# Finland Tops Warriors 4-2

FLIN FLON, Man. (CP)—Finland's national hockey team gave up the first goal and then rammed home four consecutive markers to defeat Flin Flon Warriors 4-2 in an exhibition game before about 2,000 fans Sunday.

The victory over the Warriors, runners-up for the Western Canada intermediate crown in the 1964-65 season, ran Finland's record on a Canadian tour to four wins, one loss and one tie. The Finns have been beaten only by Canada's national team—10-4 in Vancouver Dec. 19.

Reijo Hakanen, Lalli Partinen, Jorma Peltonen and Lasse Oksanen scored for Finland, whose next game is Monday in Winnipeg against the Manitoba Junior League all-stars.

Don Donaldson and Jim Davis scored for Flin Flon.

**OPENED SCORING**  
Donaldson opened scoring midway through the first period, beating Finnish goaltender Urpo Ylonen with a blistering 30-foot shot.

Hakanen tied the score on a close-in passing play. Partinen and Peltonen gave Finland a 3-1 lead in the second period on screened shots. Oksanen boosted the Finns' lead to 4-1 in the third period before Davis's long shot slipped from Ylonen's glove into the net for the game's final goal.

The Warriors took six of the game's nine minor penalties. George Allard's solid performance in the Flin Flon goal was the key to holding Finland to only four tallies, as the Finns held the edge in play for the first 40 minutes. # Beavers Down Swedish Forces

STOCKHOLM (AP) — Sherbrooke Beavers, Canadian Allan Cup champions, defeated the Swedish Djurgarden team 8-3 Sunday in the opening game of the Ahearne Cup amateur hockey tournament here.

Leksand of Sweden defeated another Swedish team, Sodertalje, 9-7, in another game. The tournament has only the Canadian squad and three Swedish teams this year following the unexpected withdrawal of the Russian entry last week.

The four teams will play a double round-robin series, ending Jan. 4. The Beavers outscored their opponents 2-1 in the first period and 4-0 in the second. Each team counted twice in the third period.

The Canadian team had no trouble topping Djurgarden at the Johanneshov indoor stadium here.

Djurgarden briefly took the lead in the seventh minute when Sven (tumba) Johansson scored. Bill Claude Carlin, top scorer in the Quebec Senior Hockey League last year with 25 goals and 44 assists, and Maurice Hurlbise, 21-year-old right winger playing his first year with the Beavers, made it 2-1 for the Canadians.

Gilles Cartier, 22-year-old centre from Sorel, Que., scored two goals in the second period with others coming from Hurlbise and Bill Dupre, a 22-year-old centre who carries to Beavers two years ago.

Scoring for Sherbrooke in the third period were Carlin and Cartier. Lundstrom and Thomas Carlsson scored for Djurgarden.

The Sherbrooke goalie, 28-year-old Serge Aubry from Quebec City who played with Windsor, N.S. in the 1963-64 season, also won approval from the crowd of nearly 7,000.

The Ahearne Cup competition is an international round-robin tournament played annually on different rinks in Sweden. The Russians had accepted an invitation. But on Thursday the organizing Swedish clubs, Djurgarden and Sodertalje, received a telegram saying the Russians could not come "due to internal difficulties."

# Ford Company Plans Program

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The Ford Motor Co. agreed Saturday to continue its racing program on United States stock car tracks next year, using its 427-inch stock production, wedge type engine.

In return, the two top sanctioning bodies for stock car racing in the U.S.—the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing and the United States Auto Club—agreed to reconsider Ford's single-overhead-cam engine for use in 1967.

Ford officials were not available for comment. However, a spokesman said Saturday night a statement from the racing association setting forth terms of an agreement "appears to be consistent with the understanding we have with NASCAR and USAC."

Ford officials announced several days ago that the single-overhead-cam power plant would be used on the stock car circuits in 1966. The engine subsequently was ruled ineligible by the NASCAR and USAC on grounds it was not a stock production engine and not available to the general public on a competitive price scale.

Ford indicated it would drop its stock car racing activities in 1966 because of the ruling. The 427 wedge engine has won more than 50 races on the NASCAR circuit this year.

# Bruins Topple New York To Snap Winless Streak

December has been a real bad month for Boston Bruins in the National Hockey League, but they celebrated Christmas with a bang—and a victory.

The Bruins snapped a month-long winless streak by defeating New York Rangers 4-2 in Boston Saturday night.

In other games, Toronto Maple Leafs extended their undefeated streak to seven games by downing Chicago Black Hawks 5-3 and Montreal Canadiens edged Detroit Red Wings 4-3.

The Bruins, whose best effort in 12 games was a 4-4 tie with Montreal early this month, ended their slump on third-period goals by Tommy Williams and rookie Bill Goldsworthy.

Ted Green, on the sidelines since Nov. 24 with a virus infection, made a triumphant return to action with slamming bodychecks and three assists before 10,625 fans.

He helped set up a goal by Dean Prentice in the second period and then helped Williams and Goldsworthy in the finale after Phil Goyette had tied the count 2-2.

**FRIDAY BUSY**  
The last-place Bruins jarred the Rangers with hard-hitting tactics at the outset and referee Bill Friday had a busy time. Friday called a total of 17 penalties, including four majors for fighting and 10-minute misconduct in the first two periods, but called only one infraction in the final 20 minutes.

New York's Vic Hadfield and Boston's Bob Weytowich exchanged punches in the first period and Green and Wayne Hillman of the Rangers went to it in the second period.

Bill Hicke sent the Rangers in front in the first period with his first goal of the season. Murray Oliver, squared the count 3-5 seconds later.

Prentice put the Bruins in front in the second period before Goyette connected with the Bruins short-handed in the third

period. Then Williams and Goldsworthy nailed down the victory, the first for Boston since a 2-1 decision over Toronto Nov. 27.

At Toronto, Terry Sawchuk returned to the Toronto nets after a nine-game layoff with a fine effort before 14,083 fans although he failed to stop Chicago's ace left winger, Bobby Hull.

**HULL GETS TWO**  
Hull fired two goals to raise his total to 27 in 23 games. Ken Hodge, a rookie defenceman, scored his first goal of the season to finish the Chicago scoring.

Eddie Shack scored the winner for the Leafs on a 30-foot slap shot that cleanly beat Black Hawk goalie Glenn Hall. Other Leaf goals came from Bob Pulford on a breakaway while Toronto was short-handed, rookie Wally Boyer, Frank Mahovlich and defenceman Ken Douglas.

Hull scored the only goal of the first period on a quick shot from directly in front of the net

after grabbing a rebound on a shot by Pierre Pilote. Douglas evened the score at 1-1 with a power-play goal at 4:45 of the second period.

Just over a minute later, Mahovlich picked up a pass from Dave Keon in full flight on the left wing and cruised in to beat Hull with a 25-foot wrist shot.

Hull scored his second goal at 10:14 of another rebound, this time from Kenny Wharram. Boyer put the Leafs in front 3-2 before the period closed. Boyer cut around the defence and fired point blank at Hall, who made the stop, but Boyer pushed the rebound behind him.

Shack scored his 14th goal of the season at 8:31 of the third period on another long slapshot. Pulford stole the puck from Stapleton at the Leaf blue line and went in to beat Hall from about 15 feet. It was also his 14th goal of the season.

Hodge closed out the scoring at 17:50 for Chicago with a screened shot from the blue line which beat Sawchuk.

Chicago took eight of the 18 minor penalties.

At Montreal, Henri Richard scored the winning goal and assisted on three others to lead the Canadiens.

Richard's winner—his eighth goal of the campaign—came at the 17:40 mark of the final period after Detroit's Gordie Howe tied the game 3-3. It was Howe's 15th goal of the season.

Other Montreal marksmen were Claude Provost with his sixth, Gilles Tremblay with his eighth and defenceman Jacques Laperriere with his fourth.

For Detroit, veteran centre Alex Delvecchio and Norm Ullman joined linemate Howe in beating Gump Worsley in the Montreal nets. A crowd of 14,406 watched the battle.

Only one of the seven goals scored in the game came on a power play. It was Provost's first-period goal while Detroit defenceman Bryan Watson was serving a penalty.

# Red Wings Nip Montreal; New York Topples Boston

DETROIT (CP) — Alex Delvecchio knocked in Norm Ullman's rebound with 56 seconds to play Sunday night to give Detroit Red Wings a 1-0 victory over Montreal Canadiens.

Wings goalie Roger Crozier made six big saves in the Detroit net in the final three minutes as the Canadiens sought their first National Hockey League win on Detroit ice in 18 games—a string that stretches back to February, 1964.

Crozier, rookie of the year last season, made 13 of his stops in the final period while gaining his third shutout of the year.

**GET SPLIT**  
The Wings victory gave Detroit a split in the weekend series between the clubs. Montreal won at home Saturday when Henri Richard beat Crozier with only 2:11 to play.

Montreal goalie Gump Worsley knocked down Ullman's shot from left wing as the public address announcer said it was the final minute of the game.

The puck stood at Worsley's feet and before he could cover up, Delvecchio knocked it in for his 11th goal of the season.

It marked the first time this season that Detroit has beaten Montreal in six games. The Wings tied the two previous games between the clubs here.

The game started slowly with both clubs checking tightly. Worsley had to handle only 14 shots in the first 40 minutes and Crozier only 11.

Montreal put on a strong power play when Bryan Watson was penalized by Referee Frank Udvari at 4:55 of the first period but didn't score.

The Canadiens appeared to have a big chance at 8:30 of the final period when Watson tripped Richard near the Detroit goal.

**LOST ADVANTAGE**  
But before the play ended, Montreal defenceman Ted Harris cross-checked Bruce MacGregor of Detroit and also was penalized, inflicting the Canadiens who stormed around Udvari.

While both clubs were short, Crozier caught a J.C. Tremblay shot and fell on the rebound. Jean Beliveau and Bobby Rousseau banged at the puck and it went into the net but Udvari ruled the whistle had blown and the Canadiens stormed around him again.

Crozier made big saves on Richard and Jacques Laperriere, Gilles Tremblay and Claude Provost — the Saturday night goal scorers—in the final three minutes.

It was the seventh home ice victory in a row for Detroit and the Wings pulled it out before 13,846 fans, biggest crowd of the season.

**BLUES TOP BRUINS**  
NEW YORK (AP) — Bob Nevin scored three goals and set two others to lead New York Rangers to a 6-4 National Hockey League victory over Boston Bruins Sunday night.

The victory gave the Rangers a split in their weekend set with Boston and left them four points in front of last-place Bruins in the NHL standing.

Nevin led Don Marshall, who put New York in front in the first minute of the game, then scored his 15th goal of the season with 6½ minutes gone in the opening period.

After the Rangers' Phil Goyette converted a Nevin pass in the opening minutes of the second period and Don Awrey countered for the Bruins two minutes later, the Ranger captain teamed with Earl Ingarfield to break the game open.

**SCORES 10th**  
Boston's Ted Green serving one of six penalties he incurred when Nevin scored his second goal on a pass from Rod Gilbert. Ingarfield boosted the New York lead to 5-1 just 33 seconds later. The goal was the 100th goal of his NHL career.

Nevin scored his third goal with only 31 seconds gone in the final period. The goal lifted his season total to 17, one more than he scored all last season.

Ed Johnston, who replaced rookie Bernie Parent in the Boston goal at the start of the third period, was the victim of Nevin's third goal. Johnston, however came up with several spectacular saves as the Rangers peppered him with 29 shots in the final 20 minutes.

The Bruins made it close with three goals in the final 10 minutes. Murray Oliver connected twice, and defenceman Al Langlois got the other.

Green, the Bruins' hard-nosed defenceman, was hit with a total of 36 minutes in penalties, including two misconducts and five minutes each for spearing Phil Goyette and brawling with Vic Hadfield.

Referee John Ashley called 20 penalties for a total of 78 minutes, 40 minutes to the Bruins. Marshall had four assists in addition to his 10th goal of the year as the Rangers ended a three-game losing streak.

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# Chicago Team Ties Toronto

CHICAGO (AP)—Chico Maki's goal midway in the final period pulled Chicago Black Hawks into a 1-1 tie with Toronto Maple Leafs here Sunday night in a National Hockey League game.

The deadlock moved the Hawks to within a point of the league-leading Montreal Canadiens, who lost 1-0 Sunday night in Detroit.

By failing to win for the first time in six games, the Leafs fell to fourth place, a point behind Detroit Red Wings.

Red Kelly of Toronto broke a scoreless tie at 18:49 of the second period when he streaked in to convert on a pass-out by Bob Pulford. It was his second goal of the years.

**SCORED ON POWERPLAY**  
Toronto's Tim Horton was in the penalty box when Maki fired the tying goal. Bobby Hull's shot was bobbed by Sawchuk and before he could gain control of the puck, Maki skated up and nudged it under the Leaf netminder's pads.

But it was Sawchuk's only misplay of the night. He turned in a brilliant performance against 4 Chicago shots and was particularly sharp against Phil Esposito a few moments after Maki's goal.

Hull fed the puck to Esposito near the front of the net and the centre fired through a mass of players. However, Sawchuk moved quickly and sent the puck scooting off his left pad and into the corner.

The underdog Colts, playing under a severe handicap without their injured quarterbacks Johnny Unitas and Gary Cuozzo, forced the proud Packers to come from behind in a grueling defensive battle.

**HELD EARLY LEAD**  
Baltimore held a 10-0 lead at the half, and the Packers never did catch up until Chandler connected with a 23-yard field goal with only 1:58 of regular play remaining.

Although the Colts lost the lead and had to kick off to the Packers in the overtime session, the first in NFL history since the historic Baltimore-New York debacle of 1958, they had a shot at the title after forcing Green Bay to punt.

Lou Michaels, who had kicked a 15-yard field goal in the second quarter, tried again, this time from the 47, but it failed.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP)—Don Chandler's 25-yard field goal after 13 minutes and 39 seconds of sudden-death overtime play gave Green Bay Packers the Western Conference championship of the National Football League Sunday on a 13-10 playoff victory over Baltimore Colts.

The Packers moved on to an NFL title game with the defending champion Cleveland Browns here next Sunday.

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Tom Matte, a converted halfback who hadn't played quarterback since college, handled the signal-calling chores for the Colts. He is the son of Roland (Joe) Matte of Carleton Place, Ont., who played hockey for Detroit Red Wings and Cleveland Barons after performing in junior ranks with Ottawa Shamrockers.

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**Aussies Team Opens Defence**  
SYDNEY, N.S.W. (AP)—Fred Stolle and Roy Emerson will play the singles matches for Australia today as the heavily favored Aussies open defence of the Davis Cup against Spain in the climax of the global competition.

Stolle meets Manuel Santana, Spain's No. 1, in the first match and Emerson, regarded as the world's top amateur, meets Juan Gisbert. The draw was made Sunday.

The best-of-five series continues Tuesday when Santana and Luis Arilla take on the Australian doubles team—probably Emerson and Stolle.

Wednesday, competition ends with two singles—Santana vs. Emerson and Gisbert vs. Stolle. Emerson and Stolle won back the cup from the United States last year, the 12th time in the 19 years after the Second World War the Aussies have been champions. The United States won the seven other titles.
