## Railway Schedule Gets Nudged Ahead

MONTREAL, April 12—The railway time table, which has traditionally listed arrivals and departures in standard time the year round, will get a one-hour nudge ahead this month by Canadian National Railways.

For several years now CN's summer time tables have shown Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island on daylight time. Now for the first time, CN's system time table will be published with daylight time listings for other parts of Canada.

The new time table will cover all CN passenger train and ship schedules in effect between April 24, when daylight time comes in, to October 30, when clocks go back one hour to standard time.

The only exceptions will be for trains operating in Saskatchewan and Alberta, as these two provinces remain on standard time throughout the year.

Internally the railway in just about all parts of Canada will continue to run on standard time, but employees dealing with the travelling public will convey information in terms of daylight saving time. Station clocks will also be set on daylight saving time.

Canadian National pioneered the use of daylight time in summer schedules for trains running on Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island. Newfoundland's province-wide approach to daylight saving made it possible for trains there to run on this time for a number of years and Prince Edward Island followed suit more recently.

The use of daylight saving time on an extended basis, a big step forward with the rest of Canada, is the second major break with tradition which will be included in CN's new time table effective April 24. At the same time CN is re-numbering all its passenger trains to eliminate duplication and increase efficiency.

## Town Council Holds Meeting

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN

Following a short discussion last night by the Montague Town Council during their regular meeting it was decided to leave store hours in the hands of the merchants, however it was also felt if the merchants get together and suggest agreeable hours to all the council would then consider passing a law, if requested.

It was also on motion decided to have mercury vapor lights 125 watts installed immediately on the main street of Montague. It was the opinion of all that this would be a considerable improvement to the light situation in Montague. A request is also to be made to the provincial government to have similar lights installed and maintained by them on the Montague Bridge.

A letter is to be forwarded to the minister of highways requesting the main street be paved. Also the Wood Island hill. It has been the contention for several years this should be done as the street is a through street with heavy traffic most of the time.

The fire committee had a request from chief D. H. Coffin for fire coats and rubber boots. A decision to purchase six coats which must be carried on the two fire vehicles at all times was made.

The town clerk G. Arnold Wightman read from correspondence several letters pertaining to the centennial celebration. He also read a copy of a telegram which had been sent to the provincial government by Mayor B. H. Yeo commending them for the advance of \$2.00 per capita tax. Mayor Yeo also is to place an ad extending the sincere gratitude to the government for this increase on behalf of the mayors and municipalities of which he is president.

Also in correspondence was a note on the visit of the centennial caravan which will visit Montague in 1967. A meeting is to be held with the provincial committee in Montague on May 27th.

It was also reported by the town clerk that a letter has been forwarded to Gordie Howe to see if he could attend the official opening of the Montague hockey and skating rink. There has not been time for an answer however it was noted Howe is expected to be a visitor to the province in June at which time the official opening could be held.

The matter of RCMP to police the town came up for a short discussion with the result that a meeting Monday April 18th at 12:30 noon, will be held to give the council members time to investigate the situation more closely.

Ed Downe, town policeman advised five cases had been before the court with \$108.75 taken in fines.

H. M. Smith, manager and supervisor of the building of the new rink advised that work was complete and also answered several questions pertaining to the rink. A suggestion that toilets be placed in the hockey dressing rooms was made, however the matter of heating and freezing is involved but it was taken under advisement by the rink committee who have already tried to come up with an answer to the problem.

All councillors with the exception of Councillor Yeo were present for the meeting Mayor B. H. Yeo presided.
