**MUTINY IN EAST AFRICA.**

**Revolt Among Soudanese Troops**

**MANY OFFICERS AND MEN KILLED AND WOUNDED.**

**Defeat of the Mutineers.**

ZANZIBAR (East Africa), Nov. 22.—Particulars have reached here of a revolt among the Soudanese troops in Major MacDonald's expedition, in the Lake country, south of the equatorial provinces. On October 19th, last, the mutineers, assisted by one hundred and fifty Mohammedans, attacked the camp at Wasoga. In the fierce fighting which followed, Lieut. Fielding, Major Thurston, launch engineer Scott, Civil Officer Wilson, and fifteen soldiers were killed. The wounded numbered thirty, including Captain MacPherson and Chief Civil Officer Jackson. The mutineers were finally defeated, losing one hundred in killed and wounded.

**THE BIG LONDON FIRE.**

**Official Figures as to the Loss.**

LONDON, Nov. 22.—The official figures show that 171 buildings were burned in the big fire of Friday last. The area burned over is two acres. The estimates of loss vary from ten to forty million dollars.

**Reported Resignation.**

LONDON, Nov. 22.—The Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Temple, will, it is reported, resign the Archbishopric on November 26th next—the seventy-sixth anniversary of his birthday.

**Fielding Lingers in London.**

LONDON, Nov. 22.—Hon. Mr. Fielding, Finance Minister of Canada, is still here. He will likely sail for Canada next week, via New York.

**LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL**

MADRID, Nov. 18.—The report that the government intends, in return for his services as governor-general of Cuba, to appoint Lieutenant General Weyler Governor General of the Philippines, is officially denied. According to a despatch from Santander, on the Bay of Biscay, the partisans and friends of General Weyler are making lavish preparations to welcome him on his return. Boats with bands will meet the Montserrat and six thousand rockets will be fired. When these explode they will drop ribbons inscribed "Viva Weyler." The public, however, is not disposed to subscribe to meet the expenses of the demonstration, and in the case of a club having a membership of a thousand, only six contributed.

LONDON, November 19.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says: "The murder of the German missionaries must be laid chiefly to the account of the Chinese priests and mandarins, who egged on the mob by the assertion that the missionaries had gathered at Yen-Chi-Fu to celebrate All Saints day, because that town is the birth-place of Confucius. They also attempted to convince the emperor and the empress dowager, and they seemed to have succeeded so well that the emperor

LONDON, Dec. 19.—A special despatch from Berlin describes a terrible fatality in Poland. While a recent performance of wild beasts and their trainer was in progress at the village near K-xno, Poland, the lion tamer was killed by a lion and tigress. A fearful panic ensued in the audience, and eighty persons were crushed to death and many others seriously injured.

CAIRO, Nov. 18.—Parsons Pa h starts for Suakin on Tuesday next, from which place he will embark a battalion of infantry and detachments of artillery, engineers and camel corps, altogether about 1,500 men, for Massowa, from which place the British force will go to Kassala, in order to take over that place from the Italians, according to the agreement on the subject arrived at between Great Britain and Italy.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—Militia general orders issued to day contain the following: To be lieutenant, 2nd Lieut. Cecil D. W. Uniacke, vice Harrington, retired. To be 2nd lieutenant provisionally, Humphrey Mellish, gentleman, vice Wilby, retired, and Ralph Bernard Simmonds, gentleman vice Uniacke, promoted.

**SEAL EXPERT'S OPINION.**

Prof. Macoun, the Canadian sealing expert who attended the conference at Washington, has returned to Ottawa. He says that the most important points agreed upon were, from a Canadian point of view, that the excess of females in the pelagic catch is due to the killing of males on the islands; that pelagic sealers conduct their work in a spirit of acquiescence in the limitations of law; that there is now a tendency towards equilibrium in the number of seals, that is a tendency towards neither increase nor decrease, and finally that so long as the haunts of the seals on land are respected and the protected zone at sea is maintained the seals are in no danger of actual extermination. In Prof. Macoun's opinion most important of all these points is the one admitting that there has been no wilful violence of the law on the part of pelagic sealers, both before and since the Paris regulations went into force. The sealers have by the United States press generally been called by very opprobrious names, as for instance "poachers," "robbers" "pirates," etc. As a matter of fact they have, according to the finding of the delegates to the conference, complied with the limitations of the law. It has never been denied by Canada that pelagic sealing was one of the causes of the decrease in numbers of the seals, but it was contended that they were in no danger of being exterminated, and to this view the delegates unanimously agreed.
