

He said the Frontenac plant will be turned over to its new owners at the end of his year.

Additional capital expenditures of \$400,000 for modernization of plant layout and for new equipment were also announced.

Shareholders approved a resolution changing the company's fiscal year from Dec. 31 to Oct. 31.
