Arrest Is Made In S'side Theft

A rash of car thefts in the Summerside area is keeping police busy as some unauthorized person or persons insists on joy-riding.

A 1957 Plymouth owned by Alex MacKenzie of Summerside West was stolen on Christmas Eve and recovered by police on Christmas morning.

On Saturday evening a car was taken from the lot at F. Earle MacDonald Ltd., Summerside East, but was stopped the same evening on Park Street by Mr. MacDonald's son, Byron Macdonald. Police took the driver into custody and he is slated to appear in court today.

In the latest case the thief or thieves seem to be of the sporting set. They stole a 1958 Kar-

man Ghia, a sports model Volkswagen, belonging to Mrs. Reginald Pope of St. Eleanors and driven by Nancy Pope. The car, bearing license number 18-960, was stolen from the driveway of the Grant Mollison residence on Granville Street.

One of the reported thefts was a false alarm however. Police recovered a 1953 Dodge that was reported stolen on Christmas Eve and believe that the owner merely forgot where he parked it.

To date, only one person has been apprehended in connection with the thefts, and is being held in connection with the theft of the car from the MacDonald lot. Whether he is connected with any or all of the other thefts is not known at present.

New performance records were chalked up in the month ending Dec. 15th by nine Prince Edward Island registered Ayrshires according to information released in the December issue of the Ayrshire Review.

In the Mature Class, Meadowview Princess 15, owned by J.A. (Continued from page 1) against dollar-country exports was being steadily eliminated.

In the early stages of the world expansion, many countries including the U.S. had relied to a large extent on their own resources of industrial materials.

"However, further growth of production in industrial countries is likely to be accompanied by increasing reliance upon Canadian as well as other outside sources of supply."

Expanded exports would have a dual stimulus in Canada: employing recently-created facilities in export industries, and reinforcing the trend to higher-capital investment.

EXPORTS UP

Exports would rise about five per cent to a record total of about \$5,200,000,000 for the year, with most of the gain in shipments to the United States. Import figures to the end of October showed a 9 1/2-per-cent rise, Britain's share of Canada's import market had risen to 10.4 per cent from 9.3 per cent two years ago, while the U.S. share had declined in the two-year period to 68.3 per cent from 71.1.

Canada's deficit in trade and other payments with other countries reached \$1,119,000,000 in the first nine months of the year compared with \$788,000,000 a year earlier.

DeGaulle Loses Young Brother

PARIS (AP)—Pierre de Gaulle, younger brother of President Charles de Gaulle, died Saturday night after undergoing surgery for a circulatory ailment.

Pierre de Gaulle was 62, seven years younger than his brother. President de Gaulle had hastened back to Paris earlier in the day from his country home in eastern France and went at once to the hospital where his brother was a patient.

Pierre was an army officer in both world wars and later engaged in public life. He served several times as president of the Paris municipal council. As a member of Charles de Gaulle's Rally of the French People, he was elected to the senate. Later he served as a deputy in the National Assembly.

He served as an artillery captain in the Second World War until the Germans occupied France. Then he returned to his profession as a banker until the Germans caught up with his resistance activity.

Arrested by the Gestapo, he was imprisoned in Paris and later in Czechoslovakia, where he was liberated by the allied advance.

THE MILK PROTECTION ACT

Take notice milk distributors and vendors in Charlottetown and Summerside areas that by Order No. 47 of the Prince Edward Island Milk Control Board passed on the 25th day of November A.D. 1959, the price of blend cream beginning January 1st, 1960 shall be as follows:

Minimum fat 8%
Retail per quart 40c Wholesale per quart 38c
Retail per pint 20c Wholesale per pint 19c
Retail per half pint 11c Wholesale per half pint 10c

The price of the producer of standard milk manufactured into blend shall be paid for at \$1.20 per pound butterfat.

All milk received from producers in the areas of Charlottetown and Summerside shall be paid for at the rate of \$1.20 per pound butterfat.

The price of milk in quart paper containers shall be 3c higher, wholesale and retail, than the price charged for milk in quart glass containers.

The price per quart of homogenized-pasteurized milk in bulk dispenser cans delivered to restaurants, hospitals, hotels, motels and the R. C. A. F. Station in St. Eleanors shall be:—

(a) When the distributor owns and maintains the dispenser 20c
(b) Where the purchaser owns and maintains the dispenser, 19c

The price per quart of pasteurized-homogenized milk delivered to the National Park area in refrigerated trucks shall be 3c higher than the price delivered in Charlottetown and Summerside areas.
