In The World of Books

With Will R. Bird

THE NYMPH AND THE LAMP by Dr. Thos. H. Raddall; McClelland & Stewart; \$3.00. This latest book by Dr. Raddall is easily his best. It is a complete departure from the historical type of book on which his reputation has been founded, but the Raddall touch is there as sure and true as in his previous writings. In addition, he has given full rein to his flair for excellent description, and we have a picture of Sable Island that is as good as a visit there. The story is dated to coincide with the early days of wireless when Sable Island handled most of the "traffic" from liners, tramps and trawlers of the area. Dr. Raddall gives the island faint disguise as "Marina," but no Nova Scotian will need a second guess as to its identity. What he does is explain the place in absolute detail. Matthew Carney, the hero, is part Newfoundland and part Norse, loves the island, and goes to the mainland for a well-earned vacation. He meets a secretary in the Halifax office of his superior and is impressed by her manner. She, in turn, is impressed by his appearance and though he is much older they fall in love. An unpleasant episode at her rooming house causes her to agree to become Carney's bride, as it is a means of escape from drab routine and dull lodgings. Then the author has his innings as he describes the way visitors are landed and supplies taken ashore. The details go on. The living quarters are presented, the eternal noise at the station, the sand and the sea, the wild ponies, the sea birds and seals, the grass and the lagoons, the fogs and the bones that are found in the dunes, the little gatherings at the one station where there is a piano, and the characteristics of the crew of which the bride becomes a member—the cook. The different seasons are portrayed and the whole, besides being an unusual love story, shows the effect of island imprisonment on men and women. The eerie surroundings cause many moods and Dr. Raddall has done a masterful job in recording the emotions and feelings of a woman who has had nothing to prepare her for such experiences as were her's in the island environment. He relates his story with careful skill and the climax will surprise many readers. This book is not only vastly entertaining, it is filled with information about the island, and it shows that the author has a better than average knowledge of human character.

Stan Musial Asks Boss For Raise

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 4—(AP)—Stan Musial went in to see his boss about a raise and the two apparently talked of many things. No contract had been signed, however, at the end of their 3 1/2-hour session. Fred Saigh, owner of St. Louis Cardinals of which Musial is the stellar attraction, said another conference will be held "shortly." He described today's conversation as "pleasant." Musial declined comment. His two-year contract, said to call for \$50,000 a year, has expired.
