Pullets Should be Laying.
Young pullets hatched in March and
April ought not to be laying this month.
Later hatched ones if not laying in Novem-
ber will probably lay in themselves, not
lay before spring when eggs are down to
fifteen cents per dozen. A well known
poultry farmer showed us his account for
December with 125 pullets. The net profit
for that month from eggs alone was \$39.29;
from the same pullets in April following,
the profit was \$14.97, and he got 50 dozen
more eggs in April than in December.

WOMEN AND WORK.
Prof. Ferrero's Interesting Reason Why
the Fair Sex Should Not Labor.
"The problem of woman from a biologi-
cal point of view" is treated by Sig.
G. Ferrero in the *Monist*. "The essential
condition of feminine existence," which he
desires to analyze in his paper, is that
which he names "The Law of Non-Labor."
"As it is a natural law that the man
must labor and struggle to live, so it is a
natural law that the woman should neither
labor nor struggle for existence. Biologi-
cal science clearly shows us that the physiologi-
cal prosperity of species depends on the
division of labor between the sexes, for in
exact ratio to this is the duration of life."
Marriage, as found among the higher
animals, is "a perfected form of the divi-
sion of labor and mutual co-operation of
the sexes." During hatching time the male
bird does all the providing for his brood-
ing mate. At other times her functions in
seeking food are merely auxiliary. Simi-
larly with man and woman. The female
work which falls to the savage woman the
writer pronounces to be "merely a passing
phase, a very dangerous aberration, pro-
duced by the excessive selfishness of man,
which does not and cannot last long." He
remarks that the races in which it is found
"have remained in a savage state and have
made scarcely any progress."
In civilized nations female toil is not
necessary for the production of the weak
need for humanity. Man alone could do
it. Woman labor only to the extent of
the marketable value of male labor, for
while woman is working in the factories
there are everywhere, and especially in
Europe, crowds of men vainly seeking em-
ployment, to whom the occasion of work
is an infrequent and terrible evil. This
shows that, even from a sociological point
of view, female labor is a pathological
phenomenon.
"Statistics show us an increase of mor-
tality among women and children in coun-
tries where industrial life has pressed
mothers into its ranks. A perfect woman
should be a chief d'oeuvre of grace and
refinement, and to this end she must be
exempt from toil. The working woman
grows ugly and loses her feminine charac-
teristic. Womanly grace and the love
which men bear a beautiful woman have
perhaps been the origin of paternal love,
and of all the other sweet and tender feel-
ings of which the male is capable. Grace
is the chief side of woman's nature. More
than man, enjoys all the benefits of
civilization, which nevertheless have been
in great part acquired by him alone. Man
labors and toils to-day just as he did of
old, and there is nothing abnormal in this
fact for it is the natural order of things.
"What advantage, then, can be gained
by participating in man's struggle for ex-
istence, when woman has only to wait un-
til he places these benefits at her feet? I
cannot understand why the question of
woman's labor should excite public opin-
ion. It is entirely pointless to her. If
her husband strains every nerve already
to provide her with all the luxuries of life,
he will certainly not be lax in defending
those interests which are identical with
those of his family."
Some Curious Trees.
On the Canary Island grows a fountain
tree—a tree most needed in some parts
of the island. It is said that the leaves con-
stantly distill enough water to furnish
drink to every living creature in Hiero;
nature having provided this remedy for
the drought of the island. Every morning,
near this part of the island, a cloud
or mist rises from the sea, which the
winds force against the steep cliffs on which
the tree grows, and it is from the mist
the tree distills the water.
China, too, claims her remarkable tree.
This is known as the fallow tree, so called
from the fact of its yielding a substance
like tallow, and which serves the same
purpose, is of the same consistency, color
and smell. On the island of Llewellyn
grows a tree about the size of a common
cherry tree, which possesses the peculiar-
ity of changing the color of its blossoms.
At one time the flower assumes the tint
of the lily, and again shortly takes the
color of the rose. In Thibet there is a curious
tree known as the tree of the thousand
images; its leaves are covered with well-
defined characters of the Tibetan alpha-
bet. It is of great size, and the only one
of its kind known there.
The caob tree is considered one of the
most wonderful of the vegetable kingdom.
It appears that nothing can kill this tree;
hence it reaches an astonishing age as well
as an enormous size. The natives make
a strong cord from the fibers of the bark;
hence the trees are continually barked, but
without damage, as they soon put forth
a new bark. It appears impervious to fire
and even the axe is resisted, as it continues
to grow in length while it is lying on the
ground.
In Mexico there is a plant known by the
name of Palo de Lecho. It belongs to the
family of euphorbia. The Indians throw
the leaves into the water and the fish be-
come stupefied and rise to the surface and
are then caught by the natives. In this
case the effect of the narcotic soon passes
off. The milk of this plant thrown upon
the fire gives out fumes that produce
nausea and headache. The milk taken in-
ternally is a deadly poison; it will pro-
duce death or insanity according to the size
of the dose. There is a popular belief among
the lower class in Mexico that the insanity
of the ex-Emperor Carlotta was caused by
this poison.—San Jose (Cal.) Mercury.
