SUNDAY'S MASS AT ST. PATRICK'S CHURCH.—The Quebec Chronicle says: As mentioned in our issue of the first instant, Rev. F. Burke, of Georgetown, P. E. I., who was ordained priest, on Saturday at the Resolice by His Grace the Archbishop of Quebec, celebrated his first mass in St. Patrick's Church on Sunday last. The Rev. gentleman was assisted by the Rev. Fathers Stull and Hadyn, as deacon and sub-deacon. The church was beautifully decorated and contained a very large congregation. Rev. Dr. O'Brien preached the sermon from the 109th Psalm, "The Lord hath sworn and he will not repent, thou art a priest forever according to the order of Melchisedech." The preacher spoke of the grand prerogatives of the Christian priesthood, showing that in his relations with the Church of Christ, the priest is the guardian and expounder of truth. The musical portion of the service was rendered with exquisite taste, the service being brought to a close by the singing of the Te Deum. Father Burke is son of James Burke, Esq., Georgetown. The Chronicle says he will shortly leave Quebec, followed by good wishes of his friends. His brilliant talents and amiable qualities have endeared him to many, and will doubtless bear abundant fruits in the ministry.

THE HALIFAX LINE OF STEAMERS.—By the advertisement in our columns it will be seen that the fast, new steamer Ulunda, of this line, left Montreal on Wednesday for Charlottetown, and will leave here for Boston, via Halifax, next Monday morning. The Ulunda is expected to make the trip from Charlottetown to Boston within sixty hours, including the stoppage at Halifax. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] THE RIEL REBELLION. BIG BEAR'S STRENGTH, SEVEN HUNDRED.

Winnipeg, June 4. Jobin, Riel's private secretary, who was wounded in the Battle of Batoche, and afterwards had his leg amputated, died yesterday at Saskatoon. Gabriel Dumont's reported escape to the United States is discredited. It is believed he is still lurking about Batoche Crossing.

Battleford, June 4. Scouts who have just arrived report Big Bear's force to be seven hundred fighting braves, most of whom have experience in Indian warfare in Montana and other parts of the United States.

Gen. Middleton expects to meet Big Bear and in conjunction with General Strong's forces, and strike a final blow at the rebellion to-morrow.

The Indians on the Edmonton District and those north of Battleford are acting in a menacing manner. One band threatens to massacre the white settlers of the District unless the Government sends them abundant supplies of food.

The Earthquake in Cashmere.

Later reports from India state that the loss of life during the earthquake at Sermagur and Sapur was not so great as at first stated. When the shocks were first felt and the people realized that they were subjected to the awful possibilities of an earthquake, the wildest panic seized them. Every one able to do so rushed from tumbling houses and fled to the boats on the river and lakes, or sought the open country. The terrified inhabitants are now camped in fields that surround the town. Sermagur is near the centre of the Vale of Cashmere, and the whole territory experienced terrible earthquake shocks. The damage caused throughout the vale is enormous. The loss in cattle alone is very great. The afflicted people seem to be utterly desolate, and succor is being sent them as rapidly as the Indian authorities can organize relief. Many of the houses yet standing show large rents in the walls and must be razed to the ground. The shocks have not yet ceased, and this fact greatly retards the work of rescuing the people pinned down in the debris, and it is feared many of these must perish before they can be rescued by relief parties.

The Reciprocity Question.

Halifax, June 4. The Chamber of Commerce of this city at its meeting last evening, discussed the effect of the expiring fishery clauses of the Washington Treaty on the commerce of Nova Scotia, and the necessity of taking immediate steps to protect the interests of the Province. The Chamber expressed itself unanimously in favor of reciprocity; but failing to obtain reciprocity, they will demand the most vigorous protection of the Canadian fishery interests by absolute exclusion of Americans from all privileges in Canadian waters and ports. In case the Dominion Government fail to provide adequate protection for our fishermen, the Chamber calls upon the Local Government of Nova Scotia to demand this protection from the British Admiral until the Treaty of Washington is renewed, or some other international trade arrangement is made.

Sir Leonard's Success.

Ottawa, June 4. Sir Leonard Tilley cables the Government that he has had great success in London. He has, without any difficulty, converted the five per cent. loan of twenty-five million dollars, obtained in 1860, into a four per cent. loan, and renewed it for another quarter of a century. He has placed it at 99, and thus saves for the Dominion of Canada annually in interest the handsome sum of \$250,000.

Halifax, June 4. The Grand Lodge A. F. & A. M., Nova Scotia, at its session here re-elected General Laurie, who is now in the North-west, as Grand Master, amid great enthusiasm.

Acadia College.

Wolfville, June 4. The anniversary of Acadia College was a great success. Fred Bradshaw, an Island boy, graduated, and read a clever essay on "Our Inheritance."

Fatal Fire Damp.

London, June 4. A fire damp explosion occurred in the Aurham coal mine yesterday. The pit took fire, and thirteen men were killed or burned to death.

A Murderous Peace Party.

London, June 4. A despatch from Madagascar states that the peace party of the Island have strangled the Prime Minister.

Another Crank.

Queenstown, June 4. A Norwegian crank, named Johnston, is going to cross the Atlantic from this port in a small boat.

An Incurable Disease.

LONDON, June 4. Sir H. E. C. Childers, Secretary of War, is suffering from an incurable disease.

The Irish Crimes Act.

LONDON, June 4. All the most serious clauses in the Irish Crimes Act are to be retained.
