**DEPARTURE OF MGR. FALCONIO**  
**He Left This Morning for St. John**  
 ESCORTED TO STATION BY THE LEAGUE OF THE CROSS.  
 Catholic Mutual Benefit Association Present an Address.

Mgr. Falconio and his private secretary, Father Fisher, left this morning for St. John, N.B. Dr. Morrison and Dr. Monaghan, of the Cathedral staff, accompanied them as far as Moncton, and will return tonight. Superintendent Sharp very kindly placed the official car at the disposal of the Delegate and party. There were a great many people at the railway station to see the distinguished visitor take his departure, including the League of the Cross which escorted him to the train. At the station the officers and members of the League were formally presented to His Excellency. The weather was delightful throughout the Delegate's visit, and he was much impressed by the attention shown him while here. He was also greatly pleased with the Island province, and carries with him many pleasant recollections of the place and its people.  
 Last evening the members of Branch 216, of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, waited upon His Excellency at the Palace and presented him with an address. The parade of the society to and from the Palace was highly creditable, and many words of praise were heard along the route. The line of march was up Queen Street to Richmond, along Richmond to Great George and down Great George to the Palace. From the Palace the society returned to their hall by way of Great George, Water and Queen Streets. Mr. Charles Hermans acted as marshal. The address from the Society was presented to His Excellency in the drawing room of the Palace, in the presence of His Lordship Bishop Macdonald, several of the clergy and the members of the C. M. B. A. It was read by Mr. James McLeaac, Grand Deputy, and is as follows:—


testify our homage and respect to your distinguished person and office.

 GENTLEMEN:—I return you my best thanks for the beautiful sentiment of love and attachment towards our Holy Father the Pope, so well expressed in this address. Nothing can give greater pleasure to our Holy Father than to know your love and affection towards his sacred person. It is also a source of great consolation to me to find this beautiful society here, united as you are under the protection of your Holy Mother the Church. There is no fear of going astray; you are sure of that under the direction of your beloved bishop and priests. I am sure the blessing of God will be upon you. I hope this association will soon be spread throughout the Island. A branch should be established in every parish. I know it will bring blessings on the places where it is established. It is also a source of great consolation to find such faith amongst you. Perhaps you may ask how it is that such affection, love and reverence towards our Holy Father exists here. It is the great faith which you received from your ancestors who for the love of their religion exposed their lives. This faith was brought to Canada by bands of religious missionaries who laid the germs of civilization placing us in such a high position as to be on a level with the most enlightened nations of the earth. You are not ashamed of your religion. You are proud of your faith; and as long as this faith will live in your hearts you will go ahead without fear no matter what your position may be. Perhaps there might become danger if you should not listen to the words of your bishop and pastor. I am happy to find you listening to their advice, as words coming from our Lord Jesus Christ. Our Lord said to His ministers, "He who listeneth to you listeneth to Me." You must take these words as coming from God Himself. As long as you are faithful you may be sure you will prosper. Your Bishop will spare no labor as he has done in the past for the good of his people. Try to listen to his words and the blessing of God will be upon you. As a token of my

love I will bestow the blessing of our Holy Father the Pope.  
 The Papal Blessing was then bestowed upon all present after which the officers and members of the society were formally presented to His Excellency. Then the society formed up in procession and returned to their hall where a brief meeting was held after which the brethren dispersed.  
**INFANTRY INSPECTED,**  
**82nd Regiment Makes Excellent Showing - The Sham Fight.**  
 Yesterday was for the 82nd Regiment the most important day of camp. For eleven days they have been training hard, all the companies striving to excel. Besides being under the guidance of their company commanders the men have had the excellent good fortune of being trained by Sergeant-Instructors Bayers, Little and Torrence, of Fredericton. Under these men the regiment has become most efficient, and this though there has been a large infusion of recruits.  
 At 8 15 muster parade took place. The regiment was formed in open order, when roll was called. Arms and accoutrements were then inspected.  
 Shortly after two o'clock the regiment was marched to the parade grounds in the Park and formed in open order. About 230 Lieutenant-Colonel Moore, D. O. C., was received with a general salute. The column was then advanced and formed in quarter column by the left, wheeled by the left and returned to its first position. The march past then took place.  
 The regiment was put through some minor movements and deployed into line. Col. Macleod, commanding officer, now put his regiment through some movements in battalion drill, after which Major Stewart conducted it through the manual exercises. The acting Adjutant, Lieut. Darke, put the regiment through volley and independent firing.  
 The sham fight which followed was a highly interesting affair. The companies were formed for attack, Cos. 1 and 3 being the firing line, and Cos. 5 and 7 the supports, under command of Col. Macleod, while Cos. 2, 4, 6 and 8 were the reserves under Major Stewart. The advance was sounded, and the firing line moved forward by sections, firing volleys under the direction of their section commanders. When the firing line had advanced a considerable distance the supports and reserves were ordered forward at the double, and formed with the firing line. Then a long stretch of fire was opened on the enemy, while the line was gradually advancing. A charge was ordered and the whole line rushed forward and captured the position. The companies reformed, and the regiment was marched back to its quarters.  
 But we must not forget the Red Cross. As in war men would naturally fall it was consistent that some casualties should occur during the fight at Victoria Park. The stretcher-bearer corps worked with a will under the command of Surgeon-Major Warburton and Surgeon-Captain Johnson. The fight was rapid, and so were the attendance to the men and their convalescence. Now and then a man was seen to get back to the firing line to be in at the victory. Our report of the casualties is not official and will not be stated; but they thinned out the "thin—"  
 This year's camp was a very successful one in every respect. The regiment was full of true military ardor, and the men were imbued with a keen sense of rivalry which always does much to draw out the best in them. Col. Macleod may feel justly proud of the fine regiment he commands.

The Alberton Co. and the Brookfield and Hunter River Co, forty men each, left by this morning's train for their headquarters. The Cap. Traverser men leave this afternoon.  
 Last night Capt. Beaton, No. 5 Co., gave his men a clam supper at Large's restaurant. The Captain was presented by the company with a silver tea set accompanied by an address.
