



In connection with the Illinois State Fair racing program at Springfield, Ill., mile track there followed the Grand Circuit which brought together some of the fastest trotters and pacers in the world. The Abe Lincoln Big Five Trot was won by Scotch Victor owned by Sol Camp and driven by Joe O'Brien with 1-2-1. Sharp Note, that distinguished himself by winning the Hambletonian last year and was the first horse to win \$100,000 in a season, was 4-1-2, his driver, Bion Shively, 75 years young. The time was 2:00 2/5, 2:01 1/5, 2:05 1/5. In the Castleton Farm Filly Stake for two-year-old pacers Adios Betty, that holds the world's record for a half-mile track, was the winner with 1-1, best time 2:03 3/5. The Allwood Stables' Kimberly Kid, driven by Tommy Berry, won the Review Futurity for three-year-old trotters in straight heats, time 2:02 2/5, 2:01 1/5. The record for three-year-old trotters, he was selected with others by former great trainer Thomas Murphy as a yearling at Walnut Hill sales two seasons ago. The Ann Reddy Big Five Filly was a great battle with most of the top pacers of the U. S. A. in it. The barrels of victory came again to the Sol Camp stable, Mighty Sun, a five-year-old by Volomite, driven by Joe O'Brien, who won the first heat which was won by H. D. Hanover (Leonard) in 1:58 and was 1-1 in the next two. The second heat was in 1:58 4/5—a new record for Mighty Sun. In the third heat they led to the three-quarters and Mighty Sun came home the last quarter in 27 2/5 seconds, time of the mile 2:04 4/5.

In the Little Pat Stake for two-year-old pacers Queen Adios by Adios, owned by Curly Smart, was the winner. Parker Byrd (Ervin) was second. It was raced in elimination heats and Joe O'Brien was a dead heat for third in the first elimination heat which was won by Parker Byrd in 2:01. He also drove Meadow Pace in the second elimination heat and finished fifth and was fourth in the final. Benny Schue drove Diamond Hal in the final. Meadow Pace was the horse that Joe had the accident with. The total amount distributed at this Fair amounted to over \$380,000.

Figures released by the United States Trotting Association up until the 10th of August, show Stanley Dancer of New Egypt, N. J., as leading harness racing driver. At that point Dancer had 79 victories, five more than he registered all last year. Billy Houghton is second with 64, Johnny Chapman of Toronto, is third with 58. All three leaders are in their twenties. Dancer is 26, Houghton 29 and Chapman 21. In fifth place is Wayne "Curly" Smart of Delaware, Ohio, who is a grandfather, with 57 wins.

And now we hear from our friend Cecil McGinley, Houlton, Maine, who raced my two horses at Presque Isle and Skowhegan Fair the last two weeks but am back at Woodstock, N. B., and will race there for a couple

of weeks and then go to Fred-erickton for the Fair. St. Stephen is not having races in connection with their fair this year. I found the going pretty tough in South-eastern Maine and raced for single dashes of \$300. The get of Volo H. showed up well at Skowhegan. Fly Volo out of Fly Frisco, a low priced mare that Bob Ryan bought at Harrisburg a few years ago, won the Free. For All in 2:08 1/5 and was eased off at the finish. Advocate won in 2:09 2/5. He is a three-year-old out of Ann Royal 2:10 1/5 that George Calbeck, Summerside, sold to Arthur McGeer some years ago. He also by Volo H. drove out the winner of the Two Year Old Pace, Mighty Joyce, in 2:09 2/5, 2:09 2/5. She has won 8 races in a row and is owned by George Reed, Fort Fairfield, Me.

Mr. McGeer by Abner T. Clez, lowered his record to 2:09 1/5 and his full sister Marcia Clez, in spite of lameness was a good third in 2:14 3/5 in a race won by Calso Boy, also a 1926, 1928, old by Bell Boy 2:01, saw three trotters by Watchim there. They were fine individuals and good gaited. Watchim's Angel won the Free For All Trot in 2:10 3/5, 2:08 3/5, with Dumbarton 2:11 2/5 second the fastest heat. He was the good looking young horse by Danley that Herb Bond tried to sell me last year at Foxboro for \$1000. I remember telling you about him at Charlottetown last summer. Bell Boy, one of our popular Maine sires, has had better of his get. He takes records better than 10. Highland Boy won in 2:08 in Maryland and B. B. Grattan in 2:09 4/5 at Saratoga. Sleigh Bell also won in 2:10 4/5 in western New York. My Miss Federal is coming along nicely. Thanks, Herb, you have packed a lot of interesting news for us Maritimers in your letter and we will be hoping to hear from you in the not too distant future.

Looking over the summaries at Vermont Downs we notice where Watchim's Lady, a four-year-old by Watchim, won the 2:24 trot for Will Flemming, and other Watchim's are racing at Foxboro and several other tracks. We think C. Farm, made a mistake in not holding on to Watchim 2:06 and that another year will prove we are correct. Watchim was superbly bred, being by Volomite and had perfect trotting action and manners. No trotter not even Peter Sakey, has ever left such a string of track records as Watchim did. Charlottetown's 2:07 1/2 is one of them. The winning of the above Free For All Trot is such an important centre as Skowhegan by Watchim's Angel will no doubt be very pleasing to Alderman Frank Adams of Halifax, owner of Watchim.
