It might be argued South shouldn't have fallen for East's crafty maneuver. Possibly he should have read the actual situation and trumped with dummy's eight. But the indications were strong that East had been dealt only two hearts, and furthermore, ruffing the heart high could lose only in the remote case one defender had all four missing trumps.
East's play was brilliant. Generally, it isn't wise for the defenders to falsecard. But East knew no harm could come from selling West the idea that the A-2 of hearts were all alone. When West obediently led the third round of hearts, the intended victim, South, fell right into the trap.

The bidding:

Opening lead—king of hearts. One of the nearest swindles ever perpetrated upon an unsuspecting declarer took place in this hand.
The hand itself looks like a very ordinary affair. The final contract of four spades is natural enough. Maybe the bidding was a little unusual since North jumped to three spades with only three jumps, but considering all the high card power he had, it was as good a bid as any he could make. South naturally went to four.
But, as we've indicated, it wasn't the bidding that was remarkable. It was the play. West opened the king of hearts. As anyone can plainly see, Declarer should lose two hearts and a club and make exactly four. Neither more nor less. But South went down one, and here's how it happened.
East overlooked the king of hearts and returned the deuce. West won with the queen and naturally assumed his partner had a doubloon. So returned another heart.
South also assumed East had started with only two hearts. He didn't dare run the risk that East would overruff the dummy, so he ruffed the heart with the jack of spades. East followed suit to the heart lead with the six.
When declarer now played the king of spades from dummy he discovered East had an unsalable trump trick. And since East's ace of clubs couldn't be shut out either, South went down one.
It might be argued South shouldn't have fallen for East's crafty maneuver. Possibly he should have read the actual situation and trumped with dummy's eight. Household Guard Had To Be Emotionally Balanced Lot

OTTAWA (CP) — "Mental attitude" took priority over appearance in picking men for the Queen's household guard.
Sqn. Ldr. R. S. (Tiny) Davis, a philosophical disciplinarian, worked out that principle when he began forming the special guard early in September for Queen Elizabeth's Thanksgiving week-end visit.
Men had to be "emotionally balanced" and have "a sense of humor and the ability to get along with each other" to get in to the guard.
The household guard is to be on duty at Government House, home of Governor-General Massey, which will become the Queen's household during her five-day stay here, accompanied by Prince Philip.
"In pure theory they'll be a copy of the household guard at Buckingham Palace," said the six-foot-six officer.
"We are not involved with security of the establishment, but will be performing a purely ceremonial function," he added during an interview.

SHIPS COLLIDED
BALBOA, Canal Zone AP) — The Rangitane, a passenger ship of the New Zealand Shipping Company, and the Matsun Line Hawaiian Tourist collided head-on midway in the Panama Canal Thursday during a heavy rain squall. The Rangitane was carrying 415 passengers from London to Wellington. The Hawaiian Tourist was en route to New York with a general cargo. No one was hurt and the vessels resumed transit under their own power.

Equity, Not Equations, Will Apply To Newfoundland

OTTAWA (CP)—Equitable principles should be used in solving problems connected with Newfoundland's entry into Canadian confederation, the federal government said Monday.
The government made the declaration in a brief to the three-man royal commission investigating Newfoundland finances. The inquiry is part of the terms of 1949 Canada - Newfoundland confederation.
The government said financial problems between Newfoundland and itself "can better be solved on general equitable principles than by elaborate economic theories."
Federal government counsel Roland Ritchie of Halifax also told the commission headed by B. McNair that "fairness and equity" must be the governing factors in the Ottawa government's dealings with Newfoundland.
He said that "mere equations" cannot solve Newfoundland's problems.
The considerations of fairness and equity must be the overriding ones to be dealt with by the royal commission.
TERMS ARE FIRM BASE
Mr. Ritchie's brief—summarizing the views of the federal government—said the terms of union should be regarded as a firm agreement between the contracting parties as to a fair and equitable basis upon which the financial position of Newfoundland as a province is to be established.
It said the commission task lies in providing for Newfoundland to reach maturity as a province without sacrificing improvements in public service that have accrued to it through transitional aid from Ottawa.
Mr. Ritchie said the recommendation of the commission as to the level of public service to be maintained in Newfoundland must be:
"One which will enable Newfoundland to continue public service at the levels and standards reached subsequent to the date of union until such time as the province has become adjusted so as to be able to maintain these levels and standards without additional financial assistance."
