

Als Batter Stamps 26-15; Ottawa, Hamilton Win

In the three Canadian Football League games played Saturday, Montreal Alouettes battered the Calgary Stampeders 26-15, Ottawa Rough Riders defeated Toronto Argonauts 17-8 and Hamilton Tiger-Cats took a decisive 28-7 victory over the Eskimos in Edmonton.

The Alouettes struck for 13 points in the fourth quarter in a dreary interlocking game. A fourth-quarter field goal by Peter Kempf sewed up the Montreal victory. He connected to wipe out a 15-14 deficit. A bid by substitute quarterback

Peter Liske to launch a comeback bid with a fumble on the Montreal one-yard line.

The Alouettes received two touchdowns from Don Lisbon and one from quarterback Bernie Faloney. Kempf picked up two converts. Faloney delivered a quick kick for a single and Gino Berretta added two others on third-down punts.

Liske ran 10 yards for one Calgary touchdown and passed to Howard Starks for a second. Larry Robinson converted both and kicked a second-quarter single.

At Edmonton, the Eskimos lost two early chances to score and were then dominated for the rest of the game by Hamilton's big defensive line.

Edmonton led 1-0 after the first quarter but the Ticats bounced back for a 15-7 lead at the half. They extended the margin to 25-7 after three quarters, then rounded out the scoring with a field goal in the final frame.

In Toronto, the Ottawa Rough Riders played only as hard as necessary to defeat Toronto Argonauts.

Russ Jackson at quarterback directed Ottawa's attack with a variety of dangle plays and long passes. He also scored one of the Riders' two touchdowns.

Fullback Jim Dillard scored the other touchdowns. Moe Racine rounded out the scoring for the Riders with a 17-yard goal and a single when a field goal attempt was wide.

Halfback Larry Ferguson accounted for Toronto's lone touchdown. John Vilunas kicked

a convert and Dave Mann booted a 45-yard single.

TORONTO (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders played only as hard as they had to and defeated the cellar-dwelling Toronto Argonauts 17-8 in an Eastern Football Conference game Saturday night.

A crowd of 20,786 saw the league-leading Rough Riders extend their season's record to 9-1 while Argonauts suffered their eighth loss in 10 starts.

Quarterback Russ Jackson directed Ottawa with a variety of plays and long passes. He also scored one of the Riders' two touchdowns.

Fullback Jim Dillard, who was a doubtful starter before the game, scored Ottawa's other touchdown.

Moe Racine scored on a 17-yard field goal, a convert and a single when a second field goal attempt was wide.

Halfback Larry Ferguson, in his first start for Argos after being sidelined in a pre-season game, accounted for Toronto's touchdown. John Vilunas kicked a convert and Dave Mann booted a 45-yard single.

The first half of the game was dull as Rough Riders led 6-1 and appeared content with ball control until the half.

STANISH THROWS

Saints Defeat Dalhousie In First Homer Of Season

The Saint Dunstan's University Saints whipped the Dalhousie Tigers 49-23 in a Blue-nose Conference football game Saturday afternoon at the SDU Varsity field. This was the first home game of the season for the Saints and they were out for blood after their loss in the last two minutes of the UNB game last weekend in Fredericton.

In the opening minutes of the first quarter, Dalhousie forced the local club to give up a two point safety touch but that was as far as the Tigers were concerned for the Saints immediately rallied and began an eighty-five yard march down the field which resulted in a touchdown off a broken play when John Kinsella, being pulled down for no gain, flipped the ball to Quarterback Jim Foley who slipped into the end zone to give SDU the lead. From this point on, the game was a case of the local Varsity racking up points and at one or two points in the game, desperately fighting to keep their lead.

Early in the second quarter, Cy MacDonald, on a handoff from Foley, faked out his tacklers, swept left to pick up his blockers, then went right on a fifty-four yard run for a touchdown. Kinsella made the convert. Soon after, the tremendous passing team of Foley and Owen Jay clicked for two quick touchdowns, the first from the Dal fifteen, the second from the twenty-seven. The Saints, whose convert kicking was haphazard throughout the game, missed the first convert but Hubley ran for a two point conversion on the second.

With the score 27-2, the game seemed to be in the bag, but the Tigers, led by Quarterback Bill Stanish, easily the best Dalhousie player on the field, put together a serious threat late in the second quarter and came through with two converted touchdowns, both on Quarterback sneaks by Stanish. Guy Mosland converted both times. This combination brought Dal back into the game for an end of half score of 27-16.

The Tigers kept up the pressure going into the third quarter and worked down to the two yard line from which Stanish

dove across for his third touchdown. Mosland's convert closed the Saints' lead to a slim four points. Kinsella nailed Stanish late in the third quarter for a rouge, bringing the score to 26-23.

The Saints entered the final quarter with the threat of another UNB over their heads. One touchdown by Dal would have given them the lead and would have broken the spirit of the keyed up SDU club. Kinsella broke the spell early in the quarter however on a three-yard plunge across the line into the end zone to put the game to bed.

Dal went to the air in a desperate attempt to overtake the Saints but their play was erratic and the SDU secondary tightened to stave off the threat. Chris Annett intercepted one Stanish throw on the Dal fifteen and ran it back to the six. On the next play, Foley sent Kinsella off-tackle for his second touchdown. The last scoring play came when Larry DiMarco intercepted a Dal screen pass and raced thirty yards into the end zone.

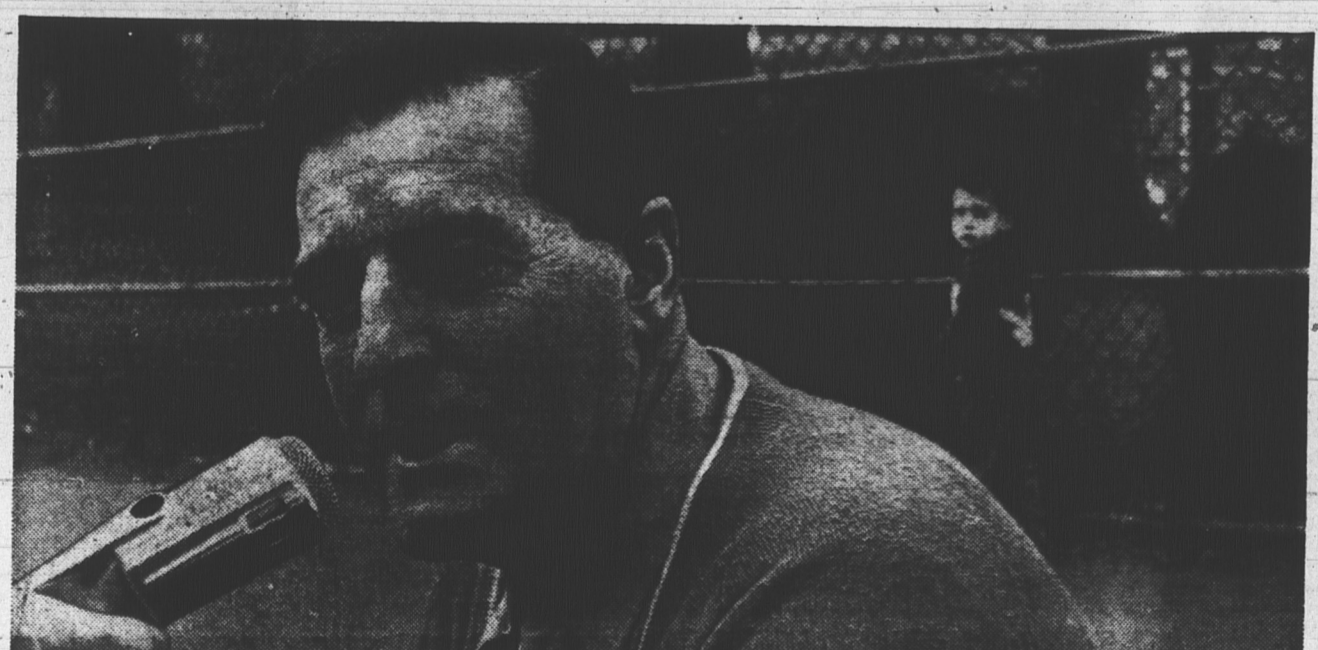
