TRAGEDY AT THE BOAT RACE.

Mark Riley, of Charlottetown, Drowned.

BY THE UPSETTING OF ONE OF THE BOATS

Four Companions Who Were With Him Were Saved.

The boat race which, this morning occasioned a meeting of interested spectators who were bent on enjoying the event, was the cause of a tragedy that made a feeling of sadness to obscure the pleasure of the day. One of the competing boats named The Gentleman, a lobster boat, carrying jib, foresail and mainsail and topmast staysail, owned by Mr. J. H. Judson, of Pownal, was manned by five men: Joseph Moresey, Freeland Wood, Wm Brown and Theophilus Brehaut, all of Alexandria, and Mark Riley, of Charlottetown. In less than half an hour from the start the accident to The Gentleman occurred. The boats were close together up the river opposite the Driving Park, and the steamer Southport with the excursionists were a short distance behind. A heavy squall struck the gentleman, and it was unable to come up quickly enough. She filled and capsized and sank like a flash. Joseph Moresey and Freeland Wood struck out swimming and were picked up by the Jubilee. Brehaut and Brown clung to the spars which were above the water and were picked up by the Southport. Riley being unable to swim, was carried away from the boat by the strong current. He sank and rose twice in the sight of his comrades, but the wind being heavy and the boats close together, it was impossible to save him. So close was he to being saved, however, that a man in a boat not in the race picked his cap from his head as he sank for the last time. Riley had been working during the early part of the summer with Mr. Judson as a fisherman and lately has been living in Charlottetown. He was between forty and forty-five years of age. He was married and lived on King Street. He came formerly from Lot 7. The rescued men were quite exhausted but subsequently completely recovered.

Mrs. Carmichael, of New Glasgow, who has been on the Island for some time past, returned home this morning.

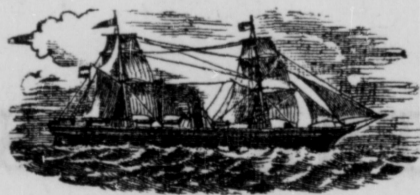
Rev. Wm. Townshend, Bass River, N. B., arrived Monday evening, via Point du Chene, to visit relatives on the Island.

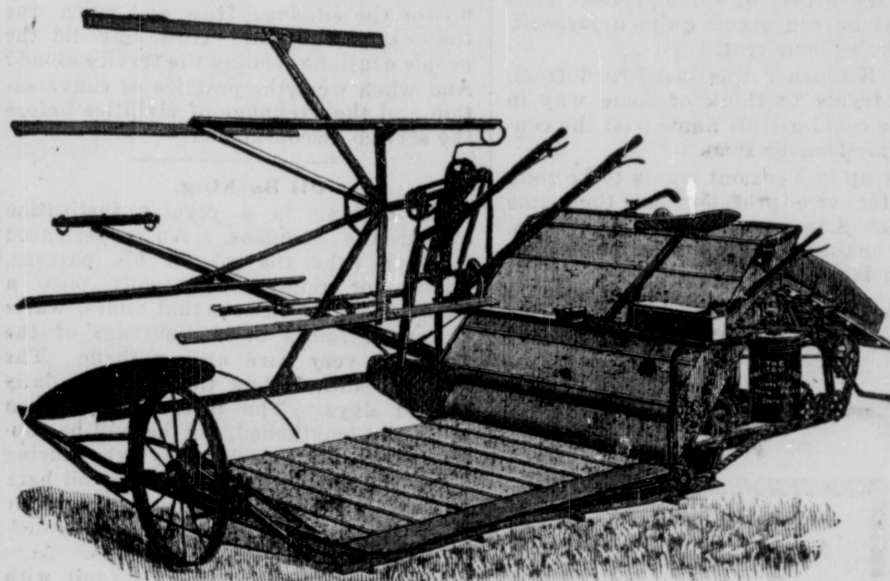
