

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, June 7.

The Irish executive has issued an important circular instructing all the county inspectors and constabulary to forward to their head quarters sworn reports as to the occasions when they anticipate obstruction to sheriff's sales or evictions in order that the Government may send the necessary military forces and proclaim the district, warning all persons to refrain from assembling to obstruct legal processes and declaring that all persons so assembling shall be dispersed by force. This circular entirely dispels the rumor that the Government intended to introduce measures for the temporary suspension of evictions.

LONDON, June 7.

The £100 foot race known as the Sixfield Whit Surtide handicap, was won by Smith, of Pittsburg, Pa. There were 62 competitors.

LONDON, June 8.

The Times' Dublin despatch says there is little doubt the Government have considered the expediency of suppressing the Land League, but there is a difference of opinion among the lawyers as to whether it can be done without an Act of Parliament or at least done so efficiently as to prevent a proclamation being evaded; but the course hitherto adopted, of arresting violent speakers, etc., is calculated to obtain the same result by more certain though less rapid means.

Lord Carnarvon, Conservative, formerly Colonial Secretary, speaking at Burton, yesterday, strongly condemned the policy of the Government, who, he said were responsible for the civil war in Ireland. They would find the question not to be one of land merely, but that every class of property will be menaced. He did not think Englishmen would long be hoodwinked by the reckless rhetoric of demagogues or the plausible nostrums of political quacks.

Joseph Chamberlain, president of the Board of Trade, speaking at Birmingham, said: It is perfectly evident the causes of disorder in Ireland are more deep seated than was supposed, and that they are not to be found in this or any previous Government; they are to be found in the condition of the people themselves. Force, he said, was no remedy, but a certain amount of force was necessary to uphold the law. Referring to the Land Bill, he said the Government had staked its existence upon it.

The Cornell University crew have arrived and are in excellent health. They trained every day during the passage from New York, in a stationary rowing apparatus.

LONDON, June 8.

Secretary Blaine, in reply to a question put by Mr. Breton, Irish emigration agent at Dunalk, as to whether the landing of able-bodied paupers in New York would be objected to, has written that poverty is no bar to immigrants willing to work and to obey the laws, but that immigration of dissolute paupers and criminals is certainly objectionable.

A correspondent at Rome says: The Pope is much impressed by the active participation of the Irish clergy in the land agitation, despite his expressed injunctions. He has laid the matter before the Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs, in order to recall the disobedient Bishops to duty.

A despatch from Cork reports that widespread dissatisfaction prevails among the military and police, owing to the manner in which they are ordered about.

The village of Bradley in Hampshire has been almost totally destroyed by fire.

A process-server has been so severely beaten at Dromore, County Sligo, that he is dying.

Yesterday a party of 50 marines, sent from Bantry to Ballydeob, was encountered at the latter place by a mob numbering some thousands. After much stone-throwing and some bayonet charges the marines were compelled to retreat to Bantry under the protection of a priest.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

VIENNA, June 7.

Advices from Sofia state that Prince Alexander is not disheartened by the strong agitation against his plans. He does not seem to attach great importance to his remaining, but on the contrary would not personally regard it as a great misfortune if he were free to return again and enjoy civilized life.

BERLIN, June 7.

A letter from Russia states that about 30 army officers, including a colonel of the Imperial Guards, have been arrested the past month. Among the naval officers arrested are relatives of Procurer General Monariev, who conducted the prosecution of Ronsakoff and other Nihilists executed for complicity in the murder of the Czar. The policy of procrastination reigns supreme at St. Petersburg.

UNITED STATES.

NEW YORK, June 8.

The Herald's Washington despatch says the report that Secretary Blaine and Lowell (Minister to England) may exchange places, talked of as a probability when Blaine accepted the Secretaryship of State, is again renewed, and prominence is given thereto by prominent friends of the President.

CLEVELAND, O., June 8.

Senator Sherman was elected permanent chairman of the Republican state convention. The platform adopted endorses the administration of Garfield and Governor Foster. A congratulatory letter on the successful refunding of the State debt at a rate of less than 3 per cent. was read. Governor Foster was renominated as the Republican candidate for Governor.

NEW YORK, June 8.

John H. McCabe sued George Jones for \$10,000 damages for alleged libellous statements published in the Times, and obtained judgment for \$250 on trial. A motion to dismiss the complaint on the ground that Jones could not be held to the liability as a stockholder in the Times was denied by Judge Day. Appeal was taken and the common pleas reversed it. The opinion of the court declares the law does not impose a liability for libellous matter upon a stock owner, even though he owns a majority of shares of the association publishing a newspaper.

A nitro-glycerine factory near Union port, Westchester County, exploded yesterday, blowing an Italian to pieces and fatally injuring William Ager, the owner.

INDIA.

BOMBAY, June 8.

News has been received from Candahar that the force of the cavalry and infantry which had arrived near Gishk, was attacked by the Amerci troops, on the 3rd instant, and routed after four hours fighting.

The Sugar and Molasses Market.

The advance in sugar has exceeded the most sanguine expectations of holders who bought early in the season in anticipation of a rise. Latest advices received by mail from the West Indies show a deficiency of 15 to 20 per cent. in the crop as compared with last year. The stocks everywhere are light, while the demand is active. Refiners have been working at their fullest capacity and have experienced considerable difficulty in keeping abreast of their orders. Fair to good Refining is quoted in New York at 7 1/2c. to 7 3/4c. and Granulated, which a month ago was quoted dull at 9 1/2c., is now selling freely at 10 1/2c. to 11c. The stocks in Montreal R. fisheries are light, so that operations are partially restricted. The market is strong. There are no Grocery grades in first hands under 8c. and 8 1/2c. to 8 3/4c. is the price quoted between jobbers. Granulated is selling at 11c. to 11 1/2c., and Yellow Refined at 8 1/2 to 9 1/2c., according to sample. Molasses has kept pace with the advance in sugars. The stocks in the leading United States ports, viz: Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore are only 5,800 puns., against 19,500 puns. at same time last year, a deficiency of 13,700 puns. There is an active demand for Barbadoes in Montreal, where the importations this season have been unusually small. Sales have been made this week, "to arrive," at 54c. to 55c. per Imperial gallon. We understand that several lots are being shipped to that market from here, and sold at full prices. With the exception of one or two importers, dealers here do not appear to be alive to the situation.

The Czar's Danger and his Precautions Against it.

The St. Petersburg police recently discovered a plot to kill the Czar, and have captured twenty one of the conspirators. It appears that a carpenter overheard them plotting the death of the Czar, in a room, and informed the police, who next day secreted a lieutenant-colonel and a large force behind some of the furniture in the room. A large body of police was also posted outside the building. The Nihilists held a long conference, and after conversing for six hours finally resolved upon the death of the Czar at the end of this month. The lieutenant-colonel suddenly sprang from his concealment and fired a pistol, whereupon the whole force rushed into the room, capturing the entire band.

A St. Petersburg despatch says:—The Czar's palace at Gatchina is filled with soldiery and police. Everyone having business at the palace is subjected to a rigorous search whenever they have occasion to go there. The court will soon remove to Peterhof, which has a small port at the mouth of the Neva. Four lightships will be anchored there, and no other vessels will be allowed to approach. Two yachts will always be ready to convey the Czar to and from St. Petersburg, accompanied on either side by a torpedo boat.

Personal Intelligence.

The Toronto Globe on the 8th inst., has the following special cablegram: Sir John Macdonald's health has greatly improved and he is now able to attend to several business matters. He feels much cheered by the opinion of Dr. Andrew Clarke, that he is suffering from no organic disease. His physicians recommend him to proceed to Turnbridge wells and drink the waters there, which are said to be very beneficial for ailments such as those affecting Sir John. He will probably follow this advice. If convalescence continues as rapidly as hitherto he will shortly return to Canada.

Hon. Alex. Mackenzie is in Geneva, but returns to London on the 10th inst.

Hon. Andrew Mewat and family will proceed to Edinburgh to-morrow.
