CHEESE AND BUTTER.

Steady Market For Both Products —

The Prices.

According to the latest Star the Montreal cheese market was firm on Monday with little business going on. Fine western cheese is only nominal. It is considered however, that Septembers should bring from 11 1/2 to 11 3/4 cents. Octobers being worth probably half a cent less. Quebees are worth 10 1/2 to 10 7/8, and easterns 10 7/8 to 11 cents. Cheese sold at 10 1/2 to 11 7-16 on Ontario boards on Saturday. The market is dull, and English advices report an easier feeling there.

The Star also reports the butter market steady and firm. Finest creameries are quoted from 20 1/2 to 21c, but it is said that really fancy goods would command even higher.

The cheese shipment from Montreal last week were only 23,907 boxes, compared with 38,777 bxs in the corresponding week last year, and of butter 4,340 pkgs, compared with 16,161. For the whole season the cheese shipments have thus far been 1,670,475 bxs, compared with 1,676,410 and of butter 431,761 pkgs, compared with 241,267 for the like period last year.

PORK AND ITS PRODUCTS

Fair Trade in Montreal—Chicago and Liver-pool Prices.

The Gazette says there was no change in the Montreal provision market on Monday. The demand for small lots was fair at the following quotations: Canadian short cut mess pork, \$16; short cut back, \$15 50; selected heavy short cut boneless mess \$16 50; and heavy long cut mess, \$15 00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard, in pairs, 7c to 7 1/2c per lb; and compound refined at 5 1/2c to 5 3/4c per lb. Hams, 12c to 13 1/2c, and bacon, 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb.

In Chicago pork advanced 5c to 7 1/2c, closing \$8 05 October, \$8 17 1/2 December, 9 70 January, \$9 80 May. Lard declined 2 1-2c, closing \$5 17 1/2 October, \$5 20 December, \$5 37 1/2 January. Short ribs closed \$4 85 October, \$4 87 1/2 December, \$4 87 1/2 January.

There was no change in the Liver-pool provision market. Prime western pork, 56s 3d; prime western lard, 28s; American refined lard, 29s 9d; long cut light bacon, 32s; long cut heavy, 31s; short cut heavy, 30s; Australian tallow, 27s 3d; American, good to fine, 24s 9d.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

Slight Advance in Eggs—Cheese Not So High.

The buyers do not report any great change in the movement of produce since last week. They are still paying 16c for what potatoes are off-rind, and for what oats are coming in they give from 27c to 27 1/2c. Eggs have advanced half a cent, 14c being the price now offered. The price of live hogs ranges from \$4 to \$4.25, the same figure as last week. Pork brings from 5c to 5 1/2c, according to quality. Cheese is worth 10 1/2 to 11c.

THE PRICE OF OATS.

Export Demand in Toronto Reported Dull.

In Toronto the export demand for oats is dull, according to the Mail and Empire. On Monday white oats were quoted at 26 1/2 east, 26 middle freights, and 25 1/2 North and West.

Feeling of Boers and British.

PIETERMARITZBURG, Nov. 1.—Released civilian prisoners report much illness among the Boers. Profound discouragement prevails the enemy's camp. They can do nothing except on the hills, and they are not much use there. They are beginning to realize that on a level country like the Orange Free State the only alternative to retreat are surrender or annihilation. In case the Free State force were threatened from the south or west the Boers now in Natal would require a week to reach Bloemfontein. Our troops are confident and elated.
