ANGLO-AMERICAN ALLIANCE

Lord Charles Beresford Strongly Favors it.

Would be a Powerful Factor for Peace.

LONDON, March 18.—Rear Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, member of Parliament for the city of York, in an interview warmly advocated an Anglo-American alliance as a move in the direction of peace and calculated to immensely develop trade. He added, "such an alliance is natural and I believe that the mere fact of its conclusion would deter others from attacking any inadequately defended interest of either country. Now is the time to accomplish it when the advantages are apparent in both countries. An Anglo-American alliance would be the most powerful factor in the world for peace and the development of commerce."

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Mr. McDonald Wants to Know about the Dredge.

No Sunday Papers to be Sold in Canada.

OTTAWA, March 18.—Mr. Charlton's Sunday Bill went through committee of the House of Commons yesterday. Hon. Mr. Fisher to help the bill through withdrew his amendment which prohibited the sale in Canada, on any day, of papers issued on Sunday.

Dr. Montague said that the bill did not amount to anything without Mr. Fisher's amendment and proposed one to the same effect which was carried. The bill was reported without further change.

As it stands, the bill now forbids the sale in Canada of all Sunday papers.

Mr. Macdonald, of P. E. Island, wants information about the operation and maintenance of the Dredge Prince Edward and about the cost of straightening the curves on the P. E. Island Railway.

OPINION IN MADRID.

The Maine was not Blown up from the Outside.

A Demand For Indemnity will be Refused.

MADRID, March 18.—In a semi-official note just issued, the following appears: "It may be regarded as certain that should the American technical commission present a report declaring the disaster to be due to an external explosion, the public here will refuse to accept such a finding, and any demand for an indemnity based thereon will be indignantly repulsed by Spain."

WASHINGTON, March 16.—The Spanish government has made two important demands upon the United States. The first is that the United States fleet at Key West and Tortugas be withdrawn, and the second is that an explanation be given of the purchase of two warships abroad.

HON JOHN YEO !

Takes Leave of the House of Commons.

NOW ON HIS WAY HOME.

Will Take Part in the West Prince Election.

OTTAWA, March 17.—Mr. Yeo, M. P., is not expected to again appear in the House of Commons. When he went away yesterday to go into the West Prince Campaign he took a final leave of the chamber though not of the Parliament building's.

It is well understood that when he comes back it will be to take the seat in the Senate formerly occupied by the Late Mr. Arsenault.

OTTAWA, March 18.—The appointment of Mr. Yeo to the Senate which is understood to be already settled is regarded with favor here.

Sackville, N. B. March 18.—Hon. Mr. Yeo arrived here yesterday afternoon and left by special train for Tormentine to cross to cross today.

GENERAL MILES' OPINION.

A Very Serious Situation.

The United States Prepared for any Emergency.

NEW YORK, March 18.—Major General Miles returned from Washington yesterday. Before taking his departure, General Miles was asked what he thought concerning the war situation.

He replied reflectively: "It is very hard to foretell just what will happen. Matters look very serious. But this country is prepared for any emergency."

A NEW SQUADRON.

To be Stationed at Hampton Roads

WASHINGTON, March 18.—A new squadron of naval vessels to be stationed at Hampton Roads has been ordered. Hampton Roads is the estuary of the James River, situate between the towns of Hampton and Norfolk in Virginia. Its importance is due to its proximity to Forts Monroe and Calburn.

LONDON, March 15.—Cambridge university sent last week an exploring expedition to Torres Strait. The expedition is under the command of Dr. A. Haldon, professor of zoology in the Royal College of Science, Dublin, and lecturer on anthropology at Cambridge. He goes first to Torres Strait and afterwards to Barram, in Central Borneo, his object being to investigate the physical characteristics of the natives, their mental condition, folklore, songs and language, as affected by geographical environment.

LONDON, March 16.—A Hong Kong despatch says news has been received from Philippines that the Europeans at the Boliabo telegraph stations are safe. A detachment of Spanish troops there was surprised by the rebels, and forty were massacred, while the garrison and priests of the neighboring villages were dispersed or killed. Gen. Moret relieved Boliabo after five engagements.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 16.—A three-masted schooner which sailed out of the Seacoast river yesterday morning has been a source of speculation among the inhabitants of Tiverton and Little Compton. The vessel is a fair sized schooner, named the Annie P. Chase. A week ago she sailed up the river to the point called Fogland, where she anchored again. It is said by some of the dwellers on the shore that a small steamer visited her about 12 o'clock every night, and the natives are of the opinion that she is a filibusterer.

WASHINGTON, March 16.—The construction of modern dry docks was agreed on yesterday by the house committee on naval affairs. They are to be located at Portsmouth, Boston, League Island, near Philadelphia, Algiers, near New Orleans, and Mare Island, near San Francisco.

NEW YORK, March 16.—A Key West despatch to the World says: British and American tars are fraternizing in the friendliest manner in Key West. They promenaded the streets arm in arm, ride in the same phaetons, refresh themselves at the same bars and come in together on the choruses of the same songs. This has been going on ever since the arrival here of the British warship Cordelia.

Almost ever since there has been such a thing as an American navy the arrival together in the same port of an American and a British warship has been the occasion of fights between the crews. For that reason the present friendly feeling between English and American sailors is regarded as significant. There is method in it, so naval officers are saying.
