ENGINEERS INSPECTED—Yesterday afternoon the Charlottetown Engineers were inspected by Major-General O'Grady-Haley, the first time in the history of this military district that the inspecting officer has been the general officer commanding the Canadian Militia. The Engineers marched to Victoria Park and awaited the General. About 2.30 he arrived and inspected the company in infantry drill and in manual and firing exercises. The inspection passed by the Engineers was favorable to them despite the large number of recruits, which met the General's notice. When he returns with the greater number of the Engineers who went to South Africa with him, and when the new blood has had more drilling, the Charlottetown Engineers will be even more efficient than Capt Morris' excellent training has made them.

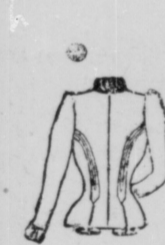
