FRANCE AND SIAM.

SITUATION AGAIN STRAINED.

An Insulting Note.

LONDON, Sept. 28. A special despatch to the Times, from Bangkok, says that the situation growing out of the Franco-Siamese dispute is again strained, owing to the dictatorial attitude of M. Devillers, the French special envoy.

Sir John Thompson on Temperance.

TORONTO, Sept. 28. At Stratford, yesterday, Sir John Thompson said, that having been requested to speak on the temperance question, he could say nothing definite pending a report of the prohibition commission, but that in proper time the Government would declare their policy in the matter and stand or fall by it, without having occasion to apologise.

The Lost Russian Warship.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28. Naval authorities have finally and reluctantly concluded that the warship Rozalka, which sailed some days ago from Revel for Belsingfors, has gone to the bottom with her crew of two hundred.

The Late Judge Patterson's Will.

OTTAWA, Sept. 28. Probate of the will of the late Judge Patterson, of the Supreme Court, was granted to-day. The estate is sworn at \$38,000.

Cholera in St. Petersburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28. Sixty new cases of cholera and twenty-two deaths were reported here yesterday.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

AMHERST, Sept. 25.—From the vicinity of that enterprising manufacturing town of Oxford comes the report that the green goods men have been plying their trade, and in some instances successfully. One gentleman from the sporting town of River Phillip was called in and shown a number of packages done up, representing \$1,000 each, one of which the shoppers opened and counted out ten good ten dollar bills, showing how near the genuine their goods were. They offered him ten dollars for the lot, but he refused to take the River Phillip man, having been a diligent reader, was forewarned. They have since removed to some other scene of action.

CALCUTTA, Sept. 26.—Advice received here from Persia show that for two weeks past cholera has been ravaging the towns and villages along the eastern shore of the Persian gulf. Several villages have been completely deserted, the inhabitants having fled into the interior to escape the dreaded scourge that worked such havoc last year in that locality. It is believed that these fugitives have carried cholera germs with them and that their flight will result in a wide dissemination of the disease. At Kazero, a province of Farsan, a considerable distance inland from the gulf, there are many deaths from cholera daily.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.—Professor Sams, director of the experimental farm, has received a letter today from Mr. Wolverton, superintendent of the Dominion fruit exhibit, at the World's fair, stating that the mammoth apple, which the professor discovered at Spence's Bridge, B. C., and sent to the fair was the cynosure of all eyes, it being the largest apple shown there, and completely put in the shade the mammoth production from Arkansas, weighing 20 ounces. The British Columbia product is 19 inches in circumference, and weighs 241 ounces. It is of German origin, and is known by the name of Red Beighlinter. Apples of this variety have been successfully raised at the Central experimental farm. This is a country of mammoth productions—first class, now apples.

HALIFAX, Sept. 26.—For considerable time here the city has been exercised over the sudden removal of Stephen Tobin, once Mayor of Halifax and M. P. for the county, from the management of the Maritime Branch of the Queen Fire Insurance company of London, carrying local risks to the extent of hundreds of thousands of dollars. Mr. Tobin's occupation of the agency dates back thirty years, Inspector Mackenzie came here unexpectedly from Liverpool and shortly afterwards suspended Mr. Tobin, and appointed Charles Evans manager in his stead pending an investigation. Examination of the books revealed the fact that the business had been conducted for some time past in a very slipshod manner. Various rumors said there was a shortage of \$25,000 discovered, but it is denied that the situation is as serious as that.

Milk tests have been made among the cows of the various factories and awards made in favor of the subscriber sending in the best milk. In the Vernon River contest, as might be expected, the award is in favor of the Rev. Dr. Dove, the milk of whose Jersey herd was found to contain a fully five per cent of fat. The Dr. has a beautiful herd of those fine animals which are the admiration of all who pass by his farm. They are nearly all registered and as pretty as pictures. We congratulate the Dr. on their possession, as also upon the public spirit-ness which puts him in the forefront of every movement undertaken in the interests of the country at large. Of course it pays to breed purely, or will pay when our people come to understand what they want to succeed in dairying, but it is also well to give a meed of praise, where great praise is due.
