ISLAND GRADUATE—Miss Mary MacDonald of Prince Edward Island, now at 55 Windsor Rd., Waban, was among the 33 young women graduated this week from the Training School for Attendants of the Household Nursing Association, 22 Newbury St., Back Bay. The young women are now qualified for taking care of sick and convalescent patients. The course consists of six weeks' instruction at the Training School in elementary physiology and dietetics, followed by six months' instruction in one of the several hospitals affiliated with the training school, the Henry Heywood Memorial Hospital at Guelter, the Desconess Hospital for Women in Brookline, the Talitha Cumi Hospital in Jamaica Plain and the Evangeline Booth Maternity Hospital in Boston. After the hospital service the students are required to devote six months to the care of various cases in private homes under the supervision of a graduate nurse during which time wages are paid. At the completion of the course the young women are carried on the Association's registry and are provided with employment, but are at liberty to accept positions they may obtain from other sources.
