PROTECTION OF MISSIONARIES.

Pekin advices state that the allies are not unanimous in the opinion that special protection should be secured for the missionaries under the new guarantees to be demanded of China. This will be understood when it is recalled that at least one of the allied powers, Japan, is not a Christian country, while another, Russia, has no missionaries, although Christianity is the national religion. The United States, Great Britain and other countries which send missionaries here will probably send a strong demand for guarantees stronger than those in the present treaties, which failed to afford the necessary protection during the Boxer troubles. Additional guarantees, it is asserted, will be necessary if the missionaries are to continue their work in the interior. The countries not represented by missionaries may endeavor to put the question aside as unimportant. Of course these countries will demand guarantees strong enough to protect their business interests, and it might be argued that additional guarantees for the missionaries are needed in business in the interior. But foreigners, the representatives of these powers say, have no business to go beyond treaty ports, and therefore special guarantees for them would be a useless exaction from China. Moreover, the ministers of non-missionary countries argue that as they are not interested in the whole matter should be left to future negotiations by the individual nations concerned.

One plan which it has been suggested would be effectual is to put definite provision in the peace treaty for the protection of all foreigners in China and the punishment of local officials responsible for the outrages, stipulating the nature of the punishments to be inflicted and forbidding the reappointment of guilty officials to office for a term of years, at least in cases where foreigners have been killed in the presence of these officials. Furthermore, copies of the treaties should be sent to every official, and he should be compelled to familiarize himself with all their provisions. It is stated that at present a large proportion of the Chinese officials are not acquainted with the promises made in the treaties, and do not realize their obligations. With these stipulations in the new treat-

ies and with proper orders from the Emperor for their enforcement, it will be impossible for the officials to escape in the future by pleas of ignorance of the provisions for the protection of foreigners. A great difficulty in the past has been not only the ignorance of the officials about treaty obligations but also the ignorance of the people who acquire their only information from the officials. If the officials understand these things the people will also know their obligations. It will be useless for the allies to ask anything from the Chinese unless they present a united demand. If they fail to agree on the guarantees to be required from China there will be danger of a serious check to missionary work in the country.
