed the subjects of the examination, referring particularly to the correctness and ease with which (for an Islander) Professor LePage spoke and taught the French language, to the practical value to this Province of the lessons in music of one so highly gifted as Professor Caven, and also to the great importance to this Agricultural Province of the study of Agricultural Chemistry as taught by Professor Anderson. His Honor said that he hoped, before he went to the bourse from which no traveller ever returns, to see a new building erected worthy of the chief institution in our educational system, and worthy of the Province.

Hon. D. Laird said that what he seen at the Examination was very satisfactory indeed. He was particularly struck with the excellence of the reading—the pronunciation was good, and the readers entered into the spirit of the passages read. Some persons, he said, objected to our professors, because they are not graduates of universities, and have not M. A. and B. A. tacked on to their names. But we have a better guarantee of their ability in the work they have done than we could have in piles of sheepskins. The renowned Professor Dawson had voluntarily told him that among the best prepared students who come to McGill University are those who graduate from Prince of Wales College; and Principal Ross, of Dalhousie College had testified to him in the same terms; and having this evidence he felt sure that those who say the Prince of Wales College "must go" will be disappointed. The college building he said is altogether inadequate and should be replaced by a larger and better one.

Hon. Senator Haythorne said he was very glad indeed to see that the College shows no sign of decadence, and in the course of a very interesting speech discussed several questions connected with the work of education in the Island, concluding with the hope that a better College building would, ere long, be provided.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. Banking.

Str.—By the Canadian Banking Act, Cap. XI., 33 Vic., it appears by the following clause that parties holding paper belonging to a bank having their head office outside of Prince Edward Island appear to be at a very great disadvantage:—"The Bank shall always receive in payment its own notes at par, at any of its offices, and whether they be made payable or not; but shall not be bound to redeem them in specie or Dominion notes at any place other than where they are made payable. The place, or one of the places at which the notes of the Bank shall be made payable shall always be its chief seat of business."

Is such still the law? Perhaps the Inspector of the Bank of Nova Scotia, now here, can answer.

RICHIBUCTO, N. B., May 29. The Norwegian bark Albertine, 544 tons, from Liverpool, consigned to George McLeod, was totally wrecked last night, during the gale on the south reef, inside of Richibucto harbor. The ship's papers and crew's clothing were lost. The crew got ashore with great difficulty, and nearly perished. Icebergs were the cause of the wreck.

An Embezzler Arrested. WASHINGTON, May 29. J. O. P. Burnsides, disbursing clerk of the Post Office Department, was arrested to-day on a charge of having embezzled forty-five thousand dollars. He confessed, stating that he had lost the money in stock speculations.
