## EXTRACTS.

The following is an extract, published by  
request, from the skeleton of the oration  
that was to have been delivered at Morell  
on Dominion Day. The confused arrange-  
ment prevented Mr. Byrne from addressing  
those who assembled to do honor to the  
Birth-day of Canada:—

It is gratifying to think that so many  
have come together for the purpose of cele-  
brating in a becoming manner the natal  
day of this great land, that stretches from  
ocean to ocean. From the most ancient  
times it was the custom for the people to  
meet in the open air, and with song and  
dance manifest their joyfulness. We read  
in the Scriptures that Miriam the prophet-  
ess, the sister of Aaron, took a timbrel in  
her hand and all the women went out after  
her with timbrels and with dances. Greece,  
the most refined nation of antiquity, bade  
her sons meet upon her historic fields to do  
honor to the gods on great occasions.  
Athens, her capital, contained the wealth,  
the intelligence, and the greatness of the  
ancient world. Those she sent forth, and  
her bards, beneath the broad blue sky, sang  
in classic and immortal verse the deeds of  
the heroes of a past age. Her orators  
spoke in that glorious language which has  
survived the wreck of empires and the  
change of kingdoms. From her mountain  
passes, from her green slopes, from her  
winding streams, from her noble rivers,  
from the Academy, from the Temple, from  
the tents that contained the warriors that  
were victorious in a hundred fights, came  
forth those noble Greeks, whose courage,  
endurance, military genius and learning  
are the admiration of the world. From  
night until morn, from morn until the  
dewy eve, the men and the deeds of other  
times were remembered. To give you a  
correct description of the gathering of the  
Athenians of old of this nation, the first  
among nations, pre-eminent in knowledge  
and military glory, the cradle of philo-  
sophy and eloquence, would require an im-  
agination as expansive as the sea. The  
literature that sprang from these gather-  
ings remains till this day to attest her  
greatness when all else has perished. To  
admire and appreciate that noble litera-  
ture, we should be possessed in the highest  
degree of that great faculty whereby man  
is enabled to live in the past and in the  
future, in the distant and in the unreal.

[Another Extract.]

The writings of the Wizard of the North  
contain many beautiful descriptions of the  
exultations of the Scottish heart. On the  
burning heath of his native land, to the  
sounds of the pibroch, the noble-souled  
Scot walked forth to do honor to the  
heroes of his country. A breeze from the  
mountains stirred the ends of his Tartan  
and the locks of his hair. The songs of  
Ossian and Scott and Burns flowed from his  
lips and the proverbial hospitality of the  
land of the Gael flowed from his heart.

—Affairs in France are beginning to pre-  
sent a more stormy appearance. The  
French Republicans have, indeed, need for  
great patience, for they are sorely tried.  
President MacMahon is showing a disposi-  
tion to go farther and farther in his reac-  
tionary policy. He has issued a proclama-  
tion in connection with a review at Paris,  
which has delighted the Clerical and  
Bonapartists, those who favor personal rule,  
and he has suspended the Municipal Gov-  
ernment of Athens, replacing it by an Ad-  
ministrative Commission. Nothing is said  
of the feelings of the Republicans in re-  
gard to these acts as yet, and if they con-  
tinue calm it will betoken their sure con-  
fidence in a victory final and complete.  
The most important question at present is  
as to how far President MacMahon can be  
led in the path in which he is at present  
moving. Will he, failing success, as he al-  
most certainly will by other means, use his  
position as head of the army to attempt a  
coup d'etat? There does not seem to be  
very much apprehension of this in Europe,  
but the name which has been given to this  
Ministry—the Government of combat—is  
not a reassuring one. However, the army  
is a very different one from the army of  
1851, and it is not at all probable that  
MacMahon would be as successful now as  
Napoleon was then. Still, he could easily  
make great trouble, and might lead to  
bloodshed in the struggle between freedom  
and tyranny.

—Mr. Gladstone has added his tribute to  
the memory of Wedgwood, the potter, con-  
sidering him to be, take him altogether,  
the most extraordinary man whose name is  
recorded in the history of the commercial  
world. Wedgwood not only completely  
revolutionized the character of the fabrics  
of his day, but he carried the manufacture  
of earthenware to by far the highest point  
it had ever attained in any country in the  
world. Another authority says that "his  
works were not only of the greatest benef-  
it to the manufactures and commercial  
prosperity of his country, but exerted a  
powerful influence in refining the national  
taste." So perfect was his work that fifty  
copies he made of the celebrated Portland  
vase sold for \$250 each.

—While every exertion has been made  
by the Grand Trunk detectives to trace the  
persons who removed the fish plates and  
bolts on the track three quarters of a mile  
west of Kensington, some little time since,  
with the evident intention of causing an  
accident, the task has been unsuccessful so  
far. A reward of \$50 is now offered by  
the Company for any information that will  
lead to the detection of the guilty parties.

## News of the World.

### EUROPEAN.

Von Moltke is reported to have stated  
recently that "the real Russian troubles  
would only just begin after the Danube had  
been crossed."

MADRID July 3.—Inundations in the Pro-  
vince of Murcia seriously damaged railways.  
Twenty-four persons were drowned.

The French elections will take place in  
September.

Toulon, July 3.—French man-of-war  
*Reine Blanche*, belonging to squadron of  
evolution, has been accidentally named and  
sunk off Xyres Island by French iron-clad  
*Heveine*. Nobody was drowned.

The peace party at Constantinople seem  
to be gaining ground rapidly, owing doubt-  
less to the gloomy situation of affairs on  
the Danube and in Armenia. In announc-  
ing the close of the sittings of the Chamber  
of Deputies last week the President re-  
marked that it was possible that they might  
be assembled again soon to deliberate upon  
a "satisfactory subject." "Satisfactory  
subject" is construed in Constantinople to  
mean negotiations for peace.

Mr. Barry Sullivan, the actor, has re-  
cently undergone a singular operation con-  
nected with an eyelash. It will be re-  
membered that at Drury Lane theatre,  
Macduff's sword accidentally struck him in  
the eye, causing an abrupt termination of  
his engagement and his retirement for  
some weeks. In the end he left the doc-  
tor's hands cured, as was believed, but ever  
since he has been troubled with a curious  
affection of the eye. Having consulted an  
oculist, the conclusion was arrived at that  
there must be something in the eyeball  
itself. Barry Sullivan consented to un-  
dergo the necessary operation for testing  
this theory. His eyeball was cut open,  
and from it there was taken an eyelash,  
which had been thrust in at the point of  
the sword.

### UNITED STATES.

A Cunard stewardess lately retired after  
twenty years' service, with a fortune of  
twenty-five thousand dollars earned during  
the time. Doubtless the pearl will not be  
vacant long.

Five Russian vessels changed hands in  
New York during the past week to Ameri-  
can owners for fear of capture by Turkish  
war vessels.

Frank Benson, of Salem, Mass., the pos-  
tman, finished his task of walking 108  
miles in 24 hours at 8.50 on the 30th ult.

The Governor in Council have again ap-  
pointed James F. Babcock to the sinecure  
office of State Assayer of Liquors. The  
heaviest work for this official is to mount  
the State House steps once a month and  
sign his name on the pay-roll.

Two poor Bideford men have recently  
been kindly remembered by freaky fortune.  
One, a French day laborer, has fallen heir  
to \$10,000 through the death of an uncle in  
Ficolet, Canada; and the other, L. M. May,  
has received \$20,000 and perhaps \$30,000  
by the death of his father, who lived in  
California.

The political situation in the United  
States is again exciting. Chamberlain, the  
deposed Governor in South Carolina, and  
Senator Blaine are on the war-path, and  
are announced as prepared to make a  
savage attack on President Hayes. The  
Democrats are elated over the continued  
troubles in the Republican camp.

Another execution has been defeated  
through singular reasons. One George W.  
Garner was to have been executed last Fri-  
day in Texas for the murder of a sheriff, but  
on the morning set for the execution he  
was found dying in his cell, and his wife be-  
side him, dead. She had been permitted  
for some days to share his cell with him,  
and had smuggled morphine into the jail  
in her mouth, with which the two delib-  
erately committed suicide.

### CANADA.

A hurricane passed over Springfield vil-  
lage about one o'clock on Friday afternoon,  
blowing down chimneys, trees and fences,  
and lifting houses from their foundations.  
The Canada Southern Railway depot was  
damaged by lightning, and the crops were  
badly injured in this vicinity. The rain  
and hail was very heavy.

LONDON, June 29.—A deputation of citi-  
zens had an interview with the Right Hon.  
George Selator Booth, President of the Local  
Government Board, yesterday, in reference  
to the refusal of that Board to sanction cer-  
tain expenditures for sending children to  
Canada under charge of Miss Rye. He  
pointed out that if they provided immigra-  
tion on a large scale it would be taking  
valuable labor from this country.

YARMOUTH, July 3.—Judge James sen-  
tenced Reuben Moore to fourteen years  
Penitentiary, he having been found guilty  
of two charges of arson.

YOUNG MAN OF PROMISE.—Manitoba has  
been enriched by the acquisition of an en-  
terprising French Canadian named Lang-  
lois. Having discovered, on reaching  
Crockston, Minnesota, that lumber was  
much cheaper there than at Winnipeg, he  
purchased all that he needed for his house  
and outbuildings, made it into a raft, em-  
barked his wife and family thereon and  
floated along Red River till he had reached  
his destination, saving steamboat fare and  
freight and the difference of the price of the  
lumber. Arrived at St. Norbert he tied up  
his raft, left it in charge of his wife,  
sought out and pre-empted a farm, and  
then, like a man, proceeded to build up  
his house.—*Toronto Globe*.
