Granite Stone is Keen to Increase Turn

A MODEST block of Black Granite I saw in the Anglican cemetery at Alberton last week interested some of the most interesting stone told me by Herb Leavitt, a master craftsman who is one of the most modest men to whom I have ever talked.

Some of you may recall the story in this column of the A. MacKeon ranch which was a vital part while he was still a young lad. Back in the early 1900's I think Herb told me he was about 103—William Leavitt, a government geologist, had made a survey of as many as possible of the salters who had died in the waters of Alberton. He wrote to the relatives suggesting if each would send a small donation a common head stone could be erected to their memories.

When no replies were received William Leavitt decided to erect a memorial stone on his own. Recalling that he had played on a large granite stone when he was a boy, Mr. Leavitt thought he'd like to have a stone erected to his memory. He prepared a concrete slab and the stone was rolled on it.

ON THE big rock—it's shaped just a little like a huge potato, though its much bigger—the Alberton man had a stone mason set the words "Sacred to the memory of those who drowned off Alberton since 1882".

Shortly after that stone was placed, Mr. Leavitt had a visit from a Mr. Doggett who was the youngest brother of a John H. Doggett from the Nova Scotia shore who had lost his life in the Pond back in 1888 at the age of 21 years.

The old story says young Doggett was swimming while his ship was taking on fresh water, and a cow diver from the community as public spirited citizens with good judgement.

Noises Foretold Mother's Death

A FORMER Montrose girl, Florie MacWilliams, who is now Mrs. Leslie Wheeler, lives in Providence. Rhode Island recalls a "true ghost story" associated with her former home here:
"As long as I shall live," she writes "I shall never forget what I call a real ghost story I heard my father tell so many times in his relatives' homes. It was about a woman named 'One night in 1898 while my father and mother were in bed talking quietly together they suddenly heard heavy scuffling of feet by their bedroom door. They opened it into the hall and there they saw a woman who was dressed in a nightgown and was walking up stairs over the kitchen to see if my children were awake. My father, who was in the year, and my 13-year-old brother and I were fast asleep."
"Father then walked outside and looked for foot prints on the snow but he didn't find a sign of anything."
"Soon after he came back into the house, father and mother heard their bedroom door open, but there was nobody at the door when father looked."
"That happened," says Mrs. Wheeler, "three months before my mother died. My father had been bedridden for a long time and she had to have an operation. One of the doctors, Dr. Johnson, called at our home the night before my mother died. He gave three pills to my mother before he entered the house, to tell my father that he did not expect mother to live but a short time. My dear mother passed away the next morning."

Same Noise Of Shuffling Feet

"ON THE day before the funeral my father removed the bed from his room and laid my mother laid out in the room. At her funeral when the pallbearers were taking the casket from the room to the kitchen, a side wall close to the door prevented them getting the casket out without a good deal of difficulty. So my father heard the same noise of shuffling feet, as I have mentioned three months previously."
"As a family we never did believe in ghosts, but my father believed this had happened to us as a coincidence. The older folks called them 'foresayers' and they usually foretold a death in the home or in the community."
The "ghost" about whom Mrs. Wheeler speaks was Arthur MacWilliams. A big man, he was scared of nothing, I am told by Mrs. Edith Wheeler. Truth be told, she should know, for Mr. MacWilliams was her uncle. He died in 1902.

Police Head Silent on Quebec Probe

QUEBEC (CP)—Chief of Police Roger Lemire, emerged from a conference with Deputy Attorney General Charles-Etienne Cantin here, and declined to answer most questions put to him at a press conference about a Quebec police conduct during the visit last Saturday of the Queen.

His refusal to answer questions were that he couldn't answer while the attorney-general's department was investigating the events of last Saturday. Some of the reporters who questioned him were among those struck by police clubs. About a dozen reporters Monday day gave Mr. Lemire, at his request, their versions of the incident. Endako Mines Ltd. Grows To Big League In 5 Years

GEN ENDAKO
VANCOUVER (CP)—In a comparatively short time of five years, Endako Mines Ltd., has grown from a claim stake to the big league on the Vancouver Stock Exchange.

A group of 28 claims were staked late in 1959 not far from a Canadian National Railway flag stop called Endako, about 120 miles west of Prince George.

Some of the infant mining company are trading at more than \$15 each on the exchange, a wholly-owned subsidiary of Fluor Development, is planning multi-million-dollar investment.

Canex, which is equipping the mine for production scheduled to begin in mid-1965, has a 60 per cent ownership of Endako. It is expected to be in return 5,000,000 six-per-cent redeemable preferred shares.

Under a conditional agreement, Canex is to get 70 per cent ownership of Endako if it spends on the property reaches \$20,000,000.

The annual report from the Vancouver Exchange early in 1963 but were turned down several times, the exchange seeking information to find as to the value of the shares.

Additional financing for production costs was expected to be handled by a \$17,000,000 bank loan.

The central group of 28 claims had been looked at since 1952. Whitney Poole, a big game guide, staked the area but neglected to keep it in good standing in 1959.

The report also gave a hint the mine could be one of the largest molybdenum producers in Canada.

"Once in production," the report said, "Endako will be one of the largest mining operations in Canada and should produce close to 10 per cent of the world's molybdenum supply."
