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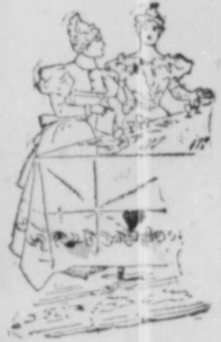

Edward Bayfield, Esq., also contributes an exceedingly interesting article on "P. E. Island Coins," in circulation in the days not long gone by. "Duvar as a Poet" is the title of a short article by Mr. W. L. Cotton, whose copious extracts enable the reader to judge for himself the poetry of one, but lately among us, who has left, "something so written to aftertimes, as they should not willingly let die." A bright article entitled "Insula Felix" is capably written; and it, we note, is to be continued. "A Side Talk With the Sports," Topics of the "Times," Local Happenings, etc., make up a creditable first number of The Prince Edward Island Magazine,—not to speak of the poems which are of a high order. We hope that this magazine will be encouraged.
