SUMMERSIDE — Plows from the government garage, Curran and Briggs Ltd. and Morrison and MacLure Ltd. were out on the highway at 5.30 this morning, clearing the snow which had fallen since 5 o'clock Sunday morning.

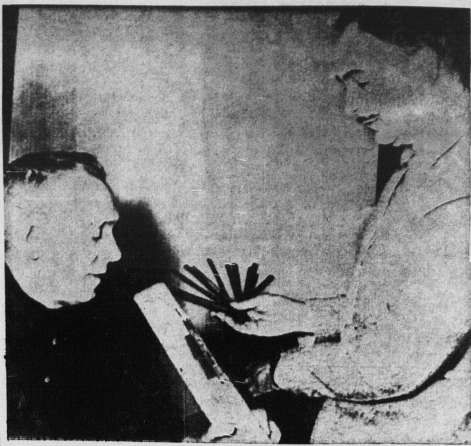
Heavy drifting caused by winds gusting to 40 miles per hour from the north-northeast along with poor visibility forced most of the plows off the highways by approximately 9 o'clock last night and they were to remain in until early this morning unless a call out on an emergency.

Although there was heavy drifting reports were that no deep banks of snow had accumulated along the highways late last night.

The RCAF meteorological section here recorded a snowfall of 8.7 inches between 3 a.m. yesterday and 9 o'clock last night. At that time a met. spokesman forecast a snowfall to continue to 20 miles per hour, for approximately another five hours and then to taper off to snow flurries.

Winds overnight were expected to gust to northwest, and subside to 20 miles per hour, changing to 30.

The temperature yesterday was in the vicinity of 24 degrees and was expected to remain in that vicinity overnight.

Grounded Ship Freed; Needs Repairs To Hull

SUMMERSIDE — The 5,900-ton Greek freighter Agios Nicolaos III, grounded for four days off Seacow Head lighthouse near here, is expected to sail for Halifax this afternoon following the successful efforts of two Foundation tugs Saturday to refloat her.

The tugs, Foundation Vallant and Foundation Venture, had been unsuccessful in their first two attempts to dislodge the vessel which went aground Tuesday night during a howling snowstorm.

On their third attempt the powerful tugs manoeuvred the ship into deep waters at 12.16 Saturday afternoon and she docked here at 3.30 the same afternoon.

It is not known if she sailed from Seacow Head to Summerside under her own power, but she was towed into the harbor and manoeuvred up to the wharf here by the Foundation Vallant.

It was confirmed last night that the ship was leaking in one of the holds and her hull will be checked in the Halifax port. The Foundation Vallant will accompany the ship to Halifax.
