They said the smuggling of goods by Canadian servicemen began not long after Canada, along with India and Poland, became a member of the true commissions in Viet Nam, Laos and Cambodia in the late summer of 1954. Most of this smuggling was done by non-Communists.

Steel Buyers Adopt Policy Wait And See

CLEVELAND (AP) - Most steel users will hold inventories at current levels until there is evidence of some turn in the contract negotiations between management and the United Steelworkers. Steel Magazine said today.
The market weekly said steel buyers have adopted wait-and-see attitude now that labor negotiations have been resumed and are expected to be on the same rate they were six weeks ago.
The magazine said production rates in most districts are higher than warranted by orders and existing inventories, but mills prefer to maintain current levels until the course of demand is defined more clearly.
The contract this week is expected to be about the same as the estimated 2,300,000 tons produced last week, Steel said.
The magazine's prior comparison on steelmaking scrap held off \$3.67 a ton less last week.
