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THE MACLEANS OF DRIMMIN.
 1. John Dubh, second son of Hector Mor MacLeann, of Duart, settled in Nova Scotia. He was executed by Angus McDonald of Lelay, whilst a hostage in his hands in 1586. He left four sons—Donald Glas, Allan of Ardornish, John Garbh, and Charles. Donald Glas died unmarried in 1588.
 2. Allan of Ardornish had three sons—Hector, Charles of Ardornish, and Donald. Hector was the first MacLeann of Kinloch-shiel. He was succeeded by his son John, who was succeeded by his son Hector, who was succeeded by his son Angus. Angus, fourth of Kinlochshiel, died without issue in 1735. He was succeeded by his nearest relative in the male line, Charles, fourth of Drimmin.
 3. Charles of Ardornish had six sons—Allan of Drimmin, Lachlan of Calgary, Allan of Grinlin, Donald of Aros, Hector of Ewen, Lachlan of Calgary had four sons, but his descendants are not known. I believe, extinct in the male line. Allan of Grinlin had three sons—Lachlan his successor, Charles of Kinloch, and John of Fenwick. Lachlan had one son, Hector, who died without issue in 1756. He was succeeded by his son, Charles of Kinloch, who had eight sons—Allan, Hector of Torren, Donald, Allan, John, Alexander, Lachlan, and Archibald. Alexander was the first MacLeann of Penny-croft. He was succeeded by his son Archibald, who was succeeded by his son Alexander, who was succeeded by his son Archibald John.
 4. Allan, eldest son of Charles of Ardornish, was the first MacLeann of Drimmin. He married Mary, daughter of John Cameron of Callair, by whom he had two sons, John and Donald. Donald had a son named Lachlan, who settled at Mullach-shiel, near Duart, in 1743.
 5. John, second of Drimmin, married Mary, daughter of John MacLeann of Ard-gour, by whom he had two sons, Allan and Charles. Allan, third of Drimmin, died unmarried and was succeeded by his brother Charles.
 6. Charles, fourth of Drimmin, married Isabel, daughter of John Cameron, of Er-racht, by whom he had Allan, John, Donald and Lachlan. He succeeded to the estate of Kinlochshiel in 1735. He commanded the MacLeans at the battle of Cul-looden, where he was killed. John, his second son, had three sons, Donald, Charles and Colin. Donald was married, but left no issue. Lachlan died unmarried in 1754. Marjory was married to Donald Cameron of Erracht, and was the mother of General Allan Cameron, Allan an Esq. of Callair, and the late Major James Cameron, fifth of Drimmin and sixth of Kinlochshiel, who was born about the year 1724. He fought at the battle of Culloden with his father. He was twice married. By his first wife, Anne, daughter of Donald MacLeann of Er-racht, he had Charles, his successor, and others. By his second wife, Mary, daughter of Lachlan MacLaine of Lochbuie, he had Donald of Kinloch, John, Catherine and others. He had twenty-two children in all, seven by the first wife and twenty by the second. He died about the year 1797. Charles, 6th of Drimmin, married Maria, daughter of Sir Allan MacLeann, of Broils. He seems to have been a careless and extravagant man. His estates were sold some time after his death to pay the debts with which he was burdened. John, his younger brother, was a surgeon in the 79th Highlanders. He died unmarried in Er-racht, by his wife, Catherine and others. He had a son, Harry, who was married to Captain John Campbell, of the Navy. One of her daughters, Mrs. Henniker, lives near Charlottetown, in Prince Edward Island. I called on her some months ago, and of course, devoted some time to questioning her about her grandfather, Allan of Drimmin.
 8. Donald of Kinloch succeeded his brother Charles as representative of the MacLeans of Drimmin, and was a lawyer by profession. He married Lillias, daughter of Colquhoun Grant, an Edinburgh lawyer, by whom he had Allan, Colquhoun, Hector, John, Charles, Alexander, Archibald and Lachlan. His son, Charles, and others. All the sons died without issue, except Charles and Andrew. Christina, who was the eldest of the family, was married to Murdoch MacLeans of Lochbuie. She was a doctor in medicine in some part of England. He has at least one son, Harry, commander-in-chief of the army of the Sultan of Morocco.
 9. Charles, fifth son of Donald of Kinloch, succeeded his father as representative of the descendants of John Dubh of Morvern (Siobhad Iain Dubh na Morairne) He was born in Edinburgh in 1806. He lost his eyesight at the age of sixteen from a violent form of Egyptian ophthalmia. He was at the time attending a college in London preparing for entering the army. After losing his sight he entered the University of Edinburgh, and graduated with honors. He studied for the ministry, but the general assembly, though willing to license him, would not agree to settle him over a congregation. After this disappointment he came to Canada and took up land in Seymour, Ontario. He was married in Edinburgh in March, 1837, by Dr. Candlish, to Jane, daughter of Captain Campbell, of Kintra. He returned to Seymour shortly afterwards. He lost two homes, one after another, by fire. He was a doctor, and a very prominent man. He was shipwrecked three times. He was a good musician, and was always cheerful. He was evidently a man of courage, determination and energy. He had ten children—Donald, Colin, William, Archibald, Alexander, Charles, Lillias, Jane Campbell, Jane Jarvis, and Sybella. He died at Kingston, Ont., May 13, 1872. Two of his sons, Colin and Wm., died young. Archibald was married and has one son, Charles. Alexander is married and has two sons, Donald and Kenneth. Charles is married and has four sons, Charles, William, Donald and Gillian. The three of them are doctors.
 10. Donald, eldest son of Charles, son of Donald of Kinloch, is the present chief of the MacLeans of Drimmin. He was born in Seymour, Ontario, in 1839. He was married in 1871, to Anne Anderson, and has two children, Donald and Anne. He is a doctor, and is a very prominent man. He lives at Detroit, Michigan.
 It is a good sign of the age in which we live to find the MacLeans of Morven devoting themselves to the art of making people people well. It is certainly an art which John Dubh, their progenitor, and Allan of Ardornish did not practice very much when fighting under their chief, Sir Lachlan Mor of Duart.
