TWO THOUSAND ounces of Nova Scotia gold were taken into Halifax last week, and during the same time 35,000 tons of coal were raised. MR. JOHN MURRAY, of the Marine and Fisheries Department, Ottawa, son of Adam Murray, Esq., is visiting his parents and friends in this city.

SALMON CULTURE.—The Maine State Commissioners have placed 300,000 young salmon in the head waters of the Penobscot, 200,000 in the Kennebec, 219,000 in the Sagadahoc, and 40,000 in Denny's; also 100,000 land-locked salmon in Mosehead Lake, and 50,000 in the Rangelys. WE were shown by Hon. Wm. Campbell, Commissioner of Public Works, a stock of fodder corn of wonderful growth, which was taken from the farm of William G. McKay, Esq., New London. The corn was planted on the 1st of June, and measured five feet, ten inches in height.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Short Line Claims.

PUGWASH, Aug. 18. Judge Clarke, who arrived from Ottawa a few days ago, commenced this morning to consider the claims of the sub-contractors and others connected with the Short Line Railway. On opening the commission, Judge Clarke stated briefly the object of the commission to be the equitable payment of the various claims to the extent permitted by the vote of \$125,000 made by the Dominion Government at the late session of Parliament. Judge Clarke read a telegram from Ottawa, saying that money had been placed to his credit as Commissioner, and it would be payable in any Nova Scotia Banking Office on his check. The town is crowded with people interested in the commission; buildings are decked with bunting and the people are jubilant over the prospects of having their claims paid. The contractors are so far satisfied with Judge Clarke's decisions.

Poundmaker's Trial. WINNIPEG, Aug. 18.

Chief Poundmaker's trial was commenced yesterday morning. The indictment brought against him was for treason and felony. The counsel for the crown said that he would prove that Poundmaker was in command of the rebels at Cut Knife Creek and that he assisted at the looting of Battleford; and also that he commanded the attack on the teamsters at Eagle Hills. Several witnesses were examined, including Robert Jefferson, the prisoner's son-in-law, and the court adjourned at 6 o'clock. The trial of Thomas Scott at Prince Albert, an alleged white rebel, has been postponed until September. He was admitted to bail.

To Revenge the Murder of Olivier Pain. PARIS, Aug. 18.

Henri Rochfort writing on the murder of Olivier Pain urges that if the French Government fails to exact satisfaction from England for the murder, friends of Pain's will watch for the coming of the Prince of Wales and avenge upon him the murder of Pain.

Dublin's Cardinal. DUBLIN, Aug. 18.

The Municipal Council of this city has resolved to present Rt. Rev. Dr. Walsh with an address of welcome on his return from Rome as successor to Cardinal McCabe in the Archbishopric of Dublin.

Commutation of Riel's Sentence Agitated. OTTAWA, Aug. 18.

A mass meeting of the citizens of Hull was held last evening for the purpose of petitioning the Minister of Justice for the commutation of Riel's sentence. A similar meeting was, yesterday evening, held in Montreal.

London's Vice Dramatized. LONDON, Aug. 18.

The Pall Mall Gazette's revelations of London's vice has been dramatized at Vienna. The play is divided into five acts, and is entitled "Protect our Daughters."
