TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

(SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.) The Crapaud Road Case. OTTAWA, Oct. 27. The case of Sherrin vs. Pearson, an appeal from a decision of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, has been before the Supreme Court here since yesterday afternoon, and was concluded this evening. Judgment was reserved. Hodgson, Q. C., appeared for the appellant, and Davies, Q. C., and Hazard for the respondent. Liberal-Conservative Meeting at Moncton. MONCTON, Oct. 27. The Westmoreland County Liberal-Conservatives held a most successful meeting for organization in Moncton to-day. Every parish was represented, upwards of 80 delegates being present. It was decided to hold a special meeting at Sackville when occasion required for the election of a candidate. Hudson Bay Ship Wrecked. WINNIPEG, Oct. 27. The captain and first mate of the Hudson Bay brigantine Cam Owen arrived here, bringing the first tidings of the wreck of that vessel north of York Factory on Aug. 30.
